ANOTHER ADVENT

The first Sunday of Advent is the beginning of the new church year. While it ushers in the Christmas season, the thoughts of the season direct our heart and mind in two directions, both of which are connected with the coming of Christ. Advent is a time of preparation for celebration of the Savior's birth which occurred 2013 years ago, as well as for the coming of the Savior at the end of time which from our perspective lies in the future known only to God. We like to think of the season in these terms: *contemplation, preparation, anticipation*.

CONTEMPLATION: Contemplation may be defined as attentive consideration. Advent invites us to attentively consider the faithfulness of our Father in heaven, the blessings of our Savior's birth, as well as His anticipated return. Such contemplation begins with consideration of what from the Father's perspective necessitated the Savior's birth. Unless we recognize this—which the world does not—celebration of Christmas is but a charade signifying nothing.

What necessitated the Savior's birth was our sin. Sin destroyed the relationship that Adam and Eve, and in them all mankind, had with God. It was a relationship of perfect harmony between the Creator and the created! God was pleased to be called their Father, and they were pleased to call Him Father. However, in an incomprehensible moment Adam and Eve listened to another voice than that of their Father, and followed a foreign god—the devil, Satan. Bible Christians know the event recorded in Genesis 3. In a twinkling of an eye, the relationship of the Creator and the created changed. Death and separation occurred, and fear overtook Adam and Eve. When their Father did as He always had done—He walked and talked with them in the garden—they hid from their Father. The spiral toward judgment had begun!

When we say that our sin necessitated the Savior's birth, that is not to say that the Father was under any compulsion to rescue man. He could well have washed His hands of the fallen creation. But the Father is not vindictive. He promised a Savior, His own Son, through whom He determined to reconcile the sinner unto Himself (2 Corinthians 5:19)! The Father could not go back on His judgment against sin, but He determined to exact from His Son the penalty man deserved. Upon Jesus, "He laid the iniquity of us all" (Isaiah 53:6).

Through centuries the Father nurtured His promise; patiently He endured the weakness and foibles of His people. He exercised discipline to rescue His people from their sinful wanderings, until finally the time had come that He would redeem His promise by sending the Savior.

A meaningful Advent observance is one that is manifest by repentance in the lives of all who recognize their sin and its horrible consequence. We have sinned as we confess each Sunday – in thought, in word, and in deed. We further observe Advent with thankful hearts that God demonstrated His loving and unqualified faithfulness and love according to the dictates of His own heart—faithful in sending the Savior, and faithful in giving salvation to as many as call on His name. Because He is faithful, we celebrate Christmas with joy and thanksgiving as we wait with confidence for the return of our Lord Jesus!

PREPARATION: To celebrate is to commemorate a meaningful event; to sound the praises of, and to make known publicly the accomplishment of a notable person. Such celebration requires *preparation*. Advent is a time during which we prepare our heart for a meaningful, respectful, and blessed celebration of our Father's faithfulness in keeping His promise. We prepare our heart for the celebration of the birth of the most notable personage born on earth in the person of the incarnate Lord Jesus Christ.

As we worship in spirit at the manger side, we celebrate with the shepherds the birth of the Child born of the Virgin Mary according to promise. As the shepherds returned to the fields, they praised Him Who rescued mankind from the dark hole of judgment that we may stand in the marvelous light of eternity. We praise Him as they.

Further, we celebrate the accomplishment of the Savior Who coming in the form of man made no boast of His equality with God (Philippians 2:6), but was like us in every regard except for sin. We prepare our hearts to receive Him whose perfect life, shed blood, vicarious death, and glorious resurrection accomplished what He was sent to do. He broke down the wall of separation which man had constructed. Jesus is the manifestation of the smiling face of a reconciled Father, whose face was hidden from us because of sin (Isaiah 59:2).

We do not celebrate Jesus' birth haphazardly or flippantly, or as an add-on to a commercial excuse for a holiday. Advent is a time of penitence, and a time of reflection on what the Father has done for us. So as not to lose the significance of what we are about to celebrate, or lose the blessing of Jesus' birth, we take seriously the words of John, the Baptizer, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." John echoed the words of Isaiah, saying, "The voice of one crying in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord; make His paths straight" (Matthew 3:2-3; cf. Isaiah 40). That is one part of our preparation for a blessed Christmas celebration. The other is the public praise to which we are encouraged, "O Zion, You who bring good tidings, Get up into the high mountain; O Jerusalem, You who bring good tidings, lift up your voice with strength, lift it up, be not afraid; Say to the cities of Judah, 'Behold your God!' Behold, the Lord GOD shall come with a strong hand, and His arm shall rule for Him; Behold, His reward is with Him, and His work before Him. He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, and carry them in His bosom, and gently lead those who are with young" (Isaiah 40:9-11).

They who with penitent heart have prepared for the Christmas celebration, and have imbibed the meaning of the Savior's birth are filled with our third Advent word –

ANTICIPATION: As Jesus' birth lies in the past, we *anticipate* His coming again, not in the lowliness of His birth, but in the glory of heaven. We anticipate, and look forward patiently (perhaps not so patiently?), for the return of the Lord Jesus Christ at the end of time. Such anticipation is manifest through *daily repentance*, and *faith* in the promises of the faithful God, as well as in the accomplished salvation which Jesus won for us.
