REFORMATION LUTHERANISM:

In Acts 4 we read how the powers that be among the Jewish leaders were offended at the preaching of the resurrection by Peter and John. Furthermore they had declared that there is no salvation apart from Jesus Christ. Consequently they were arrested and put on trial. Their case was not helped by the fact that their bold and faithful preaching had gained converts. Further, by the power of God, the two disciples had healed a man.

Unbelief has no response to the truth and to the precious Gospel, or to the wonderful works of God other than intimidation and threat. "But so it spreads no further among the people, let us severely threaten them, that from now on they speak to no man in this name.' And they called them and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus." That would seem to be the end of it. But the disciples responded, "We cannot but

speak the things which we have seen and heard."

After the spiritual darkness of his youth, Luther was led through affliction, and by the power of the Spirit to see the light. The truth of God's Word dawned in his heart. He found the peace of heart for which he yearned. He did not come to this light and peace through the church, but in spite of the church. Once he found the righteousness that was his in Christ,



Luther's eternal hope and his ministry revolved around and promoted the Lord Jesus. He saw that in the struggle the very center of Christian doctrine was at stake. He could not and would not, in spite of intimidation and threat, back down from confessing Christ and His Word. In the years following the genesis of the Reformation in 1517 Luther exhibited boldness for the truth even in the face of death threats. But to be a heretic was more abhorrent to him than death. He said, "I know that I would be the most agreeable and the dearest person if I were to say this one word *revoco*, that is, I recant. But I will not turn heretic by contradicting the opinion which made me a Christian. I would rather die by fire or be exiled and cursed" (WLS, Vol.III, page 1184). As in the days of the apostles when unbelief had no other response than to threaten persecution and death, Luther's whole ministry was carried out under the ban and threat of the papacy. But the Lord whose gospel was at stake, preserved Luther from harm, though he was called to his eternal rest at the age of 63. He died of natural causes-one last stick in the eye of his foes!

Now 490 years after the Reformation, what Luther and subsequent faithful confessors were ready to die for, is being surrendered upon the altar of compromise and accommodation which is nothing less (or more) than apostasy. In Luther's day the foe was the papacy. Today it remains the papacy, but inextricably it has also become an apostate Lutheranism. Reformation Lutheranism (Scripture Alone! Grace Alone! Faith Alone!) is for the most part a thing of the past. At the risk of being branded pharisaical by the enemies of the truth, we dare to say we are trying desperately to hold on to the truth, not for

the sake of orthodoxy itself, but for the sake of our souls and the precious blood bought souls for whom Christ died and whose salvation He desires. God will see to it. His Word will endure! But it is a serious matter. Will it remain among us, and do we even care!?

The gospel and its witness outlasted the enemies of the apostles. It survived the attacks at the time of the Reformation. It will survive through our apostate age, and out live us. Indeed it will continue to the end of time. God will see to it. But we cannot, we dare not, be silent about what we have seen and heard of the magnificent grace of God. We do not live in a vacuum. The eternal welfare of our souls and of others depends upon the proclamation of an unadulterated Gospel. "Dear Father, forgive us our sins. Be gracious to us and help us in these latter days, for without Thee we cannot stand by reason of our own weakness as well as the temptations of the evil one who seeks our overthrow. Help us to be true Reformation Lutherans and keep us in the way of truth while we await our deliverance to heaven. Amen."
