

## CLC E-Devotion – Saturday, March 11, 2017

Matthew 27:54; Luke 23:47 So when the centurion and those with him, who were guarding Jesus, saw the earthquake and the things that had happened, they feared greatly, saying, "Truly this was the Son of God!" ... [The centurion] glorified God, saying, "Certainly this was a righteous Man!"

#### IT HAPPENED ON GOOD FRIDAY: THE CENTURION MARVELED

As a soldier of Rome he had no doubt supervised many crucifixions. What happened on Golgotha was in itself nothing out of the ordinary. So why did the centurion fear greatly? He had witnessed the remarkable events that had transpired earlier that day: the unusual proceedings in the court of Pilate, the governor's inexplicable action of sentencing an innocent Man to die, the calm demeanor Jesus had shown. His uttering not a single curse word at His foes. When Jesus did speak, it was to utter a prayer of forgiveness for His foes and to promise Paradise to a dying thief. Then there was the extraordinary way He expired. Usually crucifixion victims would hang on the cross for days before dying finally from exhaustion. Jesus had hung on His cross for just six hours. The centurion noticed how Jesus did not die from exhaustion. He commended His soul into the hands of His Father ... voluntarily! Then there were the strange phenomena in nature: the earthquake, darkness, and splitting rocks. All the centurion had seen and heard caused him to recognize: the Person we have just crucified is no ordinary human. And it made him afraid.

But his fearing took a wonderful turn. He also experienced something within his heart that had never been there before: true peace and joy! By the grace of God the centurion came to recognize that the Crucified One was his Savior. This moved him to marvel and glorify God and say: "Certainly this was a righteous Man and the Son of God!"

May we join the centurion in praising the Lord. May we see Jesus as our sinbearing Substitute, come from heaven to dispel our fear. Clothed in the garment of holiness He obtained for us, which has become ours through faith in Jesus, may we joyfully confess: "O Lord, you are my God; I will exalt You and praise Your name, for in perfect faithfulness You have done MARVELOUS things, things planned long ago" (Isaiah 25:1). "The stone the builders rejected has become the capstone; the Lord has done this, and it is MARVELOUS in our eyes" (Mark 12:11). Let us look forward eagerly to the time when the crucified and exalted Savior shall come "to be glorified in His holy people and to be MARVELED at among all those who have believed" (2 Thessalonians 8:10).

## **SPIRITUAL, but not RELIGIOUS?**

Many claim to be spiritual because they believe in a god or a universal spirit. Some claim to be *less* religious and *more* spiritual. Perhaps you have heard someone say, "I am not religious, but I am spiritual."

As believers in Christ Jesus and through Him children of the Heavenly Father, Christ-believers are born of the Spirit. Through the Gospel the Spirit of God has breathed new life into our dead heart. "But we are bound to give thanks to God always for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, because God from the beginning chose you for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth, to which He called you by our gospel" (2 Thessalonians 2:13). "But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Corinthians 6:11). Were it not for the Spirit of God we would not and could not believe in the Lord Jesus (1 Corinthians 12:3). The Spirit of glory and of God rests upon us (1 Peter 4:14).

Further, reborn of the Spirit from our lost estate we live not according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit (Romans 8:5). "For to be carnally (of the flesh) minded is death, but to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Romans 8:6). The Christian life is a consequence of the Spirit's work in our heart. Scripture addresses us as spiritual. "Brethren, if a man is overtaken in any trespass, you who *are* spiritual restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness, considering yourself lest you also be tempted" (Galatians 6:1).

Being born of the Spirit (and spiritual) in the context of faith, salvation, and the Christian life, is *always* connected to the divine and reflects the divine love and power of God in our lives.

It is impossible for those who are born again of the Spirit of God not to be religious. Religious means holding belief in and reverence for God or in the case of the heathen, a deity of some sort. Religiousness manifests itself through a concern for teaching of religion. But there is no similarity between the religiousness of the Christian and that of the heathen. The Christ-believer worships the Triune God: the Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier. The object of heathen worship is a self-made god of many names who is dead, whose molded image is wind and confusion (Isaiah 41:29). Those who claim to be spiritual, but not religious, are speaking a different language than we speak.

