How Skipping Church Affects Our Children

The question is often asked about why churches today are losing their young people. Typical answers to this question range from things like the temptations of this world or the irrelevance of the church—your typical answers. But Carl Trueman makes a keen and convicting connection between our parenting and apostasy: "The church is losing its young people because the parents never taught their children that it was important. I think that applies across the board. It applies to family worship, and it also applies to whether you are in church every Sunday and what priority you demonstrate to your children church has on a Sunday. If the sun shines out and their friends are going to the beach, do you decide to skip church and go to the beach? In which case, you send signals to your children that it is not important."

Now we know that artificially taking your kids to church neither bestows salvation nor guarantees it. God is obviously not honored by external religious acts without heart worship. This type of legalism is not the subject of this discussion. This is about parenting and the weight of the responsibility behind how they prioritize their time and lifestyle choices for their families. Parents make choices all the time for their families. As they decide on what takes priority in family, every choice is carefully observed and taken into the heart of their children. Yes, they are watching you, and they are learning from you.

Maybe the reason why it seems that our children have no love for Christ is due to the fact that we as parents do not show any love or passion for Christ, evidenced by how we prioritize our time both on Sundays and during the week. When television, sports, school, hobbies even family itself are elevated to a place of idolatry and replace the vital Christian responsibilities, then we tell our children that Christ is secondary to all these things. We tell our children that it is not necessary to take up your cross and die to yourself daily in order to follow Christ. We tell them that you only have to live for Christ when it's convenient for you. We tell them it is okay to sacrifice time with all-satisfying Savior if something "more fun" or "more important" comes along.

Let's evaluate where our hearts are by observing our choices. Do you prioritize church? Do you prioritize the worship of Christ in your home and on Sundays? Do you prioritize serving Him and worshiping Him in the contexts of school and work? This doesn't mean that you can't ever miss a Sunday or that you can't have any extracurricular activities. Instead, it is a sobering reminder that we shouldn't put the things of God at the bottom of the priority list, because it tells our children that Christ is at the bottom of our priority list. And the God of this universe does not belong there. With all that He has done in bringing us salvation through Jesus Christ, He deserves our full honor and reverence.

Let Your Pastor Pastor You!

Q: "When it comes to difficult circumstances in life, my pastor isn't the first person I think of to go to for prayer and pastoral care. How can I let my pastor pastor me?"

A: Repent! Talk to your Pastor. That's the answer.

This isn't about who can proclaim the Gospel to you. All Christians should be able to give a defense for their hope (1 Peter 3:15). This is about whom God has given to proclaim the Gospel to you.

What if the situation were framed like this: "As a husband, when it comes to difficult circumstances in life, my wife isn't the first person I think of when I ..." Immediately, you sense something's wrong. When we have questions, the Internet might have an answer, but God gives us a local pastor that we may receive specific comfort when facing life's difficulties. God sends pastors to hear confession without judging, pronounce forgiveness as from God Himself and never to divulge what is confessed. Your pastor has that responsibility.

Let's say you're a young person. Maybe you talk to your mom about life's difficulties; maybe you confess sin to her. She can declare to you the grace of God in Christ, that our heavenly Father has had mercy upon us and has given His only Son to die for us and for His sake forgives us all our sins. Any Christian can do that. But it may be in the back of your mind that you didn't really confess everything, or that you didn't mean it, or that she's only saying that because she's your mom and that sounds like what moms say.

Your pastor has the God-given responsibility to hear your confession and pronounce forgiveness in order to fulfill God's will. He might ask you a question, not to pry or judge but to assist with self-examination, because if what you confess isn't sin, he needs to tell you that, too. He has promised never to divulge what is confessed. He can never use your sins as an example in a story or a joke. Ever. You are freely justified for Christ's sake, through faith. When you believe that, you are received into favor, and your sins are forgiven for Christ's sake. By His death, Jesus made satisfaction for your sins. God counts this faith for righteousness in His sight.

AND ... So that you may obtain this faith, the ministry of teaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments was instituted. Any Christian can declare to you the grace of God in Christ. They should. But to remove all doubt, for your added joy and comfort, so that you can be sure that "you" means you, your congregation called a pastor – God sent you a pastor – that you would obtain this faith and be reckoned righteous in God's sight. Jesus says to the first pastors of the Church, "As the Father has sent Me, even so I am sending you. ... If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them" (John 20:21, 23).

When it comes to difficult circumstances in life, repent! Talk to your pastor. In the stead and by the command of Christ, he's there, not for your burden, but for your joy.

CLC E-Devotion - Monday, August 30, 2016

Psalm 39:4 Lord, make me to know my end, And what is the measure of my days, That I may know how frail I am.

MAKE ME TO KNOW MY END

The psalmist speaks to the LORD, prays to the LORD, "Make me to know my end!" Literally, "Declare to me my end!" The psalmist wants the LORD to remind him that his life in this world is short, his body is frail. He wants God to remind him of what is going to happen when he dies. What will his end be? Not so much, "How will I die?" But more, "Remind me that I'm going to die! Remind me that my life in this world will come to an end." And that it will end relatively soon. He declares that, "Indeed, You have made my days as handbreadths..." So the psalmist prays in another Psalm, saying, "... teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom" (Psalm 90:12).

With His Word, God the Holy Spirit gives us a heart of wisdom. In the Scriptures the LORD teaches us that, for Him, "One day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day" (2 Peter 3:8). Regardless of what the world says, we know from Scripture that we are only 6,000-10,000 years removed from Creation. In the context of eternity, the world was not created very long ago. Elsewhere, the LORD calls Himself, "The Beginning and the End" (Revelation 1:8). To Someone who sees the last 1,000 years as though it were yesterday, it is as the psalmist says: "... my age is as nothing before You..." How long have you been alive? Thirteen years? Thirty years? Forty or fifty? Seventy or eighty years? Ninety? That is very little compared to the thousands of years the world has stood, and it is absolutely nothing compared with the eternal God.

And none of the wisdom we can gain from this world in one hundred years, or a thousand, compares to the kind of wisdom the psalmist is talking about. God takes a dead, foolish heart, and breaths in the Word that makes us wise unto salvation in Christ Jesus (2 Timothy 3:15). It is with this heart of wisdom that God makes us to know that our end is not dying in sin, but with sins forgiven in Christ Jesus, living eternally, in heaven.

Words are weak instruments to express our pleasure upon moving into so beautiful and comfortable a home. At first we were flattered that so many people would invest such a great amount of effort just for us; then we realized that the effort wasn't only -- or even primarily -- for us. Rather, it was done out of deep love for the Lord Jesus, and that's even more gratifying. "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity." --Psalm 133:1. Thank you, thank you, our dear Christian brethren!
