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Some Words from Martin Luther Regarding Labor

God Provides — Through Man's Work

To put it briefly, God wants people to work. If you did not farm or work, you would have to lie behind the stove a long time in order to have anything given to you. It is true, of course, that God could support you without work, could let fried and boiled foods, corn, and wine grow on the table for you. But He will not do this. He wants you to work and to use your reason in this matter. ... He gives us wool, letting it grow for us on the sheep. But the wool is not immediately converted into cloth. We must work it up to make cloth of it. When the cloth is there, it does not promptly become a coat. First the tailor must make it. And so on; in everything God acts in such a way that He will provide, but we should work.

All Want Possessions, Power, Pleasure — but Not Work

All the world is so constituted that if a man can avoid work, he does so; and yet he wants his share of enjoyment. As the heathen poet says: *Ingenium est hominum a labore proclive ad libidnem* (it is characteristic of all human beings to incline from work to pleasure). All people like glory and possessions; everybody wants to rise in the world and aims at a prominent position. But when they are there and feel the work and worry it entails, they soon become disgusted and do not continue; for they sought nothing but their pleasure and ease. In like manner everybody wants to find pleasure and delight in marriage, and then, when they enter it and do not find pleasure and delight in marriage, they become the enemies of marriage. The same thing is going on in all the other estates. As a result, those who are faithful in their positions are very rare birds indeed in this world. For faithfulness entails labor and disgust. He who wants to discharge his duties in a right, God-pleasing manner will soon see what the trouble he has to expect and how heavy the burden is. Consequently, he will often complain, as the world cries, that it is a hard, miserable life. He will soon say: Who would have believed that this position entailed so much trouble? Ah, if only I were rid of it! Indeed, my friend, if this is not what you

wanted, you should not have gone into it in the first place. If a person wants nothing but pleasure and delight or glory and wants to be at the head of things — who would not like that? But this is the way the world is. It likes nothing but the lust of the flesh.



God's Method of Supporting Us

God bestows every good thing; but you must "pitch in" and "take the bull by the horns," that is, you must work and supply God with a reason and a covering ... All this is said against those who tempt God, who want to do nothing, and who imagine that God should give and do whatever they desire, without their labor and industry. To them this proverb is proper advice: *Verlasse dich drauf and backe nicht* (Rely on it – God's help – and do not bake); again: *Harre, bis dir ein gebraten Huhn ins Maul liege* (Wait until a fried chicken flies into your mouth). You see, Gods wants no lazy idlers; but we should work faithfully and diligently, every one of us, according to his calling and office; then He will bless and prosper our efforts. On the other hand, I also say this to the presumptuous, who imagine that their success comes or must come and be acquired through their industry and labor, through their ability and wisdom, and pay no attention to God. The right middle way is not to be lazy and indolent or to rely on one's own work and doing but to work and act and yet expect all success from God alone.

Idleness Wears You Down

Albert, Archbishop of Mayence, used to say that the human heart is like a millstone. If you pour grain on the stone, it revolves, crushes and powders it, and turns it into flour. But if no grain is there, the stone revolves anyway; but now it crushes itself and becomes thinner, smaller, and narrower. In like manner, the human heart wants something to do. If it does not have the works of its calling to perform, the devil comes and shoots temptation, melancholy, and sadness into it. And then the heart consumes itself with sadness. It pines away, and many a man worries himself to death.

(20) For he will not dwell unduly on the days of his life, because God keeps him busy with the joy of his heart.
