## Commitment

One of the meanings for the word commit is "to bind by pledge or assurance." Therefore a commitment is "the act of pledging, obligating, or engaging oneself."

What a blessing that God committed Himself already in eternity to us. He committed Himself to be sinful mankind's Savior-God. He pledged, obligated and engaged Himself in the salvation of mankind by planning and then fulfilling our salvation- "who (God) has saved by planning and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace which was given to us in Christ Jesus before time began, (2 Timothy 1:9)."but we are bound to give thanks to God always for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, because God from the beginning chose you for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth,." (2 Thessalonians 2:13)

He fulfilled that salvation by sending His Son Jesus into this sin-filled world to take our place and do what we could not do---live a perfect life of obedient love---and pay what we could not pay---atone for our sins and the sins of all of mankind. Thank God that He fulfilled His commitment to us. Commitment Six years ago the Lord led our synod to make a commitment to build a new Academic Center. At the 2008 CLC Convention it was resolved "That we finance this project (Academic/Administration Center) immediately following this Convention and begin building the Academic/Administration Center with the goal to break ground in September." This was passed and the building was built.

Since that time over \$314,000 has been given to pay the mortgage costs to the CEF. We need to average \$7,984 a month for the next 20 years. This is a major undertaking that the Lord led us to "pledge, obligate and engage ourselves" in. Only with His motivating power of the Gospel message of salvation will we be able to fulfill that commitment made six years ago. May our hearts respond to the good news of our God's commitment to save us by leading us to fulfill all of our commitments to love, serve, and follow Him.

As I weigh the various ministerial needs and details of each congregation, I assure you that I will seek the Lord's guidance, implore Him for sound wisdom, and keep the dear blood-bought souls of Christ on my heart. I ask that all those who are impacted by this call do the same. This will surely help me as I consider where my God-given talents should be utilized to serve God's people. Inasmuch as I am human, I will do my best to factor out personal issues unless they would bring spiritual or significant physical harm to my family and me.

However, this is not only a time for a pastor to reflect on his personal gifts and abilities and the needs of the individual congregations. It is a fruitful exercise for the congregation in that it causes us all to ponder carefully our ministerial needs here and throughout Christ's kingdom. It is a time to weigh carefully what our congregation needs at this time and also pray diligently that the Lord will continue to allow the ministry among us and in Marquette to flourish in the Word that is preached and taught.

During the week I've been able to learn more about Calvary, although I'm pretty familiar with the ministry there since I served as Vicar there in 1995 and since my brother-in-law, Pastor Joel Fleischer, served there for many years until he recently accepted the call to Berea Lutheran in Sioux Falls, SD. Calvary ([clclutheran.org/calvary/](http://clclutheran.org/calvary/)) currently has 132 baptized souls, 113 communicants, and 19 pre-communicants. It does not have a Christian Day School but is investigating the possibility of starting one. Attendance at worship averages 40. A parsonage is also provided to the pastor's family.

As I consider this call, I certainly invite the input of any who are impacted by the final decision. A common reaction for members of either congregation is to automatically tell the Pastor to stay or go. This can make a call decision very difficult because it doesn't really get to the heart of how a call is considered. It is better to know the reasons why one thinks the Pastor should stay or go. If you have such thoughts, please share them with me!

Please keep this call in your prayers and thoughts as I seek to follow the Lord's will concerning this matter.

**New Book:** Pastor Emeritus Daniel Fleischer has produced a new book entitled "Standing on the Wall-- A witness of faith in a dying world." The book is 468 pages, containing articles that he has written over the years, some of which appeared in the Lutheran Spokesman and many that have appeared in our church bulletin. The cost is \$15. If you are interested, there is a signup list by the guestbook. Pastor Fleischer will provide copies of the book and you may pay him directly.

The back cover reads: "Though Satan cannot prevail, we should expect that the billowing waves of unbelief and wickedness will increase and will continue to beat upon the foundation of the Church. Particularly disturbing to faithful disciples of the Lord and His Word is the reality that the winds of apostasy are also buffeting the Church in an effort to undermine its foundation and destroy it, if it were possible. We are witnessing precisely the circumstances spoken of by the apostle Paul who warned that the time would come that "from among yourselves men will rise up, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after themselves" (Acts 20:30). As the Lord God by His Spirit has established His Church on earth, we rest securely in the knowledge and faith that the Church, as God's Word itself, will endure and stand against all foes. That the Lord will protect and defend His Church does not excuse us, however, from heeding the same apostle's urging to "Watch, stand fast in the faith, be strong" (1 Corinthians 16:13). We pray that through the Word of our Lord God's people will be encouraged and strengthened to man the wall, be watchful, and shore up the dikes to the benefit of themselves and their children. We are grateful to the Lord if the book in hand helps the reader to hold fast the faithful Word with the confidence that the Lord through His Gospel will grant such strength in these latter days to all who call upon the name of the Lord in sincerity and in truth."

## **From Your Pastor Regarding the Divine Call:**

This last Sunday I received a divine call to serve as Pastor at Calvary Lutheran Church in Marquette, Michigan, a city in the Upper Peninsula along the shore of Lake Superior. This means I need to consider where the Lord would best have me serve Him in sharing the Gospel, either here with my calling at Grace, or there with my calling at Calvary.



In the Bible we learn that Pastors and other ministers of God's Word receive such a call from the Lord Himself through the Christian congregation. He establishes such servants for the purpose of doing His kingdom work here on earth. The Apostle Paul reminded the called servants at the congregation in Ephesus of this when he said: "Therefore take heed to yourselves and to all the flock, among which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to shepherd the church of God which He purchased with His own blood" (Acts 20:28).

Being that the Holy Spirit is the One who determines who is to be a minister and where he is to serve, we all need to recognize that a call consideration is a sacred matter. It is not something to take lightly or handle in a haphazard manner. We all should see it as the right of any congregation in our fellowship, even our own, to call Pastors to serve with the glorious message of Christ's love. A call to be Pastor is not like a regular job. It is a divine call from God Himself. Therefore, the decision is not based upon where the Pastor might like it better. There are two basic questions to consider:

1. What are the different ministerial needs of the two congregations, the one where the Pastor is currently serving and the one from which the Pastor received the call?
2. Where can the Pastor best use his God-given talents and abilities to best serve the Lord in His kingdom work?

When a Pastor receives such a call, it certainly has a profound impact on everyone involved, often holding the lives of many in suspense. Certainly in this case it would include the congregation at Calvary in Marquette, the congregation here at Grace, my family, and even myself. Some may even worry or become anxious about what may happen if the Pastor stays or goes. But as we hold on to the fact that the call is one from God, we can also be assured that His will and purpose are being carried out.
