#### THE ORDER OF WORSHIP &

Worship Preparation: Lather's Morning Drayer

C: In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen. I thank You, my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have kept all harm and danger away from me last night; and I pray that You would also protect me today from sin and every evil, that my life and all my behavior may please You. Into Your hand I entrust my body and soul and everything else. Let Your holy angel be with me, that the devil may have no power over me. Amen.

P: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

P: Let us prepare our hearts for our confession of sins:

SING(3): The Law is good; but since the Fall Its holiness condemns us all; It dooms us for our sin to die

And has no power to justify. (TLH 295:5)

P: Let us confess our sins before the Lord God. With what words does Jesus teach us to pray in the Lord's Prayer?

C: Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

In1541 Luther wrote the hymn, "Lord, keep us Steadfast in Thy Word" (TLH 261). This hymn has undergone different translations. This is the first stanza of the hymn:

"Lord, keep us in Thy Word and work, Restrain the murderous Pope and Turk, Who fain would tear from off Thy throne Christ Jesus, Thy beloved Son" (What Luther Says, Note, Vol.III p. 1201).

Today we are confronted by forces no less intent on robbing us of the Word of God and the sweet comfort of the Gospel. Islam is on the ascendency again. Extremists within it are bent on applying the teachings of the *Koran* that speak of death to unbelievers—any who do not adopt Islam. They demand rights for their philosophies that they will not grant to Christians and the Bible! The papacy still promotes the idea of no salvation outside the Catholic Church, and still condemns the doctrine of salvation by grace through faith in Christ alone. Its intent is still to gather the so-called "separated brethren" under its umbrella. Secularism and humanism—consider the emphasis on evolution with all its evil effects—is rampant in our society. It is the religion of the masses. Lutherans who stand fast in doctrines of Scripture and in the Reformation confession are becoming fewer and fewer in our day as many who dare to call themselves Lutheran have by reason of indifference, ignorance or plain rejection cast aside the eternal truth and doctrines of Scripture which no longer satisfy their reason or suit their agenda.

Luther wrote, "The pen, not the fire, is to put down heretics. The hangmen are not doctors of theology. This is not the place for force. Not the sword, but the Word fits for this battle. If the word does not put down error, error would stand, though the world were drenched with blood" (Quote in Krauth, page 174).

The *question we must face* and to which *we must react* in the last age of this world and the dying days of confessional Lutheranism in this country is "Do we respect the fullness of God's Word recorded for us in the Bible, and are we ready to hear it, defend it, and hold fast to it?"

We have the promise of the Father. He will uphold His children. In the long and difficult struggle, what time we are afraid we may flee to Him (Psalm 56:3). Unless we ourselves have become guilty of doubting His Word we can look to the hills to find help in time of need (Psalm 121). From the heights He Who is with us always will be our Refuge and Strength (Psalm 46). For the days and the struggles that lie ahead, the poet (St. Columba: 521-597) puts everything in perspective:

Christ hath our host surrounded With clouds of martyrs bright, Who wave their palms in triumph, And fire us for the fight. For Christ the cross ascended To save the world undone, And suffering for the sinful Our full redemption won.

#### **REFORMATION: October 31, 1517**

It is a date cherished by faithful Lutherans. Nothing more can be written that has not already been written. Nevertheless, it is important that through writing and speaking we remind ourselves of the great blessings that grew out of Martin Luther's bold action when he posted the 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg. It has long been acknowledged that the Reformation which grew out of one bold act of one man—under the hand of the Lord God to be sure—changed the political, social, cultural, and educational scene of the day. One Catholic writer wrote years ago, "It is not incorrect to say, that Luther has been the restorer of liberty in modern times" (Quote in *The Conservative Reformation and its Theology*, CP Krauth, page 3).

Those cultural and social results born of the Reformation however were not on the mind of the insignificant monk who posted the theses. His purpose was to rid the church of the stifling tradition of papal authority which impeded the free flow of the Gospel. In 1530 Luther said, "We are asking for nothing more, nor have we ever asked for anything more, than the free Gospel" (What Luther Says, Vol. 3, 3778, p.1184). Luther tortured by an accusing conscience and fearful of God as he knew Him had no peace and found no release under the papacy. As he read the Scriptures, he recognized that there is no saving doctrine except the Gospel—the message of eternal salvation in Christ Jesus! It was not long after Luther's bold action in Wittenberg that it came clear that papal authority and the free flow of the Gospel could not coexist.

While we remember Martin Luther with appreciation for his boldness and his steadfastness, we praise the Lord who called the troubled monk to service. We respect the Reformation when we look behind Luther and recognize that he was not the author of it but God's servant to it. Krauth wrote, "The Word of God was the creator of the Reformation and its mightiest instrument ... The Word of God kindled the fire of the Reformation. That Word lay smoldering under the ashes of centuries ... Through the centuries which followed the corruption of Christianity, the Word of God was still in being" (Page 6). The fact that the Word of God was still extant was a divine blessing as well as an expression of divine faithfulness, for the Lord Himself said that His Word would not pass away.

Through history however efforts have been made by evil men to suppress the Word. Prior to the Reformation the church under papal authority as well as the Turk (Muslim) each for their own purpose opposed the Lord and His Word. History bears out that the doctrines and religious philosophies advanced by those opposed to the Word of God cannot stand on their own merit. Consequently both pope and Turk resorted to threat, and intimidation, and even force.

- P: How did Luther explain this in his answer to the question, "What does this mean?"
- C: We pray in this petition that our Father in heaven would not look on our sins nor deny our prayer because of them. We are not worthy of things for which we are asking, neither have we deserved them. However, we ask that our Father would by His grace give us what we ask even though we sin often every day and indeed deserve nothing but punishment. We too will from our hearts gladly forgive and do good to all those who sin against us.
- P: Be it unto you as you believe. And now according to the command of my Lord Jesus Christ, and in His place, I forgive you all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

SING(I): The Gospel shows the Father's grace,
Who sent His Son to save our race,
Proclaims how Jesus lived and died
That man might thus be justified. (TLH 297:1)

Note: Islamic aggression is nothing new. Muslim armies were encroaching Europe in the sixteenth century, to the point that Germans feared an imminent and perhaps successful Muslim invasion. In 1529, Martin Luther wrote "On the War Against the Turk (Muslim)", weighing in on Catholics, the Crusades, Islam, and the proper response to Islamic aggression. Here is just a brief quote:

The great need of our time should have moved us to this prayer against the Turk, for the Turk, as has been said, is the servant of the devil, who not only devastates land and people with the sword, as we shall hear later, but also lays waste the Christian faith and our dear Lord Jesus Christ. For although some praise the Turk's government because he allows everyone to believe what he will so long as he remains the temporal lord, yet this reputation is not true, for he does not allow Christians to come together in public, and no one can openly confess Christ or preach or teach against Mohammed. What kind of freedom of belief is it when no one is allowed to preach or confess Christ, and yet our salvation depends on that confession, as Paul says in Romans 10, "To confess with the lips saves," and Christ has strictly commanded us to confess and teach his gospel.
