NOTES ON THE MUSIC

The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns. A Presbyterian pastor in the Free Church of Scotland, John Brownlie (1859-1925) was educated at Glasgow University and at the Free Church College. Brownlie's contribution to church music was significant: he published three volumes of original hymn texts and several volumes of English translations of Greek and Latin hymns.

Salvation Unto Us Has Come. The theme hymn for this evening was written by Paul Speratus (1484-1551). In 1524 it appeared in the first published Lutheran hymnal, along with just seven other hymns. The verses fit well with the customary Epistle reading for Christmas Day (Titus 2:11-14) which is also heard tonight along with this hymn.

Angels We Have Heard on High. The lyrics of this familiar carol were written in 1862 by James Chadwick, paraphrased from the French song Les Anges dans nos campagnes. Paired with the hymn tune GLORIA, it quickly became popular and is still a favorite today. This setting was arranged by Joan Pinkston who holds an MA in piano performance and teaches composition at Bob Jones University in Greenville, SC.

Calypso Lullaby. Originally written in 1956 by Jester Hairston as a secular birthday song, he soon rewrote it as a Christmas song for the Hollywood Choir conducted by Walter Schumann. As *Mary's Boy Child*, it was popularized that same year by singer Harry Belafonte when it became the number one single in the UK and sold 1.2 million copies. The version here is by experienced arranger Joel Raney who has over 250 works in print. Raney lives in River Forest, IL (suburban Chicago).

The Road to Bethlehem. This piece by Argentinian composer Astor Piazzolla (1921-92) first appeared with a French text as *La Chanson de la Naissance* (Song of Birth). Piazzolla is best known for his development of Tango Nuevo through his many works that cross the boundaries between tango, jazz, and classical music. This arrangement, which is true to his original tune and harmonic scheme, shows many of these traits. The English text is by E. H. Geary.

Gesù Bambino. Pietro Yon (1886-1943) was a gifted Italian organist and composer. He began studying music on a high level at age six. By the time he was 21 he had studied in Milan, Turin, and Rome. In 1907 he came to New York to serve as organist of St. Francis Xavier Church until 1926 when he became organist at St. Patrick's Cathedral. Yon spent

the rest of his life in the United States, dying of a stroke in 1943 at age 57. *Gesù Bambino* is his most famous composition.

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel. The text of this beloved carol dates to the sixth century. It is based on a set of antiphons traditionally used in church liturgies on the seven days just before Christmas. The tune is an ancient chant melody. This popular arrangement by Alice Parker and Robert Shaw captures its beauty and simplicity.

Leave, Shepherds, Leave / *Quittez Pasteurs.* With lyrics dating to the 17th or early 18th century, this French folk song perhaps originated in the Anjou region. The carol's first appearance in English was in *The Oxford Book of Carols* (London, 1928). The melody is a Besançon melody also associated with the song 'Nanon dormait.' It is arranged here by Charles Herbert Kitson (1874-1944), an English organist, composer, and music educator who also wrote a popular choral setting of *Jesu, Grant Me This, I Pray.*

The Wexford Carol is so named being a folk carol from Enniscorthy in County Wexford, Ireland. Dating to the 15th or 16th century, it was transcribed in the 1920s by William Flood, cathedral organist in Enniscorthy, and published in *The Oxford Book of Carols* where it went on to reach a worldwide audience. It was brought to attention again in 1966 when Julie Andrews recorded a beautiful version of it that was distributed widely on the Firestone tire company's Christmas promotional records.

God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen. Roger Wagner (1914-1992) emigrated from France to the United States in 1921. By the time he was 12 years old, he was the organist at St. Ambrose Church in West Hollywood. Later he taught music at UCLA. In 1946 he founded the Roger Wagner Chorale in Los Angeles which went on to achieve worldwide recognition. In 1956 the chorale released "Joy to the World!" which became a legendary Christmas record. For many families in the United States, it wasn't Christmas until this album was played in their homes. This arrangement of "God Rest Ye Merry" is the one from that record.

Lo! How a Rose E'er Blooming. Hugo Distler (1908-1942) received his musical training from the Leipzig Conservatory in Germany, afterward becoming the organist of St. Jacobi in Lübeck in 1931. Distler later taught at the School for Church Music in Spandau, after which he became a professor of church music in Stuttgart. His musical style and harmony is distinctive, and while it can sound *avant garde*, it is very beautiful. Sadly, his works were stigmatized by the Nazi regime as "degenerate art." Distler's arrangement of *Lo! How a Rose* was recorded by the ILC Tour Choir in the mid 1970s under director Robert Dommer and can be found on their album *Good Christian Men, Rejoice!*

Motet VI. (*Lobet, den Herrn, alle Heiden*) is the sixth and last of Bach's choral motets. A motet is a (normally) shorter choral composition that takes a religious text other than a liturgical text of the church. These lyrics are those of Psalm 117, the shortest psalm and the shortest chapter in the Bible. The motet was not published until 1821, some years after Bach's death, when his music was revived by composers such as Samuel Wesley and Felix Mendelssohn. The *Alleluja* at the end is especially popular among high school and college choirs.

Sans Day Carol. Also known as the *St. Day Carol*, so named because it came from the village of St. Day in Corwall, England. The poem and its melody were first transcribed from the singing of Thomas Beard who lived in this parish. It is one of the many Cornish Christmas carols written in the 19th century, although some sources list it as a carol for Passiontide. It is closely related to *The Holly and the Ivy* and may actually be a variant of that song. The arranger of this setting is Joseph Martin, a native of North Carolina who has over 2,000 compositions currently in print.

Welcome to Our World. Songwriter Chris Rice explained that this wasn't originally intended to be a Christmas song but ended up becoming one: "It deals with the reality that God invaded our planet and became one of us, which is just astounding to me. I wrote about God coming to our world in a naïve way, knowing that it's not ours anyway, it's His. The thoughts that went through my head were about how tiny He was and how He came into the world just like the rest of us do."

Praise Ye the Lord of Hosts. Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921) was a French organist, composer, conductor, and pianist. At age 13 he was admitted to the Paris Conservatory of Music, the foremost music school in the country. At the age of 23 he wrote his *Christmas Oratorio* in less than two weeks and it was premiered on Christmas Eve 1858 in Paris. It is a medium-large work in 10 movements. Shorter than a standard oratorio, however, it can be sung in the space of a typical worship service and was probably intended to be done so. This is the closing chorus which takes its text from Psalm 96.

Silent Night. This arrangement was commissioned for the 2019 Christmas concert at Baylor University in Waco, TX. It features a lesser-known stanza of the carol and crescendos to a triumphant ending rather than keeping with the traditional peaceful and quiet style.
