



EDUCATING OUR CHILDREN IN THE WORD

The National Council on Bible Curriculum in Public Schools (we have looked at their web site) has prepared a curriculum that it claims is offered as an elective by more than 300 school districts in 37 states. It does get people into the Bible. If such a course acquaints some with the Bible who otherwise would not know it, it will serve a purpose. God's Word is powerful in itself. There are of course objectors to the Bible in the schools. While we are not proponents of Bible instruction in public schools our reservations are based on Scripture principles and out of concern for the preservation of the truth. The most strident objectors are driven by an anti Christian bias, political correctness, fairness, etc.

However, for those who claim that they want no religion in the schools to deny that there is in fact religion taught in the public schools is ludicrous. Not every teacher promotes it but secular humanism is systemic in the system. A woman speaking for the National Center for Science Education objected to any reference to "intelligent design," as an alternative to evolution saying, "It's not fair to privilege one religious viewpoint by calling it the other side of evolution" (*Caller-Times,* August 3, 2005). What this really means is, "We who believe in evolution do not want anything taught that contradicts us." It's amazing how proponents of evolution insist on claiming that they are the product of unintelligent happenstance, or an accident of nature.

Objections to the Bible being taught in public schools are voiced from different perspectives. The Texas Freedom Network (TFN) objects to the offering of the Bible curriculum in part because its reviewer "found the Bible is characterized as inspired by God, discussions of science are based on the claims of biblical creationists..." (Corpus Christi *Caller-Times*, August 2, 2005). The curriculum also suggests that the Bible instead of the Constitution is considered the nation's founding document. Another objection was from a minister of a Baptist congregation who said, "No public school student should have a particular religious belief forced upon them"(sic). Whatever else may have motivated his response, in principle we agree. However, someone might argue that since the course is an elective, it is not being forced upon students.

Be that as it may, we have another concern about what in some minds necessitates a Bible curriculum, elective or not, in the public schools. Are the children being taught in the home? Is the Word of God a staple in their developing years? Do they attend church with their parents? Are they taught the Word of God in Sunday school, instruction class, and Bible Class? Do they make use of the opportunities to attend? Is it a commentary on the failure of the churches to teach the Bible? Or are the parents sloughing off their responsibility toward their children to the schools?"

We would have strenuous objection to any denominational religious teaching being foisted on the youth of our church in a public school. Our youth have opportunities to learn the Word in home and church. Furthermore the question arises, "Who teaches religion in the public school. Is it a Catholic, a Baptist, a Methodist, or any number of different Lutherans?"

We live in a religious melting pot. Every religious philosophy is permitted in our society. We do not equate the Word of God with religious philosophy. Nevertheless

the reality is that we cannot and would not deny to anyone the right to teach and believe what he chooses, any more than we want anyone to deny us the privilege.

If in our environment every religious group wanted to teach its religion in the schools they could not be denied. If the right is granted to one church to teach its faith in the schools, then it must be granted to all. However, Christian parents who recognize that they are answerable to the Father for the children under their care do not want them indoctrinated in the teachings of heathenism, paganism, or pseudo-Christian teaching. For that reason we hold that the tenets of faith should be taught in home and church, and *lived* in the school and elsewhere.

Generic Christian schools of which there are myriad are not the answer. To expose our children to such schools (or schools of other dominations) undermines the fellowship principle upon which Scripture insists. To avoid the humanism of the public system does not justify setting aside Scripture in another area. Further, the name "Christian" does not guarantee that what is taught reflects what the Bible teaches, e.g. regarding conversion, the Means of Grace, sanctification, salvation, or judgment day, or any other doctrine recorded in Scripture.

De we want the Bible taught in the schools? Do we want it taught consistent with Scriptural principles and without interference or objection? The solution is a Christian Day School (there are 20 in the CLC). Yet many cannot have such a school. That means that we will want to make our Sunday school a real conduit for Bible teaching. It means further that parents dare not neglect the spiritual instruction of their children in the home. They will actively participate in the training of their children in the truths of God's Word. At the secondary level (there are 2 high schools), we encourage all our members to consider our Lutheran High School for their children. At Immanuel Lutheran High School all the instructors are committed to the Scriptures; all the classes have the foundation of the Word at the base. Chapel, evening and morning, is an avenue to give Scriptural instruction, comfort and guidance to the youth. Counseling is done with the Bible at hand, with the application of Law and Gospel. Discipline is expected, and when applied is done with the welfare of the individual soul at heart.

Home schooling is another alternative. Home schooling should not overlook Bible teaching! Where our children must attend public school, there it is **not a choice but a responsibility** of parents to keep on top of what their children are learning. But does this not prove that the Bible should be taught in public schools? No! Bible teaching is more than teaching creation. Bible teaching involves teaching the whole counsel of God, and even within Christian churches there is not agreement on what that is.

We cannot escape it. As parents, and assistants to the parents as a confessional Lutheran Church, the responsibility is ours to train up the Father's redeemed children in His Word. We will not be satisfied on judgment day to have let the extent of what our children know about the Bible be what they were taught through government schools. Perish the thought!

Standing fast and committed in word and practice to the truth is a challenge met only by the power and the grace of God. It is also the way of blessing for now and hereafter.
