THE INFLUENCE OF POLITICAL CORRECTNESS IN THE CHURCH

As citizens of this heretofore free country, we appreciate the right to speak our heart and mind freely. We cherish the freedom of speech, even if in the exercise of it we must tolerate foolishness that frequently passes for such speech. We suspect that we have all been guilty of inanities and foolishness that both offends and abuses the proper exercise and right of free speech. Nevertheless, as children of God we should recognize the responsibility attached to exercising the right of free speech! Therefore as Christians we should surely guard our tongue to avoid using our freedom of speech to offend, hurt, slander, defame or in some fashion harm our neighbor (8th Commandment). When we speak the truth, and speak it we must, our speech is to be "with grace, seasoned with salt" (Colossians 4:6). Such speech is "speech marked by Christian taste and tact" (Franzmann).

Observers of the daily life in America recognize that this country is being strangled with the rope of political correctness. The only ones who do not agree with that assessment are the promoters of it. They, who cry loudest when in their mind their right to free speech is violated, are the same ones who are killing the freedom of speech by the promotion of political correctness. Political correctness has become a tool through which opposite opinions are suppressed and a tool through which freedoms are being lost. Even the weight of the law has been marshaled in favor of political correctness. We suspect that political correctness cops monitor what is spoken in the church. For example, to speak about the sin of homosexuality is now looked upon as hate speech. The church that promotes the Scriptural teaching of marriage as one man and one woman is the object of scorn and ridicule. Even as sin and evil can be propagated in the name of free speech, so suppression and evil lurks under cover of political correctness.

As the church is less and less influential in the world, it is more and more being influenced by the world. The underlying reason is the lack of respect in the church for the God of Scripture as well as the Word which the Lord God has recorded in Scripture. Whether the departure from the Word has opened the door to political correctness in the church, or political correctness has infiltrated the church so that it has given up the Word, the result is devastatingly the same. Within much of Christendom it is considered extreme and unloving (politically incorrect) to teach what Scripture teaches concerning sin: churches countenance abortion, promote homosexuality, accept living in (playing house) outside of marriage. Even many who still profess to be Lutheran have in weakness or with intention cast aside the divinely established principle that the exercise of the pastoral ministry and authority is restricted to men. To a great extent the church has adopted the principle that if you can't beat them, then join them. Call it political correctness or whatever you will; they are guilty of false doctrine well as of misleading precious souls.

Further, to a great extent the church in the world has scuttled its divinely appointed responsibility to preach the Word of God in truth and purity and to share the unadulterated Gospel, with Christ and the means of grace at the core of it. The vacuum has been filled with more and more social orientation. The church in the world has become more politically involved in society itself, as well as political in the administration of its own affairs. If we are fearful of the consequences because we dare to speak against what one has called, "the world in the church," we are in danger of becoming one with the apostate church.

Is one of the reasons that we might shrink from straight talk about what is happening in the world and in the church this ... that we do not want to be looked on as Pharisees or as ones who present ourselves as "holier-than-thou"? We should expect that! But are we not called upon to tell the truth and bear the consequence? We know full well what Scripture says about taking the beam out of our own eye before removing the splint out of another's (Matthew 7:4). So let us acknowledge here and now that in our own lives and in our own church the world has succeeded all too often to bend our thoughts to reflect the sinful nature rather than the mind of our Redeemer God. As we repent of our sins, we should not shrink from inviting scrutiny of our personal life and the life of our church! We ask only that they who would judge us for calling sin what it is, measure our teaching, practice, and life in the light of God's Word.

Satan wins when we speak from a heart of rancor or from a heart of pharisaical pride. But he also wins when he succeeds in "shutting us up" because, from an attitude of political correctness or out of fear of how we will be perceived, we fail to speak the truth! If what is taught is contrary to God's Word and what is practiced is against God's Word we must speak the truth.! How we speak is important--remember "with grace, seasoned with salt"-- but to speak the truth is not hate speech!

The apostle Paul spoke plainly of those who preached another gospel. He said, "For do I now persuade men, or God? Or do I seek to please men? For if I still pleased men, I would not be a servant of Christ" (Galatians 1:6-10). Paul was not uncaring about his neighbor (Roman 9:1-5). But if a choice had to be made between pleasing men or pleasing God, he had no choice. He had to speak the truth!

We reflect love of God and hallow His name "When the Word of God is taught in its truth and purity, and we, as the children of God, also lead a holy life according to it." We pray, "This grant us, dear Father in Heaven." Political correctness in society is dishonest. Political correctness in the church begets false doctrine! "He that teaches and lives otherwise than God's Word teaches, profanes the name of God among us." To that we can only add, "From this preserve us, Heavenly Father" (First Petition).

May the God of peace, and the God of truth, Who has fulfilled every promise to us in Christ Jesus, keep us strong in faith unto eternal life, honest in word and deed, ready to speak the truth in love, and on guard against the influences of the world and the apostate church, to the glory of His name and the welfare of ourselves and our neighbor.
