Now the boy Samuel ministered to the Lord before Eli. And the word of the Lord was rare in those days; there was no widespread revelation. And it came to pass at that time, while Eli was lying down in his place, and when his eyes had begun to grow so dim that he could not see, and before the lamp of God went out in the tabernacle of the Lord where the ark of God was, and, while Samuel was lying down, that the Lord called Samuel. MORE RELEVANCE THAN THE BIBLE?

An editorial, "Reading the Bible as Humanity's Diary" (*) quoted an atheist as saying any book in a book store would have "more relevance and wisdom for the 21st century than the Bible." Of this comment we are not surprised. In a bow to the relevancy of Scripture the editorial, from its evolutionary point of view, misses the whole point of Scripture and recognizes nothing spiritual. "We just have to read it in a new way: as humanity's diary ... The emerging Christian Church needed to establish its authority. The Bible was canonized; it became Holy Writ; the perfect word of a perfect God. It was external, unchangeable, and thus its explanatory model grew increasingly outdated ... Of course, it got much of its explanations wrong, and most of us no longer accept them as accurate ... But modern evolutionary biology has confirmed that the Good Book got its fundamental picture of human nature right. If many of us today feel a sense of longing for paradise, it is because we live in a world for which we were not really made." The writers of this editorial have written a book. The editorial confirms the premise that anyone can write a book about a subject of which he knows nothing.

More disturbing and more dangerous than the atheist and those who write about what they know nothing are those teachers within the church who deny the inspiration and inerrancy of Scripture, and who dressed in clerical garb set aside, cast out, deny, and declare Scripture outdated. The latter who identify with Christianity are more dangerous because "by good words and fair speeches they deceive the hearts of the simple" (Romans 16:18).

The editorial comments that the Bible "was external, unchangeable, and thus its explanatory model grew increasingly outdated ... Of course, it got much of its explanations wrong, and most of us no longer accept them as accurate," are not far different, if at all, from what can be found within some of Lutheranism today.

A diary is a book in which one keeps a daily record of events and experiences. The 66 books (Genesis-Revelation) though physically penned by holy men of God, is not authored by those who wrote them. The eternal *God is the Author* of the Scriptures. "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God [is God-breathed]" (2 Timothy 3:16), and "Holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit" (2 Peter 1:21). The Bible did not become Holy Writ. It was from its origin, and it is "the perfect word of a perfect God," or to put it another way: "The Bible does not contain the Word of God; it is the Word of God."

Man is not the primary subject of the Bible. One could take man out of the Bible and it would still be the Bible. Take God out of the Bible and it is no longer the Bible. The Bible is the revelation of God and His love for and interaction with mankind whom He created. The sin of man distorted the relationship between the Creator God and created man. Sin robbed fallen mankind of the peace, quiet, and perfection of paradise. After the fall, sinful man had a future only of sorrow, pain, and death. The Bible is the message of God's intervention because He Who created man to live did not want man to die eternally. But as life God intended for man was not possible without intervention, He promised to send the Savior into the world (Genesis 3:15). The central theme of the Bible is the salvation of mankind, the restoration of fallen mankind to a relationship with God the Father Who through the suffering, death, and resurrection of the Lord Jesus reconciled man unto Himself.

But why did the eternal God create man? He would not have had to do so. As children of God through faith in Christ Jesus we need not engage in idle speculation. It is sufficient for us to know what He did, and to believe that what He did was done because in His grace He chose to. Nevertheless, as children of God we are told concerning our purpose: "Everyone who is called by My name, whom I have created for My glory; I have formed him, yes, I have made him" (Isaiah 43:7). We are created to live to the glory of God. It is that plain and simple.

We live to the glory of God when we live according to His will. He revealed His will in the Ten Commandments. Yet since the fall it is not possible for fallen mankind to keep the commandments, perform the will of God, or glorify Him. Fallen man left to his own devices lives in opposition to God "because the carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, nor indeed can be" (Romans 8:7). Yet God by His Spirit called man out of unbelief by the power of the gospel. Christ is the life of the gospel; He makes the gospel what it is, "the power of God unto salvation" (Romans 1:16) to as many as believe. While the law condemns, the believer in Christ is assured, "There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit" (Romans 8:1). All who are alive in Christ "are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" (Romans 1:10).

Scripture is profitable "for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every *good* work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). The Word of God which is "a lamp unto my feet, and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105), is the power unto the sanctified life. The life of sanctification which is a fruit of faith is the life that glorifies the Lord God. Such a life in and of Christ with which the Father is well-pleased is acceptable unto God and fulfills the purpose for which He placed us on the earth until the time that He calls us out of life here to LIFE in heaven. By the grace of God you are saved (Ephesians 2:8).

Paul wrote to the Romans concerning the existence and reality of God: For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek. For in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith; as it is written, 'The just shall live by faith,' For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who suppress the truth in unrighteousness, because what may be known of God is manifest in them, for God has shown it to them. For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead, so that they are without excuse ..." (Romans 1:16-20). How can we improve on the proof that the Lord Himself has left concerning Himself? How do we prove that the Bible is more than a book written by men, that it is more than a diary of humanity, that it is the very Word of the only God that is? We can't. What proof can be brought to convince the atheist, the doubter, the skeptic, the individual who wants physical, material, or even scientific proof? There is no proof that we can bring to those who choose only to believe what they choose to believe. So then how shall we approach Bible skeptics, or others who have doubts? We approach them with the Word of God itself. The only thing that can turn the unbeliever from his unbelief to confident and saving faith in Christ is the very Word of God Himself.

There is a discipline known as apologetics. It is the discipline of defending a position (often religious) through the systematic use of information. Early Christian apologists defended their faith against critics and recommended their faith to outsiders. It is still an important discipline. Whatever the benefit of such a discipline is, ultimately it is only the Word of God that convinces the heart and saves the soul. What Jesus said and did is recorded in the Scriptures. God's book was "written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:31).

There is no book more relevant in the world than the Bible through which is learned the Word of God which brings salvation. Period! We can do no better than to invite the skeptic as Philip invited skeptical Nathanael who wondered what good could come out of Nazareth. Philip said to him, "Come and see" (John 1:46).
