Matthew 3:1-2 In those days John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, and saving, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!"

A BROKEN RECORD

Those who are over 40 are familiar with the expression, "He sounds like a broken record." A broken record refers to a sound recording on a vinyl disc that has a scratch on it. Because it has a scratch, it keeps repeating the same words over and over again. The expression, "He sounds like a broken record," refers to someone who keeps telling you the same things over and over again.

Maybe your pastor sounds like a broken record. Every time you go to church, he keeps telling you the same things. He keeps reminding you of your sin and about the eternal punishment your sin deserves. He constantly warns you to get ready for the second coming of the Son of God. Sunday after Sunday he tells you how Jesus lived a perfect life for you and how He made full payment for all your sins on the cross. He's forever telling you that salvation is God's free gift to you. He tells you to trust God's Word because all of its promises are sure. He keeps insisting that everything the Bible says is 100% true, no matter what the world says to the contrary.

Your pastor is probably like John the Baptist, who kept telling everyone to repent of their sins and trust the Savior to forgive them. Are you tired of hearing these things? I pray not. In fact, thank God if you have a pastor who stays on message, on God's message of sin and grace, on God's message centered in the birth, death, and resurrection of His own Son for all people. And pray for your pastor. Pray that he keeps preaching like John the Baptist. Pray that he sounds like a broken record, always telling you how much Jesus loves you, and what He did to save you.

Dear God, give us pastors who preach the truth no matter what.

BE COMFORTED - ISAIAH 40:10-11

Behold, the Lord God shall come with a strong hand, And His arm shall rule for Him; Behold, His reward is with Him, And His work before Him.

He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, And carry them in His bosom, And gently lead those who are with young.

The words of the evangelist of the Old Testament are heard every Advent season. The 40th chapter begins with the Lord's commission to Isaiah, "Comfort, yes, comfort My people." These words are a clear prophecy of the forerunner of Jesus, John the Baptist. John recognized these words as applying to his role and his message. He said, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness; Make straight the way of the Lord" (John 1:23). John's preparatory work for the Savior's appearance was a call to repentance. John further testified that Jesus was the "Son of God," the Lamb of God Who would take away the sins of the world. John's words lose their real sense and meaning, as well as their effect, unless recognition of personal sin and heartfelt repentance precedes.

Sins, inherited and committed, separated man from the Lord God. The prophet said, "Your iniquities have separated you from your God, and your sins have hidden His face from you ... (Isaiah 59:2). John's message was that the Greater One who would come would destroy the wall of separation and reconcile the sinner to God. This is the *underlying and real* comfort of which the prophet was speaking when he wrote, "Comfort, yes, comfort My people," and which John spoke.

In the world in which we live we must endure trial, affliction, threat, intimidation, and frustration such as we observe in these evil days. In reality what is happening around us today is not any different then what has always been in the world since the entrance of sin. Our world is not any more immoral than it has always been. Violence is certainly nothing new since Cain murdered Abel. Apostasy from the faith is the same. Every sin under the sun is as old as sin! Perhaps the only thing we can say with certainty is that we are living in the midst of it, and it is practiced with a certain boldness before unseen. Of the latter we are not even sure. One change of which we are sure is that social media (TV, internet) has broadcast it more widely, making sin and evil attractive to many.

Forgiveness of sins and life and salvation, the gift of God to us in Christ, is the underlying and sound foundation of every other good thing that we enjoy in this life, many of which we take for granted. Without the Christ of Bethlehem, the Sacrificial Lamb of the cross, the resurrection of the Lord of Life, and the promises of the Heavenly Father, our present life would indeed be a living hell. Without faith in the Savior Who reconciled us to the Father, believers in Christ would be counted among those who are described as ones "whose end is destruction" (Phillippians 3:19) and whose way "is the way of death" (Proverbs 14:12). They are those who in their unbelief weep as ones "who have no hope" (1 Thessalonians 4:13).

