- ◆ Thanks: to Pastor Daniel Fleischer for sharing the Word of God with us today! Since Pastor Fleischer was in the area, he offered to preach. He is a former pastor at Grace Lutheran. He and his wife, Barb, live in Corpus Christi, TX.
- ◆ Among Us: Lyle LaCroix had to have emergency brain surgery Sunday night. Apparently he had some bleeding, not from a stroke, but possibly from one of his falls due to fainting spells. He is at the U of MN medical center. Doctors are still trying to figure out why he has been fainting. Also Linda Wagner moved back home on Tuesday, but with long-term care provided by a full-time health care attendant. As you may recall, she broke two ribs about 2 weeks ago and has dementia. Shauna Rhinesmith's and Brandt Wendland's mother, Tonya, has been experiencing incredible pain, becoming immobile over the past couple of months. The doctors think it may be rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, or some other autoimmune problem, but she will be seeing a specialist in another week or so.

APPRECIATING THE SUBSTANCE OF OUR LITURGY

We have said it before, and we reiterate it - Scripture does not outline for us the form of the liturgy that we use in our services. The form of the liturgy falls within the area of Christian freedom. To insist that we must use a particular form goes beyond Scripture. Nevertheless, we insist on this, namely, that the liturgy is to be at all times based upon as well as drawn from Scripture. It is to be a statement of truth. In that it is conducted we trust "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost," it should glorify the Triune God.

Frequently conflict arises between the generations on any number of subjects related to life. The older generation is viewed as stuck in the past. The younger is viewed as trying to cast the past away. This conflict is nothing new, and it will continue. It is the nature of life. It also affects church life, and thus liturgical form and practice.

The challenge is to maintain in Christian love a balance between the old and the new. This is a challenge with a capital "C." We suggest it first begins with avoiding extremism on both sides as though somehow or other neither party to the discussion can profit from the liturgical form of the other. Is God's Word there? Where God's Word is there is blessing regardless of the form!

There is comfort in that with which one is acquainted. Even members of the younger generation will learn that as they become "seasoned citizens." In this context there is a comfort level with the liturgy with which many older people grew up. The liturgy of our church is beautiful

and meaningful because from the invocation to the benediction it is Gospel oriented. Whether chanted, spoken, or sung the Gospel is evident. Whether in old English or modern English- and there is reason to recognize the benefit of respectful yet modern English- the Gospel predominates. Whichever liturgy one prefers, the chief elements should remain- the



invocation, confession of sins, absolution, the sermon and its application, scripturally sound and substantive hymns, the benediction. The liturgy should be orderly, and not innovative for the sake of innovation. It is a challenge to put together a good and purposeful liturgy if one chooses to use one different from that which has been proven by time and experience. Not every pastor has this gift. A poorly ordered and poorly thought out liturgical change or service can indeed be detrimental to one's worship life and disturb the devotion of the hearer. If one is going to create an alternative to our historical liturgy we hope that it is just that, an alternative, and not replacement that buries the liturgy with which many are familiar in the dusty archives, never to be seen again.

It strikes this observer who has commented on it frequently that if the Lord called one from this life during our worship service it could be said that the individual died hearing the Gospel if he heard no more than the invocation and/or the absolution. That in itself commends appreciation of our historic liturgy, and that at very least careful attention be given when creating an alternative. This is one pastor who does not think that he can improve upon the past. The occasional changes utilized are minimal. In the view of some that may make this writer one of the sticks in the mud.

The blessing inherit in our liturgy also suggests that the worshiper should engage him or herself in participating in it. We want to be on guard against daydreaming, and against "vain repetition." By personal attentive participation parents should set an example and engage their children in the liturgical service to help them appreciate the



blessings of worship. It also suggests that frequently we explain our liturgy and not just assume that people know why we are liturgical, or understand the meaning and blessing of it.

"See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise... Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ ..." (Ephesians 5).
