1517—REFORMATION—2017

Though prior attempts at reformation had been made, the reformation of 1517 is remembered as the watershed event in the church, as well as in secular society. The Reformation was primarily religious. It addressed matters of doctrine, and the teaching of the church. Nevertheless, it expanded beyond anything that Martin Luther, a former papal loyalist envisioned, as pope, church, emperor, politician, and people on the streets, were affected. It touched government, education, economics, culture, and family. Once it started no one could stem the tide. Five hundred years later, not only the church, but also secular society is still recognizing its impact.

In this anniversary year, the confessional, and orthodox Lutheran Church will chiefly concentrate on the spiritual aspect of the Reformation. Of many blessings that resulted—chiefly the reemergence of the doctrine of salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ,--another was the reemphasis on the Word of God as the foundation of faith and life. The Word of God was paramount to Luther. "If we want to walk safely, let us accept that which the Word of God prescribes, and which God Himself wants us to know." ⁽¹⁾

One of Luther's themes was the priesthood of all believers. Against Rome's elevation of the papacy and the priesthood to a special class, he spoke of making distinction between the way in which God calls us priests, and the way in which men call themselves priests. Following Luther, confessional Lutheranism testifies to the priesthood of all believers. "But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light, who once were not a people but are now the people of God, who had not obtained mercy but now have obtained mercy" (1 Peter 2:9). Sermonizing on Psalm 110:4, "You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek," Luther said: "Consequently, every baptized Christian is a priest already, not by appointment or ordination from the pope or any other man, but because Christ Himself has begotten him as a priest and has given birth to him in baptism." (2) No one is to function in a public capacity, that is in the pastoral or teaching activity in the Church without a regular call. Nevertheless, every Christian in the private exercise of one's faith-life has the right and authority to witness to Christ, confess Him before the world, to speak the gospel, forgive sins, admonish the erring, as well as to comfort, pray, intercede for the neighbor, and in case of necessity, to baptize. In as much as these activities are exercises of the Word of God, the blessings that flow therefrom are as valid and certain as if God Himself has spoken, for power and blessing lies in the Word, and not in the individual.

In celebration of the Reformation in 2017 it is to be hoped that the understanding of the priesthood of all believers will be reinvigorated. In this regard, we do well to heed the Lord's warning to the congregation in Laodicea which had become enamored with material and temporal things, and had grown lukewarm in matters of faith (Revelation 3:16). Reinvigoration calls for a return to the first love, zeal for the truth and service to the Lord (Revelation 2:1-7). Such love is not regained by threat or intimidation, or under force of law. The law creates animosity toward the Word. Love for the Word and zeal for the truth is born of the gospel—the word that exudes the love of God, and fills us with the richness of God's grace in Christ our Savior. "Blessed are those who hear the Word of God and keep it" (Luke 11:28). The gospel energizes the heart and mind to serve the Lord, and to love the neighbor. The apostle admonishes us to desire in the manner of "newborn babes," "the pure milk of the word, that you may grow thereby, if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is gracious" (1 Peter 2:2-3). By the Word, which the shepherds heard and saw, and which we find in Holy Scripture, we like the shepherds will be moved to exercise our individual priesthood. The shepherds "made widely known the saving which was told them concerning this Child (Jesus)" (Luke 2:17) They were the first lay-missionaries as they returned to their mundane, but important, vocation.

Our daily vocations put the family of believers in many different and unique circumstances in which opportunities exist to share the faith and Christian hope-opportunities to "proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light." As Christbelievers share the message of the saving love of Christ, they can make a difference in individual lives.

J. Gresham Machen said: "For Christians to influence the world with the truth of God's Word requires the recovery of the great Reformation doctrine of vocation. Christians are called to God's service not only in church professions but also in every secular calling. The task of restoring truth to the culture depends largely on our laypeople." Only in the Lord, Who is the "way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6) is there relief from the burdens of life. Only in Him is found eternal salvation. To declare this message is a privilege and responsibility of the priesthood of believers.

As Christ-believers with an eternal hope, we cannot simply be content with the fact that we have it. The shepherds did not return to the fields keeping the message to themselves. Good news wants out. In both faith and life, we are called to reflect the truth of God, and His saving love to our neighbor, as did the shepherds.

Society suffers a dearth of truth. As truth and Christianity are being redefined by many today who think they know better than the Lord, souls are being deceived and destroyed. Removed 500 years from the Reformation, the times in which we live are equally in need of faithful confessors from the pulpit to the pew.



As children of God through faith in Christ, and as heirs of the Reformation, we ought not permit this year-long Reformation celebration pass by without introspection, as well as thanksgiving for God's grace in preserving the Word to us in these latter days. There is no better way to celebrate than to be "always ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you..." (1) Peter 3:15). As priests of our Lord it is our privilege and our responsibility.