As it is, for Christ-believers life on earth is difficult. Fear and dread overtakes many, and are far removed from none, as we witness the crime on our streets and the threats and actions of those who would destroy our faith as well as our life, in the name of religion no less.


The words of the prophet who directs our attention to the Lord who has reconciled us to God and prepared for us the perfect peace and rest of heaven, resonate also for us in the face of temporal evil and enemies. Our future in heaven is assured in and through Christ. That warfare is over. Our iniquities are pardoned. Be comforted! Be comforted also through the assurance that He who has given you a future, will accompany and embrace you as you await that future.

It means that the old Adam in us should be drowned by daily contrition and repentance and die with all sins and evil desires. It also means that a new Man should daily appear and arise, who lives eternally before God in righteousness and purity.



Where is this written?

Saint Paul says in the sixth chapter of Romans, "Therefore we were buried with Him through baptism into death, that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life."

UNDERSTANDING OUR FAITH: TEACHING OUR CHILDREN TO APPRECIATE CHRISTMAS

The latest report that was heard on the Christmas shopping activity is that to the surprise of many it was up. The post-Thanksgiving shopping in this year of 2000 surpassed what the merchants expected. Reports are that

toy sales are up. This means that many children will have a "good" Christmas. We hope so.

The promotion of Christmas according to the world's standard, the standard by which many people judge what is a "good" Christmas is quite easy. One does not have to teach children in this regard. They absorb the ads on TV. They listen to the tales of Santa Claus. They make their Christmas lists. They walk through the toy stores and the



malls. They absorb Christmas by osmosis. Sadly, that is the most that many children know about Christmas, or at least the most they remember. Well-meaning adults who ask, "Did you have a good Christmas," reinforce this when they ask, "What did Santa Claus bring you?"

We look at Christmas in a different manner. We start from the premise that there would be no Christmas, no "Christ-festival" if there had been no Christ. The world, while giving lip service to Christ, in fact uses the birth of Christ to serve its own purpose. The achieved result is that the blessing of Christmas is lost, because the Christ of Christmas has been diminished.

The real meaning of Christmas is not absorbed. It is found in Scripture. It is taught!

"But continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and hast been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them; And that from a child thou hast known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus" (2 Timothy 3:15). "I thank God, whom I serve from my forefathers with pure conscience, that without ceasing I have remembrance of thee in my prayers night and day; Greatly desiring to see thee, being mindful of thy tears, that I may be filled with joy; When I call to remembrance the unfeigned faith that is in thee, which dwelt first in thy grandmother Lois, and thy mother Eunice; and I am persuaded that in thee also" (1:3-5).

It falls primarily upon the parents to teach their children. This responsibility secondarily belongs to the church as assistant to the parents in looking after the spiritual welfare of children. Children need to have a

clear understanding of sin. Without sin and its condemnation there would have been no need for Jesus to come into the flesh. The instruction of children will include the teaching of Old Testament prophecy, namely that in the Old Testament the Heavenly Father prophesied through the prophets about Jesus Christ. Children are to be taught who Jesus is. He is true God become Man to be our Savior. That is the meaning of the name, Jesus. They need to know that life on earth is passing, and that the real life is in heaven.

Jesus is the only way to heaven, as Scripture clearly teaches. Children need to be taught of the love of God, and how the epitome of this love was the sending of Jesus Christ into the world so that when toys are broken, clothes are outgrown, games are over, and life on earth is past and gone, trusting in Jesus they may enter into life everlasting.



All the trappings and giving of Christmas will come home to haunt those parents who have not taught their children what Christmas really is. What will be the response of parents to those children who naturally like to ask why? What will they say when on judgment day the child asks, "Why did you not teach us what Christmas was really about? Why did you not lead us to Jesus, and teach us the Gospel?"

The Gospel and the message of Christmas, "Unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior," is not absorbed. It is taught. The Word confirms what is taught from the Word. Therefore let your Christmas be first of all built around the Word. Then it will be a good Christmas. Without the Word, a good Christmas is not the best.
