## CLC E-Devotion – September 17, 2014

Hebrews 6:1-2 Therefore let us leave the elementary teachings about Christ and go on to maturity, not laying again the foundation of repentance from acts that lead to death, and of faith in God, instruction about baptisms, the laying on of hands, the resurrection of the dead, and eternal judgment.

## **BEYOND THE BASICS**

In school, as we grow in our knowledge and understanding, we move beyond the basic things we learned in the elementary grades and study more advanced things. In a similar way, as we become more mature in our understanding of spiritual things, we spend time studying the greater depth and details of the Scriptures.

The writer to the Hebrews chided his readers for lack of progress in their Christian education. For as long as they had been Christians, they might have been able to grasp some deeper teachings of the Bible (such as the comparison between Jesus and Melchizedek), but instead they had failed to move past the basic things.

There can be different reasons that we have trouble moving "beyond the basics" in our Christian education. Sometimes we get distracted by other things and don't take the time to grow in the Lord. Sometimes we don't put ourselves in good positions for growth, staying away from church or Bible studies. Other people think that the Bible is just too difficult for them, so they do not try to mine its deeper riches.

Now this is not to say that the basic truths of Christianity are unimportant or ought to be left behind in favor of other teachings, but the writer here encourages us never to stop our studies and our growth in God's word.

Having learned the basic things such as the death of Christ on the cross for the full payment of our sins, and baptism which cleanses us of guilt and brings us into God's family of believers, and the resurrection of our bodies at the Last Day, the Scriptures lead us into ever deeper understanding of the wondrous love, mercy, and might of our God. Each time we learn something more "advanced" from the Bible, our faith in the simple, fundamental truths is built up too. May our Christian education never stop!

### PERMISSION GRANTED—BY WHOM?

The pope has come to America. The church of Rome has twisted Jesus' words in Matthew. Upon the sterling confession of Peter concerning the person of Christ, Jesus said, "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18). Upon those words the pope has claimed to be the vicar (substitute) of Christ on earth. He has taken to himself authority that, in his mind and that of Catholics who have bought the goods, belongs to none other.

From this false claim has arisen the Catholic doctrine of papal infallibility. "We teach and define that it is a dogma Divinely revealed that the Roman pontiff when he speaks ex cathedra, that is when in discharge of the office of pastor and doctor of all Christians, by virtue of his supreme Apostolic authority, he defines a doctrine regarding faith or morals to be held by the universal Church, by the Divine assistance promised to him in Blessed Peter, is possessed of that infallibility with which the Divine Redeemer willed that his Church should be endowed in defining doctrine regarding faith or morals, and that therefore such definitions of the Roman pontiff are of themselves and not from the consent of the Church irreformable. So then, should anyone, which God forbid, have the temerity to reject this definition of ours: let him be anathema." <sup>(1)</sup>

This doctrine is the center point of Roman theology. If the doctrine of papal infallibility fell the Catholic Church would fail to be Catholic. Martin Luther in his early years bought into this claim. He said, "So great was the authority of the pope in my eyes that I thought it a crime worthy of eternal damnation to disagree with him ..." <sup>(2)</sup> Luther's view of the pope changed. In 1520 he said: "The pope is the enemy of God, the persecutor of Christendom, and the true Antichrist." <sup>(3)</sup>

The claim of Rome concerning the pope is wrong on several counts. Unless Catholics consider only themselves Christians, he is not the shepherd and teacher of all Christians. The idea that he is preserved from error when speaking in matters of faith and morals when speaking from the throne is arrogant, as well as a manner of controlling the "sheep." Popes have contradicted each other. Further, the pope makes claim of apostolic succession. In Roman theology, apostolic succession is the uninterrupted transmission of spiritual authority from the apostles through successive popes and bishops. Other religions, e. g. Mormons, make the same claim. Whoever lays claim to apostolic succession errs!

The authority to administer the Keys, to speak the gospel, administer the sacraments, and pronounce forgiveness, is not the exclusive right of any individual or of the clergy. The Keys--the authority to forgive and retain sins, as well as the means of grace which is the gospel in word and sacrament--were given to the Church, the sum total of believers in the Lord Jesus.

Recently the pope who is also a political leader in the world has delivered himself of statements on the economy, poverty, and climate change, as well as abortion. He has the ears of politicians who make a point to solicit his views. By the nature of the authority he claims, the pope's right to political opinions on such subjects, to many, lends weight to his political statements. Inasmuch, however, as he has no word from God relative to his political opinions, his opinions bear no more weight than those of anyone else. Further, the worth of any theological or moral judgments he makes are subject to the judgment of Holy Scripture!

This year, 2015, is a Year of Jubilee in the Catholic Church. The papal announcement of the Jubilee Years said: "This Holy Year will begin on this coming Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception and will end on November 20, 2016, the Sunday dedicated to Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe – and living face of the Father's mercy. I entrust the organization of this Jubilee to the Pontifical Council for Promotion of the New Evangelization, that [the dicastery] [divisions of the papal curia] might animate it as a new stage in the journey of the Church on its mission to bring to every person the Gospel of mercy.

Further: "I am convinced that the whole Church will find in this Jubilee the joy needed to rediscover and make fruitful the mercy of God, with which all of us are called to give consolation to every man and woman of our time. From this moment, we entrust this Holy Year to the Mother of Mercy, that she might turn her gaze upon us and watch over our journey." <sup>(4)</sup>

The pope also said, "For this reason too, I have decided, notwithstanding anything to the contrary, to concede to all priests for the Jubilee Year the discretion to absolve of the sin of abortion those who have procured it and who, with contrite heart, seek forgiveness for it. May priests fulfill this great task by expressing words of genuine welcome combined with a reflection that explains the gravity of the sin committed, besides indicating a path of authentic conversion by which to obtain the true and generous forgiveness of the Father who renews all with his presence." <sup>(5)</sup>

Specifically, the priests are allowed to forgive the punishment for the sin of abortion.

The issue here is not the sin itself, but that the priests do not have the authority to forgive the punishment without express authority of the pope. This is contrary to the Word of God which grants to the Holy Christian Church the authority to forgive sins and comfort souls who have repented of their sin.

Note further the reference to Mary. Rome views and describes her as a mediatrix and a helper. Scripture says that there is one Mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus.<sup>(1 Timothy 2:5)</sup>. It is the Lord who forgives sins. He has transmitted the authority to forgive sins in His behalf to the Church, the body of Christ. The pastor forgives sins in the stead and by the command of the Lord Jesus Christ <sup>(John 20:23)</sup>. But this authority is not restricted to the pastor. Any Christian who is in possession of the gospel has the authority to forgive sins. The very gospel which we speak is the message of forgiveness in and through Christ. The gospel which we speak declares reconciliation with God for all who have sinned <sup>(2 Corinthians 5:18-21)</sup>.

Inasmuch as we are commissioned by the Lord Himself to proclaim the gospel (Matthew 28:18-20), we need no permission from any human authority to proclaim forgiveness and salvation to the comfort of every penitent sinner.
