

Sermon: Isaiah 6:1-8

(1) In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lifted up, and the train of His *robe* filled the temple. (2) Above it stood seraphim; each one had six wings: with two he covered his face, with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. (3) And one cried to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy *is* the LORD of hosts; The whole earth *is* full of His glory!" (4) And the posts of the door were shaken by the voice of him who cried out, and the house was filled with smoke. (5) So I said: "Woe *is* me, for I am undone! Because I *am* a man of unclean lips, And I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; For my eyes have seen the King, The LORD of hosts." (6) Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a live coal *which* he had taken with the tongs from the altar. 

How Great Thou Art



Sav-ior God to Thee, "How great Thou art! How great Thou art!"

LOVE:

As a <u>concept</u>, love is a much maligned and abused sentiment . As a <u>word</u> describing a concept it is frequently misused. We can describe the abuse of it as a concept by referring to the idea that goes something like this, "If you really loved me you would..." Children frequently use that line in response to a parent's, "No." It is also abused when it is suggested that it is love to compromise truth in the interest of keeping a church together as in, "If you really love the brethren you will not leave our church." The word itself is certainly misused by the world enamored by the Hollywood perversion of what love is.

Scripture of course speaks of "love" a great deal. In 1 Corinthians 13 it is a key word. Unfortunately the KJV translates the Greek word *agape* with the word "charity." The lexicon does define one of the meanings as "benevolence" which suggests charity. With today's concept of charity however, it is better translated in Corinthians with its root meaning, "love." The same word is the same that is used in John 3:16 - "God so loved the world..."

Note now what it says: If I "remove mountains, and have not love, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not love, it profits me nothing. Love suffers long, and is kind; love envies not; love vaunts not itself, is not puffed up, Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeks not her own, is not easily provoked, thinks no evil; Rejoices not in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth; Bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away...And now abides faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

The epitome of love, of course, is God. "God is love" (1 John 4:8). God's love was not and is not conditioned by man's reaction to His love or man's response to it. God loves because He is love! In love He sent His Son. Christ Jesus is the incarnate Love of God, the One in Whom we see and know the love of God. Jesus is the One through whose meritorious sacrifice the Father embraces us in love. Further, God manifested His love to us in sending the Holy Spirit Who through the means of grace called us to faith so that we might be the children of God. The love of God is not simple affection. The love of God toward us is the love that loved the unlovable! What did man do to endear himself to God, which in turn moved Him to send His Son into the world? Nothing! Scripture tells us that the Heavenly Father manifested His love to mankind in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8)!

Without the love of God as described briefly above, all love is selfserving, selfish, and calculated. One who by unbelief rejects the embrace of God's love loves as the world defines love. The love of the world can be characterized by, "If you will love me, I will love you." That is not the love that reflects the love of God. It is not the love that characterizes the faith to which we are called in Christ. It is the nature of the regenerate man within us to love as we have been loved.

Yet by reason of our clinging flesh in time, the apostle reminds us what sets us off from the world in this regard. Speaking in tongues was a source of pride among the Corinthians; without love that gift had a hollow sound. If they had the gift of prophesy or preaching and "have all faith," to move mountains, without love there is nothing of which to boast.

Love is patient and kind. Love does not boast of itself. It is not rude or envious; and does not think the worst of the neighbor. Love steps aside for the neighbor. We read, that love "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (13:7). Love does not challenge the boundary between right and wrong. If Christian love is a reflection of the love of God it cannot call right wrong, or wrong right; it cannot approve of sin or find pleasure in iniquity and error. At the same time, it does not muck rake, or rejoice when evil befalls the neighbor. Paul concludes the chapter in praise of love. "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love" (13:13.

The comfort of the Christ believer is that in our failures to love as we have been loved, the love of the Lord God toward us never ceases. In Christ, and for the sake of Christ's sacrifice He continues to love us, and in that love daily embraces us as the scorned father embraced the prodigal upon his return (Luke 15). We can count on God's grace.

How wonderfully this love of God plays out in the lives of Christ believers in the fellowship of a Christian congregation. Christ believers within the fellowship will not think the worst of another; they will be patient with the weak, and strenuous in their reaching out to the hurting and to the afflicted. They will have deep concern for the erring and for the indifferent, and exercise themselves in seeking to encourage the endangered souls- always in a spirit of humility. "Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus..." (Philippians 2:5).

The love of God is manifest also in our family relationship as we live together as spouses to the glory of God who has united us, and in relationship to the family with whom we are blessed. Satan daily seeks to introduce selfishness, impatience toward another, envy, and pride. We overcome the devil through repentance and trust in the love of God toward us. Within the family love does not ask, "What have you done for me lately?" It asks, "What can I do for you?" In a family we can provide all the material things for one another, but that which is most precious is priceless. Love is not simply a concept. It is action! Love expends itself – think of Jesus- but brings great return, because in our relationships love given always returns again.

We love God because He first loved us. Oh, how he loved us, and loves us! How blessed we are to be able to return that love to Him through loving one another. How blessed we are to be of the faith that knows that of all His gifts, and of all the activities in which we are engaged as His children, "the greatest of these is love." (By Rev.
