Romans 3:3-4 For what if some did not believe? Will their unbelief make the faithfulness of God without effect? Certainly not! Indeed, let God be true but every man a liar. As it is written: "That You may be justified in Your words, And may overcome when You are judged."

TOTAL TRUTH

Did you know that putting sliced raw onions on your feet, slipping socks over them, and wearing them overnight will draw toxins from your body and prevent the flu? Well, not really. But it's an urban legend which has been around since the late 1800s. So many claims are made by so many people in such convincing ways that it's hard to sift through them and be certain of truth. News organizations quote "reliable sources" and double-check facts, but sometimes their stories still prove to be false. It's not surprising that people become cynical and wonder as Pilate did, "What is truth?"

What effect does that have on our faith? Could the gospel message of Jesus as Son of God and Savior from sin be just another "legend" convincingly communicated by millions over the past 2,000 years? Critics of Scripture are on a mission to prove just that. At times their arguments sound so convincing.

However, in this case there is no question about the truth. The news of salvation in Jesus comes from the most reliable source of all--the one holy God! The men who wrote the books of the Bible didn't claim credit for their words, because they were the words of God Himself. "All Scripture is God-breathed" (2 Timothy 3:16). Paul assured his Corinthians readers: "This is what we speak, not in words taught us by human wisdom but in words taught by the Spirit, expressing spiritual truths in spiritual words" (1 Corinthians 2:13).

Don't be troubled by all the claims made against the reliability of Scripture. They're nothing new. During Jesus' ministry His enemies tried to discredit Him by saying He performed miracles by the power of Satan. God's Word stands forever. "What if some did not have faith? Will their lack of faith nullify God's faithfulness? Not at all! Let God be true, and every man a liar" (Romans 3:3-4).

There will always be people who deny the Word, but no one can make it untrue. No one can make sin less deadly. No one can undo the forgiveness and peace which Jesus earned for all sinners by His death on the cross.

So when you want to be sure of what is true about yourself, the world, God, salvation, and eternity, turn to the Word. Listen to the Savior speak to you with words of love and comfort. Trust Him with today, tomorrow, and your eternal future, for He promises, "No one can snatch you out of My hand!"

WHEN WRONG IS RIGHT

Frequently they who defend evil and perversion characterize Christ-believers as being "on the wrong side of history." This characterization has arisen again in connection with the denial of the right of Christians to exercise their faith in the face of the continual push to validate and defend homosexuality. The same characterization has been used to defend murder of the unborn in the name of rights, and compromise of faith and morals in the name of love. Unfortunately we even hear it among those who profess to be Christians as in, "It is out of date to believe that we have to be married" before engaging in the privileges God has reserved for husband and wife.

The standard of right and wrong in matters of faith and morals is Holy Scripture, not subjective opinion. Deniers of the Lord God and of His Word determine right and wrong by the subjective standard of their imagination and fleshly desires. Without Scripture as the source of truth they lack a moral compass. Without faith in Christ they lack the power to do that which is right, being under domination of the unregenerate flesh. It is a sad state of affairs, furthermore, when perversion and sin become law approved by apostate leaders of the church and by politicians whose moral values are all too frequently determined by the popular whim, political winds, and fashion of the moment.

If because we "obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29), we are judged by the evil world to be on the wrong side of history, we shall take that judgment against us as a compliment. The God of Scripture is holy, just, merciful, and good, so the reality is that *if we stand upon Scripture* and respect the Lord God of our salvation *we will always be on the wrong side of history*. What Paul said in the context of preaching the Gospel, speaks to our point. "For do I now persuade men, or God? Or do I seek to please men? For if I still pleased men, I would not be a bondservant of Christ" (Galatians 1:10). Jesus said, "He who is not with Me is against Me..." (Matthew 12:30).

The prophet Isaiah, prophesying in Jerusalem, confronted the same issue. During a time of external and internal decay manifested by gross idolatry and desecration of the temple, the Lord spoke through Him:

"Woe to those who draw sin along with cords of deceit, and wickedness as with cart ropes, Woe to those who draw sin along with cords of deceit, and wickedness as with cart ropes, to those who say, Let God hurry, let him hasten his work so we may see it. Let it approach, let the plan of the Holy One of Israel come, so we may know it.' Woe to those who call evil good and good evil, who put darkness for light and light for darkness, who put bitter for sweet and sweet for bitter. Woe to those who are wise in their own eves and clever in their own sight. Woe to those who are heroes at drinking wine and champions at mixing drinks, who acquit the guilty for a bribe, but deny justice to the innocent. Therefore, as tongues of fire lick up straw and as dry grass sinks down in the flames, so their roots will decay and their flowers blow away like dust: for they have rejected the law of the LORD Almighty and spurned the word of the Holy One of Israel. Therefore the LORD's anger burns against his people; his hand is raised and he strikes them down. The mountains shake, and the dead bodies are like refuse in the streets. Yet for all this, his anger is not turned away, his hand is still upraised" (Isaiah 5:18-25).

Note that these words are spoken "against His people." The prophet Jeremiah, after Isaiah, also prophesied in a period when "the kingdom of Judah was rushing

headlong to its own destruction"⁽²⁾. The Lord said to Jeremiah, "Therefore you shall speak all these words to them, but they will not obey you. You shall also call to them, but they will not answer you. So you shall say to them, 'This is a nation that does not obey the voice of the Lord their God nor receive correction. Truth has perished and has been cut off from their mouth" (Jeremiah 7:28-29).

In view of what the prophets wrote to Judah, God's people, what shall be *our* response? First for our many sins, *let us look at ourselves in the mirror, and daily repent.* Secondly, for the false Christians, and the heathen who oppose God and His Word, and who abuse His people, a prayer that they will repent and escape the judgment to come and be saved—that is the appropriate response.

He who has ears to hear, let him hear what Paul wrote, "For to be carnally minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, nor indeed can be. So then, those who are in the flesh cannot please God" (Romans 8:6-9). The apostle who was writing the Word of God to Christians in Rome went on, "But you are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if indeed the Spirit of God dwells in you. Now if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he is not His" (Romans 8:9). A few verses later he writes "Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh. For if you live according to the flesh you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live" (Romans 8:12-13). In the 12th chapter he writes, "And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of you mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." (Romans 12:2). In verse 9 of the same chapter he reminds us to "abhor what is evil. Cling to what is good."

He who has ears to hear, and a new heart that responds to God's will does not find it difficult to accept that the right and safe conclusion is to stand on the side of God even if it means being on "the wrong side of history." With God is life; with the world is death. This is our answer to the question, "When is being wrong, right?"

We do not speak as those who have no sin. To speak so would be the grossest and most dangerous self-deception. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). We speak as those who by the grace of God have been made alive in Christ, and who have been delivered from slavery to sin (Romans 6:4). We speak as those who believe that we stand in daily need of forgiveness because of our flesh, and who according to the new man rejoice in the comfort of our Lord Who tells us, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John1:9). We speak as those who lament the unbelief (impenitence) that is destroying souls, and the rejection of the Lord God that is inviting judgment upon those who walk in the path of unrighteousness. We speak as those who must daily pray for faith and strength to stand with Him.

To His children the Heavenly Father says, "Do not enter the path of the wicked, and do not walk in the way of evil. Avoid it, do not travel on it; turn away from it and pass on. For they do not sleep unless they have done evil; and their sleep is taken away unless they make someone fall. For they eat the bread of wickedness, and drink the wine of violence. But the path of the just is like the shining sun, that shines brighter unto the perfect day. The way of the wicked is like darkness. They do not know what makes them stumble." (Proverbs 4:14-19)
