CONTEMPORARY CHRISTIAN MUSIC (CCM) and CHRISTIAN WORSHIP:

The church is confronted with an issue today that stirs a great deal of emotion, as well as conflict. It revolves around CCM. CCM is big among "Christian artists" who to their credit prefer to sing and promote different music than the vulgar, extreme, and godless music that is so widely promoted in the music world. But therein is the challenge to the church. Today there is not universal understanding on the definition of "Christian." Something is not "Christian" simply because it mentions the name of Jesus, or even because it promotes Christian themes. What may be "Christian" in intent whether spoken or sung but which lacks in substance and faithfulness to the Word of God does not serve the purpose of edifying and building up in the faith unto salvation, which ultimately is a purpose of Gospel preaching. The heart of the Christian religion was defined by Luther: "We are unable to atone for sin or to blot it out by our works; but we believe that Christ has atoned for it with His blood. This faith, without any works, blots out sin" (WLS. Vol.1 page 247. Para 737). The focus of the Christian message is law and gospel – sin and grace. Further, the Christian life – sanctification in biblical language – is not of the will of man but is a spontaneous fruit of faith, which itself is a fruit born of the Spirit through the Gospel. Finally, God's blessing upon the church and the Christian revolves around the Means of Grace.

The Gospel message is not about emotion. The Gospel message is about Christ. Indeed, it is Christ! The Gospel message does stir emotions. How can the sinner who realizes his sin, and who believes the wonderful message of forgiveness and salvation in Christ not be filled with emotion?

Music itself is a gift of God. Different people enjoy different forms of music. In importance and influence, Luther placed music second to theology. They are truly blessed who have the special gift to be musicians - vocal or instrumental. They who have the special gift have a responsibility to use it well, wisely, and to the glory of God whether their use of it be as a sacred or secular nature. Since music influences heart and mind, much harm can be done to society by abuse of this gift! As sanctified Christians we will be careful as to the kind of music to which we listen, or which we promote. Therefore in our church and our elementary schools, and at ILC we want to promote appreciation of this wonderful gift of God, as well as give a good understanding of sound Christian music and hymns.

As relates to CCM, we have a responsibility as parents, pastor, and teacher to guide and instruct our children and those in our charge. Nevertheless we are not arbiters of the music to which God's people choose to listen in their private lives. Nor do we want to be! But it is a different matter with respect to the music that is *promoted* in the church, or introduced into the worship service.

Martin Luther introduced singing into the church and made it a singing church. Music was influential in the spread of the Reformation. Of the music that was in the church before Luther's influence he said, "Therefore we have removed these idolatrous, dead, and nonsensical texts, have divested them of the fine music, and have used this for the living, holy Word of God, to sing, to praise, to glorify therewith, so that this fine ornament of music might be put to proper use and serve its dear Creator and His Christians, that He might be praised and glorified and that we might be bettered and strengthened in the faith through His holy Word, driven into the heart with sweet song" (Page 981, Para.3096).

To assist in this, Luther wrote many hymns – over 20 – that appear in *The Lutheran Hymnal (TLH)*. There are many hymnals that have been used in the Lutheran Church over the centuries. Recently there has been a spate of new hymnals, some better than others. We have our *Worship Supplement* with many fine hymns, some of which are in the *TLH*. The Evangelical Lutheran Synod (ELS) has produced a fine hymnal. The Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS) likewise has produced one. We are told that the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LC-MS) has a new hymnal with many fine hymns. As to the selection of a hymnal there is no "Thus says the Lord." Such selection falls within the area of Christian freedom with the prime necessity that such hymnals are to be sound in substance – also as relates to the liturgical settings. Given the fact that a hymnal is of human origin and given the fact that personal choices are involved, not every hymnal will have hymns or music of equal satisfaction to all.

It has been the contention of this writer that should we be deprived of our Bible and catechism, we could preach and teach the full counsel of God from our hymnal. Herein lies a concern about CCM. While it may be catchy with "Christian" themes, and while it may appeal to the contemporary generation, little that this writer has seen presents the substantive biblical message in clear, propositional, and confessional form — essential to the Lutheran worship service! Much is frequently repetitious and to this ear not musically appealing. Furthermore, a case can be made it seems, that since CCM is

introduced as an appeal to youth and to reflect the idea of "one religion fits all" *contemporary worship cannot be far behind*! Make no mistake. If CCM becomes the norm and preference it will eventually try to force itself into the service if not by choice, by default, to our harm and loss.

While it is unlikely that CCM would invade the worship services of our church, one could conclude that since it is "Christian" it could appropriately be introduced. If it is Christian, why not? Personally, when this writer is on his death bed, he wants to hear, "Jesus, Thy blood and righteousness, my beauty are my glorious dress" (*TLH*-371), rather than *"With every step, the more my heart moves to your beat, Just like where I'm headed, there's joy in the journey." I want to hear "Hold Thou Thy cross before my closing eyes" (*TLH* – 552) rather than *"It's the Creator calling the created The Maker beckoning the made The bride finding what she's always waited for When we find ourselves that day (sic)" I want to hear "I know that my Redeemer lives" (*TLH*-200), rather than *"I can only imagine What it will be like when I walk by your side (sic)"

We are not CCM fans, so we do not claim to be objective critics of every CCM piece that has been written. At the same time we have not felt the need to look for something else to fill a void. Whatever music of this genre to which people like to listen, we ought not offer the tried and the true of a sound biblical, confessional, and comforting message of the gospel on the altar of contemporary religiousity. Rather than promoting alternatives, we prefer to teach our youth an appreciation of hymns with sound biblical content. At very least we will want to teach, and promote through preaching and music the sound heritage of the Reformation with its emphasis: "Scripture alone! Grace Alone! Faith Alone!" Unless we do, we risk returning to "idolatrous, dead, and nonsensical texts," as well as losing our confessional nature. The lessons of history should not be ignored!

My heart for joy is springing And can no more be sad, 'Tis full of mirth and singing, Sees naught but sunshine glad. The Sun that cheers my spirit Is Jesus Christ, my King; The heaven I shall inherit Makes me rejoice and sing" (7LH 528, st.15).
