WAS CHRIST A JEW OR A CHRISTIAN?

Was Christ a Jew or a Christian? A search online finds many lengthy responses, many of which are contradictory.

Some answer with "Jesus was a Jew ..." Jesus indeed was addressed as Rabbi. In John 4:22 He said to the Samaritan woman "... We know what we worship, for salvation is of the Jews." However, Jesus nowhere *specifically calls Himself* a Jew, and the Bible nowhere *specifically* calls Him a Jew. Moreover, even Jewish sources acknowledge controversy and debate over who is a Jew. Some define the term in an ancestral sense, some in a religious sense, and still some in a political sense. Little is to be gained by engaging in such a debate.

Consequently as relates to Jesus we have no interest in the question beyond the fact that it is out there. We have the same lack of interest in this subject as we do about the color of Jesus, such a question generated by pictures of a black Jesus. By whose definition He was or was not a Jew, and what color He was, is not material to His person or work, or to our salvation. It is not important in this context to engage in a discussion of what He was. It is important **to** *know* and *believe WHO HE WAS*.

Concerning His lineage, we need no more description of His lineage than what Scripture says of Him. From Scripture we know that the incarnate Christ as it was prophesied was of the tribe of Judah. Miraculously "conceived by the Holy Ghost and born of the virgin Mary," He was of David's royal line according to the flesh. We know the purpose for which the Son of God came down from heaven and was born into the world as true Man. We believe the Old Testament prophecies of His person and work.

The question of whether or not Jesus was a Jew (what kind of Jew He was) is one of the subtle diversions of Satan by which he tries to engage one in trivialities to steer one away from the real understanding of Jesus' person and mission. We believe that Jesus Christ, our Lord, is "true God begotten of the Father from eternity and also true Man born of the virgin Mary (2nd Article of the Creed)" Who came into world as "The Lamb of God Who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29)! Thus saith the Lord!

To the end that He would accomplish His purpose, and the Father's will, He humbled Himself and lived under the Law fulfilling all the requirements of the Law including the ceremonial Law. He kept the Sabbath, and the Passover and showed Himself to be the substance of the shadow. "So let no one judge you in food or in drink, or regarding a festival or a new moon or Sabbaths which are a shadow of things to come, but the substance is of Christ" (Colossians 2:16-17). What is important is that Jesus, one with the Father and the Spirit in the Godhead, "became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14), and in His incarnation fulfilled His Father's will. Equally important to our salvation is the reality that Jesus was born of the descendants of Abraham as promised by the Father and that as the incarnate Son of God He completed and fulfilled every requirement demanded of Him as our Substitute (Isaiah 53). He Who had no sin took our sins upon Himself, and received our earned wages.

They get lost in the weeds and worse who spend time debating whether Jesus was a Jew or how to define Him in terms of Jewishness, but who reject or forget that Jesus was the Son of God!

So was Jesus a Christian? Apart from the reference to Jesus, the question itself also bogs one down in a quagmire since among Christians there is no definitive or unified understanding of what exactly defines a Christian.

What is *our* answer to who or what is a Christian? A Christian is one who believes that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, who took human form and flesh. He is true God, and true Man having been conceived of the Holy Ghost and born of the virgin Mary. He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross, where after God "highly exalted Him" (Philippians 2:8-11). He suffered the punishment and died the death we deserved and rose again to restore life. In and through Him we have forgiveness of sins. Jesus, the incarnate Son of God, reconciled the world unto the Father, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe in Him. A Christian believes that he is saved by grace through faith in Christ, without works (Ephesians 2:8).

None of what we have just stated describes Christ. No Old Testament name nor New Testament appellation addresses Him as "Christian." Jesus knew Who He was; He did not believe in Himself as that term is used to describe the faith of a Christian. Christ is the substance and embodiment of what believers trust in. He is the foundation of our faith and hope as Scripture says, "For no other foundation can anyone lay than that which is laid, which is Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 3:11).

Furthermore, the name Christian came into existence in Antioch. "And the disciples were first called Christians in Antioch" (Acts 11:26). This was not a compliment, but a term of ridicule spoken by the heathen against the followers of Christ. Though offered in ridicule, it was a fit name for Christ-believers. We embrace it in its real essence.

Christianity consists of faith in Christ, not in one's own moral conduct. Christ did not need salvation. He *brought* salvation. Martin Luther in the three articles of the Creed, with special emphasis on the 2^{nd,} defines the Christian faith. Christianity is and a Christian believes that Christ "has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own, and live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness..." (2nd Article of the Creed). This is most certainly true!

Therefore, in answer to the question "Was Christ a Christian?" we say, "No." We confess with the apostle who in answer to the question of who Jesus was said, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16)! "As many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God" (John1:12). All who believe on the name of the Son of God and Son of Mary are His children, and "Whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:21, Romans 10:13)—Jew or Gentile. Thus saith the Lord!