Spirituality to the not-religious spiritual person is the seeking within oneself a connection to a divine being. Such spirituality celebrates self-authority.

We do not endorse the following definitions of religion, but note how the spiritual but not religious compare the two:

"Religion is for those who are asleep. Spirituality is for those who are awake.

"Religion threatens and terrifies. Spirituality gives you inner peace.

"Religion is not *God*.

Spirituality is infinite consciousness and all that is—it is *God* 

"Religion continues the teachings of a sacred book. Spirituality seeks the sacredness in all the books.

"Religion is cause for division. Spirituality is cause for union.

"Religion believes in the eternal life. Spirituality makes you conscious of all that is.

"Religion is based on humanity, an organization with rules Spirituality questions everything.

"Religion gives you promise for the after-life. Spirituality gives you the light to find God in your inner self ..." (\*)

Spiritual but not religious people see religion (including Christianity) as restrictive. They feel bound by having to adhere to what they call rules, or to doctrinal tenets. Someone described their philosophy thus: "If I have religion, then I am obligated to obey someone else's will. But if I am spiritual, there are no demands upon me other than to follow my own sense of 'this is what I currently prefer.'" They are perfectly comfortable do what is right in their own eyes, for they answer to only themselves, and the answer could be different tomorrow then it is today. Basically, they become a god unto themselves for which reason one critic said "spiritual but not religious is just another form of idolatry." The same critic said the claim to be spiritual but not religious is like saying, "I am a scholar, but I don't read." In this context the spiritual see no need for the Word.

The "spiritual but not religious" speak of finding peace, solace, and "closeness with God" sitting on the lake, or in the forest, or on a mountain. Now, Christians like to go to the lake, to the forest, and to the mountains to relax and get away from the rat race and raucousness of the busy world. As we believe that God is the Creator of the world, we can appreciate the beauty of what He has made. But there is no fellowship or communion with

God apart from His Word through which He speaks to us of His love in Christ, and through which He affirms and confirms that we are His children. He Who formed us says, "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by your name; you are mine" (Isaiah 43:1).

If spirituality is god and gives the light to find god in one's inner self where is the comfort? When the burdens of life weigh one down, or when death approaches where is the comfort? It is mindful of the dying atheist who when told by a friend, "hang on brother, hang on," said, "I am trying to, but what is there to hang on to?"

Of course, religion in and of itself saves no one, and of itself does not elevate the religious person above those who claim to be spiritual. The guarantor of our salvation is One outside of us. He says to us, "Your sins are forgiven you" (Mark 2:5). Faith in Christ Jesus saves. The believer in Christ, who acknowledges his sin and recognizes that without Christ he has no hope believes the invitation of the Savior, "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28)." And while he waits for the ultimate deliverance to heavenly glory, he finds solace in "casting all [his] care upon Him for He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Whether on the lake, in the forest, in the mountains, or in his bed, the believer finds comfort in the Savior's invitation, "Call upon Me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you ..." (Psalm 50:15). Not within self, but in the solid, enduring and everlasting Word is the assurance, "Whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Romans 10:13). Immanuel promises, "I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

To the Christ-believer the Word of the living God is the foundation of faith and hope and anticipation. For the spiritual but not religious person whose god is as nebulous as the blowing wind, a passing cloud, or how he feels at the moment, there is nothing to hand on to, no hope.

There is no God-pleasing, much less true spirituality, apart from Christ, and the Spirit of God. However pious the "spiritual-but not religious" people may sound, spirituality centered in self is a devil hoax. Furthermore, pious sounding spirituality does not take the place of faith, and without faith in Christ there is no salvation.

"And now, Lord, what do I wait for? My hope is in You ..." (Psalm 39:7). "My soul, wait silently for God alone, for my expectation is from Him. He only is my rock and my salvation; He is my defense; I shall not be moved. In God is my salvation and my glory; The rock of my strength, and my refuge, is in God. Trust in Him at all times, you people; pour out your heart before Him; God is a refuge for us" (Psalm 62:5-7).
