### Sermon: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

<sup>1</sup> Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. <sup>2</sup> For by it the elders obtained a *good* testimony. <sup>3</sup> By faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that the things which are seen were not made of things which are visible. ... <sup>8</sup> By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to the place which he would receive as an inheritance. And he went out, not knowing where he was going. <sup>9</sup> By faith he dwelt in the land of promise as *in* a foreign country, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise; 10 for he waited for the city which has foundations, whose builder and maker is God. <sup>11</sup> By faith Sarah herself also received strength to conceive seed, and she bore a child when she was past the age, because she judged Him faithful who had promised. 12 Therefore from one man, and him as good as dead, were born as many as the stars of the sky in multitude—innumerable as the sand which is by the seashore. <sup>13</sup>These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off were assured of them, embraced *them* and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth. <sup>14</sup> For those who say such things declare plainly that they seek a homeland. <sup>15</sup> And truly if they had called to mind that *country* from which they had come out, they would have had opportunity to return. <sup>16</sup> But now they desire a better, that is, a heavenly country. ### From the CLC Board of Missions

**CLC Missionary Call / Commissioning Service** 

In a September call meeting of the Board of Missions chaired by our CLC President, Michael Eichstadt, a call was issued to Pastor Todd Ohlmann to become our CLC Visiting Missionary. After six weeks of prayerful deliberation, Pastor Ohlmann accepted that call. For this we give praise and thanks to the Lord of the harvest. Pastor Ohlmann will begin his service as CLC Missionary on January 1, 2017. We invite members of CLC congregations to attend a Commissioning service for Missionary Ohlmann at Messiah Lutheran Church in Eau Claire, Wisconsin on Monday, January 2, 2017 at 7:00pm.

As presented to our CLC Convention this summer, this call is unlike previous CLC Missionary calls. Missionary Ohlmann will be stationed here in the United States (the Ohlmann's plan to remain in the St. Louis area), but will spend approximately 6 months each year making regular visitations to our sister church bodies and developing contacts in foreign fields. In the months that he is stateside his duties will include visits to domestic subsidized congregations, correspondence with foreign affiliates and new contacts, continuing development of the Online Theological Studies website, assisting with the CLC Mission Helper Program, attending Board of Missions meetings in an advisory capacity, guest preaching, attending area delegate conferences, and any other opportunities the Board of Missions deems appropriate and necessary.

The Board of Missions will be holding a special meeting on January 2-3, and working through Pastor Ohlmann's transition as chairman of the Board of Missions to serving the Board in an advisory capacity.

We rejoice in the opportunities that are before us as a church body, and give thanks to the Lord for providing this new worker in the harvest of souls. We ask for your prayers on behalf of Missionary Ohlmann and his family as they continue their service to their Lord and ours in this new way. May the Lord's name be hallowed, His Kingdom come, and His will done!

### PRAISE THE LORD, ALL YOU WHO TRUST IN HIM

Israel was sorely oppressed in the land of Egypt. But the Lord heard their prayers. By the hand of Moses, He delivered them from the oppression. Upon the deliverance from Egypt, Moses and the children of Israel sang a song of praise and thanksgiving. (Exodus 15: 1-18). The words of Moses and Israel were echoed by Isaiah to Judah in face of its impending woe:

"And in that day you will say: 'O LORD, I will praise You; Though You were angry with me, Your anger is turned away, and You comfort me. Behold, God *is* my salvation, I will trust and not be afraid; 'For YAH, <sup>(1)</sup> the LORD, *is* my strength and song; He also has become my salvation." Therefore with joy you will draw water From the wells of salvation" ((saiah 12:1-3))

Isaiah (Jehovah is salvation) prophesied in Judah which was being threatened by Syria and Israel. Ahaz was told that the Lord God would help Judah, but the king spurned the Lord's help and turned instead to the heathen nation of Assyria. This was clearly a rejection of the covenant God. Consequently, God's punishment would fall upon Judah. It is in this context that the Lord gave the prophecy of the Messiah Who would be born of the virgin (Isaiah 7:14), and would bring an everlasting peace to the people of God.

