

Notes:

- * General Fund offerings in March totaled \$64,702 vs disbursements of \$74,599. The budgeted needs of the General Fund is \$75,000/month. Offerings for March fell short of the monthly budget by \$9,897. The General Fund is supported by congregational offerings to the CBP Budget, which provides the basic monthly subsidy needed for the work of our Boards of Trustees, Missions, ILC, & Education/Publication.
- * ILC Building Projects offerings in March totaled \$3,855 vs disbursements of \$7,984, which is the monthly CEF loan payment on the Academic Center (AC). The \$52,680 balance in the Building Projects Fund will draw down quickly in the next month as the \$300,000 renovation project of the North Hall boys' dorm continues in earnest. The Trustees maintain a 3-month buffer of \$24,000 in the Building Projects Fund to assure loan payments on the AC. Balances above the buffer will be used for North Hall renovation expenses until we have to borrow from the Church Extension Fund.
- * MDF: offerings in March totaled \$11,164 vs disbursements of \$38,739, reimbursed in large part by \$32,000 from 16 Mission Helpers & special offerings for RT airfare for Nepal Mission Trip.
- * SAF: received \$30,212 in March, from offerings (\$3,725), student loans repaid (\$4,991), and semiannual SAF Endowment earnings (\$21,496) vs disbursements of \$10,629 in student loans & family discounts allocated to student accounts for the 2nd semester. SAF has a balance of \$6,369 and needs an estimated \$10,000 for student loans & grants for the last 2 months of the 2nd Semester.

After-Word

"IDENTITY CRISIS"

Read John 13:31-35

What do people think when they observe our language and behavior, choices and priorities? Do they immediately identify us as Christ's disciples?

What do those outside of the Christian Church think when they peer inside; when they see our behavior, priorities, responses to hardship, and especially our treatment of fellow Christians? Can they tell we are Christians? Can they easily recognize us as disciples of Jesus?

In John 13:31-35 Jesus addressed this important matter of Christian identity; and in doing so, He described the one characteristic that would clearly identify us as His disciples. What is it? Love. Not just any kind of love, but His kind of love. He said, **"As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another."** What kind of love is Christ's love?

A Love of Selfless Service

During Christ's ministry, His disciples saw many demonstrations of His love. Yet, on the occasion of our text—the "Last Supper," only hours before the crucifixion—Jesus demonstrated His love in a way the disciples could never have imagined. Standing, Jesus removed His outer garment, wrapped a towel about His waist, knelt, and began to wash the disciples' feet. Did a servant do this? No. Did one of the disciples do this? No. Would you or I have done this? No. Yet, God did. The God who created the universe dropped to His hands and knees to wash filthy feet. His was a selfless love. And when you and I serve others selflessly, we are loving as Christ loved and showing ourselves to be His disciples.

A Completely Undeserved Love

Did a single disciple at the Last Supper deserve to have his feet washed by God? No. Has a single person on the planet ever deserved to be washed clean and forgiven in the priceless blood of Jesus Christ? No. Yet, despite our unworthiness, Jesus died for our sins. Indeed, it is in God's love for the undeserving that we glimpse the extent of God's great love for the sinner. Paul wrote in Romans 5:8, **"But God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."** When you and I love the undeserving, we are loving as Christ loved and showing ourselves to be His disciples.

A Determined Love

We read of Jesus in John 13:1, **"Having loved His own who were in the world, He now showed them the full extent of His love."** The Greek of this verse can also be translated: **"Having loved His own who were in the world, He loved them to the end."** Jesus loved His disciples to the end of

His life, knowing full well the agonies which lay ahead in the ridicule, scourging, and crucifixion. Jesus also loved His disciples to the end of their lives, in spite of their sinfulness, weakness, forgetfulness, and faithlessness. And He has loved us in exactly the same way. When you and I love others "to the end," we are loving as Christ loved and showing ourselves to be His disciples.

An Active Love

At a time when Israel's scribes and Pharisees often refused to help the helpless, Jesus went to all the towns and villages, teaching, healing, forgiving; lifting the weights that only God's shoulders can carry; calling all to repentance and faith. His was an endlessly active love. A love which at the Last Supper, as described in John 13, stood up, stooped down, rolled up its sleeves, and washed filthy feet.

Christians talk about love, and properly so. But talk isn't enough, is it? According to John 3:16, **"God so loved the world that He..."** What? Sat quietly? Rang for room service? Went on vacation? No. Because God so loved, He acted. He gave His Only Begotten Son. As Christians, our love must be active too. When you and I put our love into action, we are loving as Christ loved and showing ourselves to be His disciples.

A Truthful Love

Can you name even one instance when Jesus changed or twisted His teaching to scratch "itchy ears?" No. Jesus never told listeners what they wanted to hear, but what they needed to hear. The truth. The truth of God's word. The truth about sin and punishment, grace and salvation, faith and forgiveness. **"Father,"** He prayed, **"sanctify them by the truth; Your word is truth,"** John 17:17.

Many churches today preach about love, but not a love of the truth. Yet, is it love to preach what people only want to hear? Is it love to compromise confession in order to boost attendance, revenue, or TV ratings? No. This is not love. It's folly, and it's dangerous.

Paul said this about preaching truth: "Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming. Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into Him who is the head, that is, Christ," Ephesians 4:14-15.

When you and I love enough to preach the truth, we are loving as Christ loved and showing ourselves to be His disciples. "A new commandment I give you," said Jesus. "Love as I have loved you. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another."
