

"AT HOME IN THE CEMETERY"

Dear beloved, please allow me yet a retiring pastor's postscript to his flock:

A few moments ago I suggested that Christians with their Easter faith can confidently "whistle past the cemetery/graveyard." If someone is "whistling past the graveyard," they are trying to remain cheerful in tough times, in difficult circumstances. It's kind of like when a person is trying to ignore a bad situation and we say they are "whistling in the dark." That can have both negative as well as positive connotations. This Easter day I suggest to you that when the unbelieving "whistle" past the graveyard, they are fooling

themselves with false hope or with no afterlife hope at all. By contrast, those who believe and confess the Christian faith can, like Job, Paul, all the other apostles and prophets, and countless Christians down through the centuries "whistle a happy tune past the cemetery" for they KNOW that their Redeemer lives, and so shall they also rise triumphantly from the dead.



Anyhow, before donning my retirement mantle, I'd like yet to lay on your hearts how important it is to be "At Home in the Cemetery." What does THAT phrase mean? I recently came upon a quote from a Christian theologian who wrote that he did not know many living people but he 'would feel at home in any cemetery.' Here's how he explained it: "This is a vivid way of picturing one's possession of the past. To 'feel at home in any cemetery' is one of life's great prizes. More and more people today seem not to be a home in any cemetery. They live in one tense, the present...." He continues: "Failure to be at home in the cemetery—that is, living without a sense of the past or knowledge of it—brings dire results. For the home of the truly living is in the cemetery..." Then adding this insightful comment: "It is the fashion among many today to be so eager to overtake the day after tomorrow that they have no time to catch up with the day before yesterday. Those who do not know the past are bound to repeat its errors...."

How would I expand on this? I submit to you, beloved, that the Bible basis for what the man writes is a passage like "Remember those who have spoken the Word of God to you, whose faith follow, considering the outcome of their conduct. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever...." (Heb. 13:7f). Here at Redeemer we always have been, without apology, big on remembering, big on anniversaries, big on revisiting the past, big on (if you will) "being at home in the cemetery." Twelve years ago when I first became your pastor, we celebrated together Redeemer congregation's 50th anniversary. That day, like today, all our organists took turns at the organ; we also had a half

dozen or so former pastors return and take part in that glorious celebration. And then four years ago, in 2010, we observed another anniversary, the 50th of our CLC synod; on that occasion we celebrated the stand taken by our forefathers to form a Christian fellowship based on God's Word of Truth over against those who sixty years ago already were questioning the clarity and reliability of that Word. To underscore the point I wish to make in this parting Word with you, beloved, I remind that many of those, more and more of those, who took the stands which we the living celebrate in our various anniversaries are "in the cemetery," having gone to their eternal reward ahead of us. And so when we celebrate such anniversaries we are, in effect, "at home in the cemetery."

And you know what, the glorious festival of Easter is, in effect, an anniversary, isn't it?! As the man I quoted earlier suggested, too many people—dear young people, are you in tune with this old retiring pastor?—too many people, he said, rather than having a sense of the past or knowledge of the past are only interested in the present. I say to you, don't let Satan, the god of this fallen, sin-sick, unbelieving world take you down that path of ignoring the past. The first Holy Week--beginning with Jesus' suffering and death and ending with His glorious resurrection--all happened in the past. That which made the first Easter necessary--the fall of man into sin leaving our first parents Adam and Eve and all their descendants in the dire situation of being hopelessly and helplessly condemned creatures—that all happened in the past! Likewise, everything we Bible-believers confess in the Creeds, the Apostles, the 4th century Nicene, and 5th century Athanasian statements of faith—all took place in the past, except for Christ's Second Coming which is right around the bend! Likewise, the CLC synod and Redeemer congregation continue to treasure our 16th century Reformation heritage whose 500th anniversary we will, Lord willing, be observing three years hence (2017). In connection with that anniversary we will again be "at home in the cemetery," rejoicing how God raised up Dr. Luther and other reformers to take a firm stand against the false teachings of the Roman church and for the pure gospel of Christ, Him Crucified and risen again, for the complete justification, salvation of all sinners who have been redeemed (past tense!) through His precious blood.

I trust, beloved, that you get my point. As the good man suggested, let us continue to be "at home in the cemetery," never apologizing for that firm religious stance based on what God caused to happen back in the "good old days"—how His Word of Truth teaches us that, far from being products of evolution, He brought about our Creation, our Redemption, our Sanctification through the Spirit in Baptism, and it is He who has preserved us in the faith to this day and hour, and will preserve us in it to that glorious reunion with all the believing saints in the cemetery who have gone before us to eternal glory.

Yes, beloved, remember--remember with holy pride those who are at home in the cemetery, those who spoke the Word of God to you, teaching you the gospel that our faith is NOT in vain for He who was laid in Joseph's tomb in that first century graveyard burst the ugly bands of death, and lives "the same yesterday, today, and forever"! Because of Jesus' victory we can "whistle past every graveyard." In His holy name, Hallelujah, and Amen!