At the time that Isaiah wrote these words, Judah's punishment still lay ahead. As it turned out, the very people to whom Ahaz turned for deliverance, were used by the Lord as a scourge to punish Judah for its unbelief. The punishment began with the invasion of Sennacherib, king of Assyria. By the grace of God, Sennacherib was defeated by Hezekiah, the son and successor of Ahaz.

During the difficult days, Judah could hark back to the previous history of the deliverance from Egypt and find assurance in the promise of the Heavenly Father. Yes, there is a price to pay for sin. God is not mocked. Judah had to suffer the chastisement and discipline of the Lord. It was not laid upon them in anger, but as an exercise of divine love to rescue them from destruction. But the chastisement was not in measure according to what they deserved. "The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in mercy. He will not always strive with us, nor will He keep His anger forever. He has not dealt with us according to our sins, nor punished us according to our iniquities" (Psalm 103:8-10). Consequently, like unto Israel delivered from Egypt, those delivered from the Assyrians would have reason to sing.

In the 5<sup>th</sup> petition of the Lord's Prayer we confess, "We daily sin much and indeed deserve nothing but punishment." Individually and collectively, we deserve only the wrath of God, in time and in eternity. All Scripture is written for our learning. As we wrestle with our own sin, living in an evil and corrupt world, the Lord finds it necessary also to send chastisement our way. While the world rebels against the Lord and mocks Him, and says to the child of God, "Where is your God?" God's children, believing the promise, know that God's chastisement has a loving purpose, for whom the Lord loves He chastens. "Now no chastening seems to be joyful for the present, but grievous; nevertheless, afterward it yields the peaceable fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it" (Hebrews 12:11).

As we go to the Lord in a spirit of confession and mourning, the Lord has compassion. In the promised Messiah, the promised Redeemer, we have the promise of deliverance. Through faith in Christ, we find deliverance from fear. We find peace and deliverance in the promises of the Lord, and in the glorious final deliverance at the day of judgment. Salvation is a gift of God, the ultimate expression of God's love; it comes through Christ Jesus, the Son of God. In the promises of the Lord God, and in the proffered salvation, the penitent and trembling sinner has reason to hope in God.

The promises of our Lord move the troubled heart to draw "water from the wells of salvation." In the nourishing refreshing waters of salvation, the Holy Scriptures, the heart is made joyful. Blessed are all who drink deeply, and often from the well.

The world mocks and ridicules us as it will. But as is evident even in these days, the mockers wring their hands; they cry in the streets, they curse God and man. They live in fear of tomorrow, and of eternity. They find nothing to alleviate anxiety, fear, and hopelessness.

On the other hand, while the children of God cannot predict tomorrow, we can confidently view the future--our future lies in the hand of the Lord Who has left us with witness from the past, and assures us of the future: "For a mere moment I have forsaken you, but with great mercies I will gather you. With a little wrath I hid My face from you, but with everlasting kindness I will have mercy on you, says the Lord, your Redeemer" (Isaiah 54:7-8). He promises us further that though the mountains and hills be removed, His kindness shall not depart from us (Isaiah 54:10).

As we wait for the blessed day of deliverance from sin and the power of the devil, we live in confident hope. Our Savior Who took our sins upon Himself and Who has borne our punishment graciously has promised to take all who believe in Him to heaven where He is. Delivered from sin and the evils of this world, we can join in the ancient song:

"Praise the LORD, call upon His name; Declare His deeds among the peoples, make mention that His name is exalted. Sing to the LORD, for He has done excellent things; This *is* known in all the earth. Cry out and shout, O inhabitant of Zion, for great *is* the Holy One of Israel in your midst" (Isaiah 12: 4-6).

"Thus this wonderful hymn, modeled after so many psalms of praise in the Old Testament, especially that sung upon the delivery of the children of Israel at the hands of Pharaoh, sets forth the joy of the redeemed of the Lord, of the Church Triumphant, when entering upon the blessings of eternal redemption."
