- Hurricane Relief for Haiti: The CLC Board of Missions has been in correspondence and doctrinal discussions with a Lutheran pastor in Haiti since he first contacted Pastor Dan Fleischer back in 2013. Pastor Emmanuel Julien serves a congregation on the outskirts of Port-au-Prince and has been sharing the CLC correspondence lessons with twenty-one other Lutheran pastors in Haiti as we work together toward establishing fellowship. The recent Hurricane Matthew that hit Haiti and took the life of more than 1.000 Haitians has also brought much loss and destruction to the pastors and congregations that we are working with. The Board of Missions has authorized an initial \$3000 from the CLC Mission Development Fund (MDF) to assist our fellow Christians with recovery efforts. CLC President Eichstadt has authorized a special offering to replenish the MDF after this unexpected need. A Board of Missions visit to Haiti was already being planned before the hurricane and will now take place in late January or early February. This visitation will serve to assess the recovery efforts we are providing and to visit face to face with Pastor Julien and the other pastors to discuss doctrine and fellowship with the CLC. This trip will be funded through offerings to the MDF as well.

## **Reformations**

Otto Hagedorn – October 23, 1927 (Translated by Rev. Timothy Daub) Evangelisch=Lutherisches Gemeinde=Blatt

The history of the church from Adam up until the present day is the history of countless small reforms and a number of great Reformations.

Reformation is restoration, a recovery of the original form.

One could consider the Flood to be the first great Reformation.

The world at that point was about 1700 years old. In these seventeen centuries, Adam, Seth, Enoch, Methuselah, Lamech, and many other great patriarchs proclaimed the Gospel to their children and grandchildren, the Gospel of the true God, who had created heaven and earth, the Gospel of the Savior, who was to come. But the imagination of the human heart was evil continually. The "children of God," who had the Word of God richly among them, despised the revelation of grace and various warnings which God allowed to be bestowed upon them, intermingled themselves with the "children of men," and abandoned communion with God.

Thus came the Flood, the great divine judgment of the early age, the extermination of all human enemies of God, the recovery of the church in her first outward form, Reformation.

But by the time of the death of Noah, about 350 years after the Flood, men had for quite some time already once again abandoned God and had been scattered in all directions through a further judgment, the confusion of languages. Everywhere idol worship and superstition abounded.

Then came what we could call the second great Reformation, not a new, great world judgment, rather in the midst of the tumult of the godless world of man, and nearly unnoticed by it, came an inconspicuous home life, the birth of a nation, of God's chosen people Israel. The offspring of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob became a church-state through the law of Moses, a theocracy, united and established by God Himself with a constitution and bylaws, fixed ceremonial forms, orders, sacraments, and a land that belonged exclusively to them.

But Israel abandoned God's covenant of grace almost as soon as it was established. A Reformation followed in the pattern of the others, already in the times of Moses, Joshua, and the Judges. The Judges were not only generals, who liberated the people from the yoke of political enemies, but reformers, who led the people back to the true God out of heathen idol worship.

Under David and Solomon, there was a relatively long period of spiritual life. But then came the division of the kingdom. Idolatry and godlessness of every kind spread rapidly in spite of the powerful preaching and deeds of the prophets and the earnest endeavors of the individual good kings. And then came Nebuchadnezzar, the Babylonian captivity.

The Reformation under Ezra and Nehemiah, with the reconstruction of the temple and the recovery of the public divine service was the last great event in the history of the Old Testament church.

And then came the Lord Christ in order to make all things new, to fulfill the law and the prophets in their entirety, the new covenant, the New Testament.

That is the proper Reformation, the redemption of the world, the day of the Lord, the eternal Sabbath.

"My kingdom is not of this world." The church of the New Testament is not the church of any individual people, rather of all peoples and languages. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." "Love one another."

There is no divinely instituted church government, no form established or commanded by God. "The kingdom of God cometh not with observation."

The Gospel makes the church.

But just as in the days before, so men began to adulterate the Gospel in the days after. They did not want to believe that Christ saved the world. They placed their confidence in their own works, in the intercession of the saints and angels, in the power of the priests, in the authority of the bishops and popes. The magnificent freedom of the children of God, justification by grace alone, was robbed by men, and a spiritual tyranny like the world had never seen advanced in place of the Gospel.

A new Reformation had to come. But how? The papacy was mightier than all worldly empires. Kings and emperors, princes and nations were under his control. In the thousand years of its existence, as gigantic kingdoms rose and fell, the papacy continued to grow in strength as one century followed another.

In Catholic eyes, Luther is a heretic, a false prophet, who was excommunicated from the church.

Yes, Luther was excommunicated, just as the Lord Christ had been excommunicated by the Jewish church 1500 years before, and just as He had forewarned His disciples, "They shall put you out of the synagogues." In Luther's excommunication, the church spoke the judgment upon itself.

Luther is not a heretic, but the Noah of the New Testament, who has built the children of God a spiritual ark, where they find refuge from the coming wrath. He is Moses, who has led the people of God out of captivity. He is Ezra and Nehemiah, who has reconstructed the house of the Lord, who has brought the saving Gospel again to light.

Are there yet more great Reformations of church history to come before the last day? That we do not know. That also is of no concern to us. What we have before us to do is to treasure and hold fast to the Gospel now in our possession until the great day appears, when heaven and earth shall pass away, and the last, the eternal Reformation breaks forth like morning's dawn.

Comments:

- The General Fund offerings in September totaled \$79,428 vs disbursements of \$86,410.
- Due to higher than usual expenses in September, the General Fund ended the month with a deficit of \$21,140.
- ILC Operations include a CLC monthly subsidy of \$40,000.
- The \$300,000 renovation of the North Hall boys' dorm begins this month. A construction loan will be received from our Church Extension Fund and repaid through special offerings to the ILC Building Fund.
- The Student Aid Fund has a shortfall in offerings of -\$18,632 and will need \$8,000 for the 2<sup>nd</sup> semester in January.
- The larger ending balance in the Reserve Fund is from a FY16 year-end bookkeeping correction.
