

Appreciating a Christian School Education

As we begin, let us lay to rest some misconceptions:

- → We have never claimed that one has to go to Immanuel College or High School (ILC), or be a member of the Church of the Lutheran Confession to be saved.
- → We do not claim that teachers at ILC are better than those in the government (public) schools.
- → We do not claim that students at ILC are better than those who attend public schools, or that they are more Christian than those who attend government schools.
- → We do not claim that children who attend ILC are better, more pious, or "holier" than those who don't.
- → We do not deny that there are temptations at ILC, or claim that students are less sinful at ILC.
- We do not claim that parents who send their children to ILC love their children more than those who don't.

What commends an education at Immanuel? Simply this: children who attend Immanuel (or our CLC grade schools) are in an educational environment in which the foundation of their education is the Word of God, and the teachers are under call of the Lord, to whom they responsible. The *public system* does not acknowledge the Word of God, and could not if it wanted to. Many fine teachers in the government system are confessing Christians but, as teachers in the system, through no fault of their own they are not permitted to witness to the things of God. In our Christian schools there is no such restriction!

The Word of God is armor against temptation (Ephesians 6). The Word of God gives understanding of the weakness of the flesh that clings to all humans. The Word of God is a shield with which to quench the darts of the devil who works night and day to deceive the children of God. The Word of God gives the Christian the power to discern right from wrong, and is the weapon against Satan and his enticements (Matthew 4). The Word of God in the Gospel assures the student of the forgiveness of sins in Christ Jesus when he or she falls. Yes, we trust and expect that in every Christian home the Word of God is the prevailing education; but our school(s) *helps* the parents in exercising their God-given responsibility toward the children that God has placed in their care.

The subject matter in classes in our Christian schools prepares the students for making their way as productive citizens in society. But the subject matter from science to math to history, the languages, and whatever other discipline is taught, recognizes the hand of God. The Word of God gives a unique appreciation of creation, and our responsibility to care for it. The wonders of science are understood in a special way when science is taught, acknowledging and recognizing the handiwork of a providential God. The understanding of history is enhanced when it is accepted that all history is His-Story. Even the study of math is enhanced when it is understood that behind it is the wisdom and planning of the infinite Creator God.

The Word of God which is the foundation of our educational system gives the student wisdom to understand the will of God and the strength to say no to sin. It gives comfort to the troubled conscience when the student sins as he invariably will. Morality—sanctified living—is imparted through the Gospel

Word. The Word of God teaches that sanctified living is not the cause of our salvation (Salvation is by grace through faith in Christ alone), but is fruit born of the Father's saving grace in the heart. Does one have to attend Immanuel to learn that? No. These are things which we trust and expect faithful Christian parents are imparting to their children at home from the Word, and reinforcing for themselves and their children through careful attendance to Word and Sacrament in their congregation. But in the context of school educational experience, they are things that the government educational system by reason of ignorance, rejection, or law, cannot lay on the heart of students in the classroom. They are things which Immanuel as well as our congregational schools, faithful to their charter, teach!

Scripture enjoins that children be brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord (Ephesians 6:4). Scripture warns against offending "one of these little ones who believe" in the Lord (Matthew 18:6). The Lord is offended when children are denied His blessing (Mark 10:13-15). It is fact that heathen and totalitarian governments accept that the best way to perpetuate an ideology is to bend the minds and the will of the children at an early age. "The education of all children," as Karl Marx wrote, "from the moment that they can get along without a mother's care, shall be in state institutions at state expense." Marx's disciple, Vladimir llyich Lenin, concurred: "Give me four years to teach the children and the seed I have sown will never be uprooted."

Ought we not apply to a sanctified manner the same principle and bring up our children in God's Word from early youth, even as the Lord Himself instructs us? Therefore, it is essential that from the crib parents train up their children in the Word! And most surely when they are older and are sent off to school, *wherever it is*, Christian parents will be concerned about what is being taught their children.

We rejoice at the witness of Immanuel graduates who express appreciation for the education, training, and guidance received at Immanuel.

Not all parents may be able to utilize Immanuel or our Christian day schools. That is understood. Some choose not to. But surely we hope that no parent simply dismisses the thought without prayerful and careful consideration, especially in light of what follows--

Common Core is now being pushed as the new educational experiment. It is not a production of Washington DC though the finger prints of the present administration and bureaucrats are all over it. The states are theoretically in charge of their own Common Core curriculum. Some states reject participation; some which opted for it are now reconsidering; others are into it with both feet. Recently we shared information from the New York state educational department with some brethren. They will attest that the content was highly offensive. What was found was submitted to be shared for information only on the CLC pastoral forum. It was rejected (appropriately so) because of its unabashed and gross sexual references and questions! It bore the imprimatur of the educational commissioner of New York State.

Following are some references from on-line sources relative to Common Core. If you do not know if it is in your state, find out. If you are in a state where it is part of the educational platform being promoted, find out what it is and ask yourself whether you want your children subjected to it.

The education of our children is not something we can simply turn over to the state. And surely if we must use, or choose to use, government schools, parents should be involved and investigate what their children are being taught. Running our own educational program in the congregation or Immanuel is not easy. It is difficult on many levels, not the least of which is the opposition that is encountered within a society that by and large has no respect for the Word of God.

We look at education from a different perspective than the world which is concerned only with the here-and-now. Christ-believers look at education with an eternal perspective. While we strive to give our children the best education possible for the here-and-now, we want to prepare them for the day that the Lord will turn every human endeavor to dust and take home to heaven those who are alive in Him.

Such education begins in the home! Where better to support parental responsibility in this regard than in church and in our Christian schools.

Is attendance in one of our schools or at Immanuel, a guarantee of faithfulness and continued Christian conviction? No. Are students in our schools more faithful and of greater Christian conviction than those who attend government schools? We do not make such a claim. Have some who attended our schools kicked over the traces or even fallen from the faith. Perhaps. But our responsibility as parents and church is not to try to read the future. Our responsibility is to give our children every opportunity to prepare for the future through growth in faith which comes only through the sure and certain Word of God—the foundation of education at Immanuel.

We pray for all our parents and children that together they may grow in faith in Christ Jesus and be kept in the same. We pray for all whether in our schools or in the public system that as Christ-believers they will glorify the Lord in word and deed. We pray for our elementary schools and Immanuel (Eau Claire and Mankato) that they will be courageous in their witness and faithful to their task. We pray for the teachers in our schools that they will find joy in serving the Lord as they nourish the lambs in their care. We pray that with a spirit of humility and thanksgiving the CLC will remain faithful to the Word of God, and continue to be courageous in its Gospel witness in the face of growing opposition.

We pray for our students in our Christian schools as well as in government schools and ask that the Lord keep them all in His care, and make them strong witnesses of His grace and love. We thank the Lord for the expressions of appreciation as expressed by graduates of Immanuel for the blessing that came to them from the Lord through the faithful service of Christian parents and teachers.
