#### **BORN TO DIE**

The time of waiting for the birth of a child is a time of anticipation on the part of parents-to-be-with the exception of those who choose to abort (kill) the child in the womb. The season of Advent is a season of such anticipation as we await the celebration of the birth of the Savior who 2014 years ago was born in Bethlehem. With the arrival of Christmas the Advent anticipation of Christ-believers turns to fullness of joy as the Savior of the world was born according to prophecy. "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7: 14). The unidentified virgin of Isaiah is revealed to us in Luke when the angel appeared to a young virgin. Mary was told, "And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bring forth a Son and shall call His name Jesus" (Luke 1:31). Immanuel (God with us) was given a personal name defined to Joseph, both as to meaning and purpose, upon the announcement to him of what was about to occur, "... That which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. And she ('Mary, your wife') will bring forth a Son and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1: 20-21).

We can believe that Jesus had a normal childhood. We are told that "He increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man" (Luke 2:52). No doubt He worked in Joseph's carpenter shop. We don't know anything about the parenting skills of Mary and Joseph; however, the young lad growing up in their home was a model boy—unique before His time and after, for He had no sin, a lad without deceit and guile. (2 Corinthians 5:21).

We anticipate the celebration of His birth and rejoice in it as Christ-believers Who confess regularly in the Apostolic Creed: "I believe in Jesus Christ, His (the Heavenly Father's) only Son, our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary..." and with the explanation of this miracle of love as expressed by Martin Luther in the second article of the Creed: "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true Man born of the Virgin Mary is my Lord..."

It is sad and unfortunate that the real reason for the joy of Christmas has been co-opted by the crass commercialism that has been yoked to Christmas. We do well to pause and refocus each Advent and Christmas season to keep the seasons in perspective:

> Rejoice, for thy salvation, O Israel, draweth nigh. O Zion, bring oblation, your King comes from on high; Comes not in royal splendor, no crown bedecks His head. But as an Infant tender, laid in a manger bed.

He comes, the Lord all-glorious, with healing in His wings; He comes to reign victorious, all life and hope He brings. He comes to end death's terror, to triumph o'er the grave, To blot out sin's dark error, and ransomed souls to save.

Since the consequence of sin is death (Romans 6:23a), and since the consequence of sin is everlasting condemnation, and since it is not possible for the sinner to avoid death, much less redeem himself or his brother (Psalm

49:7), it took another, someone unique, to accomplish what fallen man cannot. Hence, Jesus came to blot out sin's error, and to end death's terror. He came to ransom souls from death and condemnation, but at a price!

We see this foreshadowed in the Old Testament. When Abraham was told to sacrifice his son, Isaac, God provided a substitute (Genesis 22). Consequently Abraham offered a ram in the place of Isaac. The sacrifice of a lamb for the sins of the people was performed in the Old Testament time and again. Though it was to be a perfect lamb of the flock, there was no intrinsic value in the lamb as such. But God's word and promise made the sacrifice and blood of the lamb what it was, and what it was was a shadow of things to come—a shadow of One to come in whom were rich blessings for those who believed God's Word then, and now in fulfillment. Since "...without the shedding of blood there is no remission" (Hebrews 9:22), and since "it is not possible that the blood of bulls and goats could take away sins" (Hebrews 10:4), it took a nobler sacrifice to take away sin and overcome death. And so we sing of Jesus, the Son of God and Mary's son.

He comes so poor and lowly to make us rich and pure; The Son of God most holy sin's pain comes to endure; From heav'n's angelic nation descends to earth to die, That we, through His salvation, might reign with Him on high.

The anticipation of Christ's birth, and the joy of Christmas is fulfilled in the heart of all who recognize their sin, and who recognize that JESUS WAS BORN TO DIE. God provided a substitute for Isaac; there was no substitute for Jesus. He was the Substitute! Jesus acknowledged this and rejoiced to do the will of the Father in our behalf though He knew exactly what this meant. "Now my soul is troubled, and what shall I say? 'Father, save Me from this hour'? But for this purpose I came to this hour" (John 12:27).

Christ was born into the world as the perfect Lamb of God to bear the sins of all and as foreshadowed by the Old Testament sacrifices to shed His blood by which we are washed and cleansed, and through which we have forgiveness of sins.

Man was created to live forever. By his sin, he earned death and condemnation (Romans 6:23a). Jesus was born to die and restored life (Romans 6:23b)—the grandest exchange ever. *That is what Christmas is really all about.* Rejoice!

So we eagerly anticipate the celebration of the birth of our Savior and rejoice at His birth, even as we await the grand finale of which the Lord has told us, "...To those who eagerly wait for Him, He will appear a second time, apart from sin, for salvation" (Hebrews 9:28).

O Lord of love and glory, Thou everlasting King, May this sweet, joyful story Thy ransomed people sing! Oh, grant that we may praise Thee while here on earth we stay, And endless anthems raise Thee in heaven's eternal day.
