MOVING ON TO THE CROSS:

Historically in our fellowship, the Lutheran Church has set aside evenings during the Lenten season to contemplate the passion of our Lord Jesus Christ. In doing so we are addressing the foundational purpose for which Jesus came into the world.

Jesus had as His intent the will to return to His Father. But toward this conclusion when He would ascend to heaven, there were important events that must occur. Before the grand and glorious return, Jesus must face the anguish and sorrow of the cross. For this cause He had come into the world that He should offer His life a ransom for all. To the fulfillment of His purpose, nothing deterred Jesus. We read in Luke, "When the time had come for Him to be received up, [that] He steadfastly set His face to go to Jerusalem" (9: 51). The way to glory was on the path of suffering for our Lord. One has said, "We set out with determination to achieve advantages for ourselves, He to undergo death for our sakes" (Arndt, *Luke* Commentary, page 274). Our Lord Jesus sacrificed His life on the cross to redeem us unto God, and to reconcile us to God by His blood. Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners from everlasting condemnation. He came to give us life and in that giving to give us hope!

The next big festival of the Church is Easter when we celebrate the resurrection of Christ from the dead. But the celebration of the resurrection of our Lord is but a hollow sound unless we recognize and appreciate what preceded it. To celebrate Easter without remembering or appreciating the whys and wherefores of what precedes is the way the world celebrates Easter.

It may be a matter of degrees but surely the times in which we live are unprecedented in many ways. We are surrounded by a deterioration of principles and morals. On every side is deceit and greed. National life and personal lives are subject to machinations of those who would do us harm to satisfy self. Matters of faith - even the meaning and purpose of Christmas and Easter- are subject to private interpretation. The Christian faith is ill spoken of. The uncertainty of the times spawns fear and hopelessness.

Christ set His face to go to Jerusalem. His single-minded purpose was noticed so much so that He was not welcome in the village (Luke 9:53). Yet Jesus had compassion on the villagers, "For the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives, but to save them" (9:56). We are among those whom He came to save by paying the debt we owed the Father, and with willing heart giving His life for us!

Surely nothing is so important in our life and activity that we cannot give up a couple of hours to gather with family and our fellow Christians in Lenten services as well as in Sunday service to remember His sacrifice, and in so remembering to worship Him without whose steadfastness to purpose and without whose rich compassion we would be among those who live in fear in this world because they are without hope for the next.

A BLIZZARD ON CALVARY

Did you know that it snowed on Mt. Calvary when Jesus was crucified? In drawings and paintings that help us visualize our

Lord's crucifixion we see dark clouds and flashes of lightning, but seldom do we see precipitation of any kind, especially not snow. And truth be told, none of the Gospel writers record anything about snow.

But that doesn't change the fact that with every twinge of pain in Christ's body there came down another flake of pure, white snow. It was a snowstorm, not just a flurry. We might even call it a blizzard. For when Jesus



had felt all the pains of body and soul that our sins had earned, there over the blood red field of the world's sinfulness lay a thick blanket of white. This snowy blanket of Christ's suffering covered all the misspoken words and misshapen deeds that mankind had ever created. By the time the storm subsided the snow was so deep, that not even the pudgy shapes of those evil things could be seen from above. All was smooth, and white, and pure, and new.

Perhaps you feel a recurring twinge of regret over some foolish word you once spoke. Perhaps you are saddened by some hurtful thing you once did. Remember the snow on Mt. Calvary. Even the outline of that sin in gone, buried in the avalanche of Christ's suffering, covered over by the blanket of His righteousness.
