The CLC Mission Helper Program, under the direction of the CLC Mission Board, is beginning to make preparations for another Group-Mission Trip to Nepal for the summer of 2017. The exact dates have yet to be determined, but the work was determined by our Savior when He told us to go into all the world and preach the Gospel.

The main focus of this trip will be proclaiming the Gospel, through a series of child evangelism lessons, to member and non-member children in village congregations of the Himalayan Church of the Lutheran Confession of Nepal.

For those with the necessary qualifications, there will also be opportunity to assist in the training and encouragement of pastors and seminary students.

Listed below are a few ways you can be involved:

**P**ray for this effort to share the love of Christ in South India. Ask the Lord for guidance and to show you how you can help spread the Gospel.

**B**egin planning, praying, and saving so you can travel to one of our foreign mission fields to help share the Good News of Christ crucified.

**O**ffer your financial support so others may participate. There are many things you will need to prayerfully consider as you think about volunteering for this trip. What follows is a short list that could be helpful in your consideration:

- The length of the trip will be approx. 3 weeks.
- The approximate cost is \$3000.00—\$3,500.00. This includes airfare and other expenses such as lodging, transportation, travel insurance, passports, visas etc. Vaccinations, anti-malaria meds, and other medical costs are not included in this figure.
- Participants must be at least 18 years of age (unless accompanied by a parent)
- An application accompanied by a letter of recommendation from your pastor will be required.
- Deadline for applications is January 13th, 2017.
- A \$2000 payment will be due in February.



## CLC Coordinating Council Devotion

*"God be gracious to us and bless us,  
And cause His face to shine upon us.  
That Your way may be known on the earth,  
Your salvation among all nations"* (Psalm 67:1-2).

When God brought the nation of Israel out of Egypt and established a covenant with them, He promised to bless the children of Israel. Aaron and his sons were tasked with announcing this promise to Israel, and God's people today continue to be assured of His blessing with those same words: *"The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make His face shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the LORD lift up His countenance upon you, and give you peace"* (Numbers 6:22-24).

God indeed richly blessed His people Israel, but the LORD's blessing promise is spiritual more than physical. His blessing promise was tied directly to the Savior through whom all the nations of the earth would be blessed (Genesis 12:3). Since the Fall into sin it was always God's desire to save all people, not just the people of Israel only.

In His divine wisdom God has chosen to use His people as the means of bringing His Word of Truth to the unbelieving world. God repeatedly brought Gentiles to faith through the preaching and the witness of His Old Testament people. For example, a Canaanite harlot in the city of Jericho was brought to trust in the LORD through the witness of two spies, and a woman of Moab came to know the true God through her mother-in-law. Consider how the LORD used the witness of Elijah to bring about the confession of the widow of Zarephath, *"Now by this I know that you are a man of God, and that the word of the LORD in your mouth is the truth"* (1 Kings 17:24). Remember how the LORD used a little girl as His ambassador to Naaman the Syrian, so that he proclaimed, *"Indeed, now I know that there is no God in all the earth, except in Israel . . . your servant will no longer offer either burnt offering or sacrifice to other gods, but to the LORD"* (2 Kings 5:15,17). The LORD sent the prophet Obadiah to the people of Edom, Jonah to the people of Assyria, and Daniel to the land of Babylon. Many of those Gentiles also came to believe in the promise of a coming Savior from sin. God blessed His people that His way and salvation would be known among the nations.

**From Victory unto Victory His Army Shall He Lead ...  
This Day the Noise of Battle, The Next the Victor's Song**

The Anglican clergyman, Michael Green, has written many books in his 89 years. Among the many are quite a number on evangelism one of which is "Evangelism in the Early Church." As a historian and Christian he wrote, "The enthusiasm to evangelize which marked the early Christians is one of the most remarkable things in the history of religions. Here were men and women of every rank and station in life, of every country in the known world, so convinced that they had discovered the riddle of the universe, so sure of the one true God whom they had come to know, that nothing must stand in the way of their passing on this good news to others. As we have seen, they did it by preaching and personal conversation, by formal discourse and informal testimony, by arguing in the synagogue and by chattering in the laundry. They might be slighted, laughed at, disenfranchised, robbed of their possessions, their homes, even their families, but this would not stop them. They might be reported to the authorities as dangerous atheists, and required to sacrifice to the imperial gods; but they refused to comply. In Christianity they had found something utterly new, authentic and satisfying. They were not prepared to deny Christ even in order to preserve their own lives; and in the manner of their dying they made converts to their faith." Oh for such a faith as this!

Look around you where you live and consider how the Christians are that you know. Look into your own heart and consider if you could be painted into the picture that Green paints of the early Christians.

We are the universal priesthood of all believers in action. As Peter wrote, ... "you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Pet. 2:9). God has not changed. Have we as Christians?

