Welcome to our guests and visitors. We appreciate the opportunity to share God's Word with you today. Please come again! Those interested in learning more about the Scriptures and our doctrinal position, please speak with Pastor Hein. He would be delighted to visit with you!

Grace Funds

- <u>GENERAL FUND:</u> Contributions to this fund are used for budgeted expenses that normally are incurred in operating our church and school. This includes such things as the pastor's and teacher's compensations, utilities, church operations, school supplies, pastor's mileage, etc.
- <u>TUITION FUND:</u> Offerings are used to assist Grace students at Immanuel Lutheran High School in Eau Claire, WI.
- <u>LIVING FAITH:</u> This program offers opportunities for members to help those of the congregation who are in need of food, clothing, necessary medical supplies, etc. Your offerings to this fund serve the physical welfare of your brethren.
- **DORCAS GUILD FUND:** This supports the women's group and its activities.
- <u>PROJECT FUND:</u> This is for any special projects the congregation decides to do. Currently there is a Parking Lot project and a special Liberia fund.

CLC Funds

- CLC GENERAL FUND (SOMETIMES CALLED "MISSIONS"): Contributions to this fund support the General Budget of the CLC. They are used to subsidize U.S. and foreign missions and to subsidize operating expenses at Immanuel Lutheran High School and College in Eau Claire, WI.
- MISSION DEVELOPMENT FUND (MDF): This fund provides support for mission projects both at home and abroad. Funds are used for such things as missionary exploratory efforts, instruction materials, self-help projects in foreign mission fields, storm relief in India and Africa, etc.
- <u>PROJECT KINSHIP:</u> Contributions are used for the administration and support of orphanages in the foreign missions affiliated with the CLC. At times sponsorship is requested for specific orphans or seminary students in these foreign mission fields.
- <u>CHURCH EXTENSION FUND (CEF):</u> This Fund is maintained for the purpose of providing loans to build or buy churches and/or parsonages within the CLC.
- <u>ILC BUILDING FUND:</u> Contributions are used for the financing of any new building projects at ILC. At this time the Academic Center is being financed.
- <u>ILC IMPROVEMENT FUND (IIF):</u> This fund has been used for various capital expenditures or special projects at ILC, including such items as remodeling, updating blacktop, furnace replacement, window replacement, painting, etc.
- **ILC STUDENT AID:** This Fund provides scholarships, grants, and loans to students attending the high school, college, and seminary. Contributions may allow students to prepare for the preaching and teaching ministries who otherwise might be unable to attend ILC. Eventually this fund is expected to be self-supporting because of an endowment element and the repayment of student loans after graduation.
- **ILC STUDENT AID ENDOWMENT:** This Fund accumulates in principle as donations are made with the annual investment gains funneled into the ILC Student Aid Fund.

"MINISTERS OF CHRIST"

Read 1 Corinthians 2:1-5

¹ When I came to you, brothers, I did not come with eloquence or superior wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. ² For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. ³ I came to you in weakness and fear, and with much trembling. ⁴ My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, ⁵ so that your faith might not rest on men's wisdom, but on God's power.

The goal of preaching is not to have parishioners say, "My, what a beautiful sermon." Rather, "My, what a beautiful Savior."

The phrase "ministers of Christ" is broader than the office of the public ministry. It also embraces the priesthood of all believers in Christ; that is, their God-given right and responsibility to administer the Gospel in whatever circumstances the Lord God has placed them. Yet, we often

approach our public and personal ministries with a sense of weakness, fear, and trembling. What is the solution?

The Means is Scripture

Paul told the Corinthians, "When I came to you, brothers, I did not come with eloquence or superior wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God," 1 Corinthians 2:1.

Corinth was in Greece, and Greece was famous for its philosophy and oratory. As early as the Fifth Century B.C., traveling teachers known as "Sophists" taught a discipline they called "rhetoric;" from the Greek *rhema*, meaning "words." The goal of this early rhetoric was to persuade and even manipulate listeners through powerful speeches, extensive vocabularies, flowery metaphors; and practiced gestures—often at the expense of truth.

When Paul said, "I did not come with eloquence or superior wisdom," he meant: 'I did not come to trick but to teach. I did not come to conceal the truth but to reveal the truth. I did not come to impress you with *my* words, but to share God's words; or as he put it, "the testimony about God."

But does this mean that pastors should not strive for excellence in preaching? No. Every sermon should be as good as it can be—good, not for the sake of being good, but good for the sake of glorifying God. Styles, vocabularies, compelling introductions and powerful conclusions are only useful if they serve the Word of God and do not supplant the Word of God. The goal is not to have parishioners leave church, saying, "What a beautiful sermon;" rather, "What a beautiful Savior."

The means to ministry lies in proclaiming the Scriptures in their fullness—sin and grace, Law and Gospel; not in entertaining; not in diluting the teachings of the Bible to make them more palatable or reasonable. Scripture must be the means of ministry, because Scripture is the only means through which the Spirit of God has chosen to work.

The Message is "Christ"

Paul wrote, "For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified," 1 Corinthians 2:2. What did Paul mean; that his teaching and preaching in Corinth consisted only of reciting the words "Jesus Christ and Him crucified"? No. He meant that Jesus Christ and Him crucified was always the focus of his message.

Early in my ministry, someone advised me to 'look for Christ on every page of the Bible.' I wish I could recall the source, because that godly advice helped shape my entire ministry. Not surprisingly, Martin Luther offered similar advice, saying, "If you want to interpret (Scripture) well and confidently, set Christ before you, for He is the Man to whom it all applies, every bit of it."

In ministry, Jesus Christ must be the focus, because He is the focus of the entire Bible. And "Christ and Him crucified" must be the message, because there is no other Savior and no other way to be saved. As Jesus Himself explained, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me," John 14:6.

The Power is God's

Paul stated, "My message and my preaching were not with wise and persuasive words, but with a demonstration of the Spirit's power, so that your faith might not rest on men's wisdom, but on God's power," 1 Corinthians 2:4-5.

If I could change anything about my ministry, it would be the foolish assumption I've had so often, amid so many difficult circumstances, that the power to create faith; the power to effect change; the power to return a wayward member to church; the power to enrich a troubled marriage; the power to encourage fellow Christians—that this power resided in me. However, it never has resided in me and never will. The power is God's. And when we finally realize this truth and put it into practice, we will not only save ourselves heartache, but carry out our public and private ministries with confidence.

Paul said, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes," Romans 1:16. Do we understand what this means? Look at your Bible. The cover may be worn. The pages may be dog-earred from use. The verses may be underlined. But there is no difference between the powerful words of Scripture and the words of power with which Jesus Christ calmed storms, healed the sick, and raised the dead.

And this is the Word He has entrusted to us.
