The Lord's Supper Preparation

As a reminder, communicants are to examine themselves prior to communing. 1 Corinthians 11:27: "But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of the bread and drink of the cup."

Prayer before the Lord's Supper:

Lord God, You invite all who are burdened with sin to come to You for rest. In the sacrament of Holy Baptism You called me to be Your child by the Holy Spirit. I now come at Your invitation to receive the holy body and blood of my Savior, Jesus Christ, in the sacrament of Holy Communion. Prepare my heart. Lord, to receive this precious meal with a repentant heart: sorry for my sins and recognizing they deserve punishment, but also rejoicing in the full forgiveness You have granted me by grace through Jesus' holy and precious blood shed for me at the cross. Strengthen my faith, increase my love and hope in You, and assure me of Your blessed peace. Hear me for the sake of Jesus, my dear Savior, Amen.

Prayer after the Lord's Supper:

Blessed Savior, Jesus Christ, You have given Yourself to me in this holy sacrament. Thanks and praise be to You for Your divine tenderness and love shown to me. Your child. I humbly ask you, now that I've received Your body and blood in the Sacrament, continue to fill me with the power of Your Holy Spirit. May I be led to ever embrace by faith the treasures of Your grace imparted to me, especially the forgiveness of sins and fellowship with You. Keep me in Your faith and favor that I may live in You and You may live in me. Let the love that You have shown me enable me, with a forgiven and tender heart, to love You and my neighbor. Preserve me in the true faith until everlasting life. Hear me, O Jesus, for the sake of Your dear name. Amen.

The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not the communion of the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?

LUTHERAN IDENTIFICATION

What does the term *Christian* mean? Today there are almost as many definitions as there are people who call themselves Christian. Christian has taken on baggage far removed from the real meaning of the word used in Antioch where the disciples of the Lord Jesus were first called Christian because they followed Christ (Acts 11:26). By today's definition, the terms Christian or Christianity with the moralism, the do good and you are good philosophy, and the empty religiosity are indistinguishable from any other religion or philosophy. Simply put, what does the statement "I am a Christian" mean today, unless one takes the time to explain it?

The foundation of Christianity is the virgin-born, eternal Son of God, Jesus Christ. A Christian is one whose faith and hope is in Christ, and whose confidence of salvation is built upon the redemptive work of Christ. "The Christian religion is a living faith in the living God, Who has revealed Himself in Jesus Christ, has sent His Son, and is gracious for Christ's sake — nothing else." (1) Salvation by grace (sola gratia) through faith (sola fidei) in Christ (solo Christo) is the heart and core of Biblical teaching, and the Christian faith.

To put it another way, Christianity is built without qualification "on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone ..." (Ephesians 2:20). The Christian faith rests upon the objective Word of God which by its own definition endures forever (1 Peter 1:25). The faithful Christian therefore does not argue with God, accuse God of lying, or change or reinterpret His Word to suit the moment or one's opinion.

The name Lutheran suffers the same abuse as the name Christian. What is a Lutheran? There is a wide divergence within Lutheranism today. To identify as a Lutheran frequently identifies one with doctrines and practices that are far removed from what its namesake, Martin Luther, confessed, believed, and taught. Luther would not identify with and we suspect in his inimitable way would scorch anyone or any fellowship that denied the *Sola Scriptura* principle (By Scripture alone). To Luther, faith in Christ alone made a Lutheran; being a Lutheran meant being loyal to Scripture. If what was taught was not Scripture, it was not Lutheran. Nevertheless, within Lutheranism today one hears

denial of Scripture alone, denial of creation, denial of the virgin birth, denial of salvation by grace through faith in Christ alone. Many within Lutheranism have no concept of the Scriptural doctrine of church fellowship. Within Lutheranism one will find acceptance of, if not promotion of abortion, practice of homosexuality, and ordination of lesbians and homosexuals into the ministry. Within Lutheranism the divine institution of marriage as the union of one man and one woman has been twisted and distorted. The public press, ignorant of Scripture, and dismissive of Scripture will declare on any number of subjects, "Lutherans say, approve, declare, engage in ..." It colors all Lutherans with the same brush.

To that we say, "To say one is a Lutheran does not a Lutheran make." Luther was concerned about the welfare of the Lutheran Church, and to his expression we do well to take heed. "Our church will not be endangered as greatly by the oppressive measures of tyrants as by the indifference of our own people." (2) His concern was not the simple perpetuation of a church called Lutheran, but the Lutheran Church as a repository of the pure Gospel.

We reiterate: the single and absolute source of truth is Scripture. God's Word is truth (John 17:17). When Jesus asked the disciples if they were going to walk away from Him as many pseudo-followers had done, they responded, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). And *that* is what faithfulness to Christ and the Word is all about, both with respect to the believing and the teaching. They who stand in the truth and confess the truth have the certainty of eternal salvation. On the other hand, they who flirt with error endanger their eternal well-being. They who reject the truth and Christ are damned (Mark 16:16).

How then shall we identify the church that is truly Lutheran? By comparing what is taught and practiced within it with the Scripture, and by comparing the confessions of the Lutheran Church to the Scriptures. Faithful Lutherans identify with the historic Confessions because they are a faithful expression of Scripture. The Confessions do not replace Holy Scripture but are a confession of what faithful Lutherans believe from Scripture.

"Therefore, beloved ..., be diligent to be found by Him in peace, without spot and blameless; and consider *that* the longsuffering of our Lord *is* salvation — as also our beloved brother Paul, according to the wisdom given to him, has written to you, as also in all his epistles, speaking in them of these things, in which are some things hard to understand, which untaught and unstable *people* twist to their own destruction, as *they do* also the rest of the Scriptures. You therefore, beloved, since you know *this* beforehand, beware lest you also fall from your own steadfastness, being led away with the error of the wicked; but grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him *be* the glory both now and forever. Amen" (2 Peter 3:14-18).