## **"HERE AM I. SEND ME. SEND ME."**

### **Read Luke 15:1-10**

When Jesus commissioned His Church to spread the Gospel,

He did not say "Grow!" He said "Go!"

When I was a boy, and I wanted to go someplace or do something, I pestered my parents with great enthusiasm. "Can I go? Huh? Can I? I'll clean my room. I'll go to bed on time. I'll eat Brussel sprouts. Please. Pretty please." This past week I thought: If only I had the same youthful enthusiasm to spread the Gospel of Christ to the lost. "Please, God, can I go? Huh? Pretty please?" Or in the words of the hymnist: "Here am I. Send me. Send me."

The question is not if we should go. The Lord told us to go, saying, "**Go, make disciples of all nations,**" Matthew 28:19. Rather, the question is: What will make us willing to go; willing to seize every opportunity to share Christ; willing to stand up and say, "Here am I, Lord. Send me. Send me"?

### **Gratitude**

A ministry to the lost does not begin in a church building; or in a voters meeting; or with an Excel spreadsheet delineating congregational revenues and expenditures. It begins in the heart. It begins when we see ourselves reflected in the words of Ephesians 5:1-5. "**As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world...All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature objects of wrath. But because of His great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions—it is by grace you have been saved.**"

These words describe each of us: once dead, now alive; once blind, now seeing; once deaf, now hearing; once lost, now found. And if we understand these words and take them to heart, how can we fail to leap to our feet, saying, "Thank you, God! Here am I. Send me. Send me"?

The great apostle Paul traveled thousands of miles to share the Gospel; founded many Christian churches; and endured enormous hardships for the sake of Christ. What made him so enthusiastic and determined to preach Christ? Gratitude for his own salvation. **“I thank Christ Jesus our Lord,”** he wrote, **“who has given me strength, appointing me to His service...Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the worst,”** 1 Timothy 1:12,15.

### **Commitment**

In the parables of Luke 15:1-10, when the shepherd realized one sheep was missing, did he wait for a convenient time to search? No. He searched immediately. Likewise, when the woman discovered one coin was missing, did she search halfheartedly? No. She searched diligently. In fact, every Greek word describing her search is in the present tense. She kept the lamp burning. She kept sweeping, scouring, cleaning. She kept looking under the sofa cushions and in the dark corners, until she found the one lost coin. That is commitment.

And nowhere is this ongoing commitment better exemplified than in the ministry of Christ Himself. **“Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues and preaching the good news of the kingdom,”** Matthew 9:35.

While Jesus always welcomed the multitudes that came to Him, first and foremost He went to them. Some of the most heartwarming accounts in Scripture are those of Jesus seeking out lost and lonely individuals: little Zacchaeus in the sycamore-fig tree; the Samaritan woman at Jacob’s well; the two grieving disciples on the road to Emmaus.

### **Urgency**

Why is Gospel outreach so urgent? Like that lost sheep and lost coin, there are many lost people in the world. Lost-ness, to coin a term, is always frustrating and at times horrifying. But no lost-ness is more dreadful than the lost-ness of not knowing God; not knowing Jesus Christ as Savior; not knowing the peace and forgiveness of the Gospel.

It is said that the evangelist, D.L. Moody, could not talk about hell without weeping. Do we have that same compassion for the lost? Look around. All the people you see are going to one of two places: heaven or hell. No exceptions. Isn’t that reason enough for urgency in our ministries? Isn’t that why we should raise our hands and say, “Here am I, Lord. Send me. Send me”?

And what a priceless message we have to share. Some of the most familiar and cherished passages in Scripture assure us that, when we believe in Christ as our Savior, we will never be lost.

**“For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have everlasting life,”** John 3:16. The Greek word translated as “perish” in this verse is the same word translated as “lost” in the parables of Luke 15. So literally: **“...that whoever believes in Him shall not be LOST but have everlasting life.”**

### **Joy**

My sister Paula and I took care of our ailing stepfather, Andrew Murphy, for several years. With his health in decline, there were times when we had to place him in a rehabilitation facility for medical treatment. On one occasion, Andy was in such a facility for two weeks. Every day he asked, “Can I go home now?” Every day we had to tell him, “No, Andy. Not yet. You haven’t been discharged.” This made him so sad.

But then the day came for his release. And as my sister and I pushed Andy down the long polished corridors of the facility—he was sitting in a wheelchair, with a blanket on his lap, and wearing his old floppy fishing hat—something remarkable happened. One by one, staff members fell in behind us, forming a joyful procession. They waved pom-poms. They blew party noisemakers. They chanted Andy’s name. They patted his bone-thin shoulders and shook his hand. They were celebrating, because Andy Murphy was going home.

I’ve often wished we would do the same—that we would shout, sing, blow noisemakers, and celebrate each time one repentant sinner comes home to God.

I know God does.
