2017 Liberia Mission Trip:

Earlier this year Pastor Hein accepted the call to be Part-Time Visiting Missionary to Liberia. This call was extended by the CLC Board of Missions and includes Grace Lutheran here in Fridley since it involves Pastor Hein.

This coming week, on Tue., Nov. 7, Pastor Hein will be leaving for Liberia to conduct his annual mission trip. He will return on Sat., Nov. 25. This will be the third trip Pastor Hein has taken there. The intent of this trip is to:

- 1) Lead a colloquy of about a dozen pastors, teachers, and evangelists who have been receiving instruction for the past year
- 2) Have organizational discussions with those who agree with us in doctrine
- 3) Conduct an instruction seminar with contacts in remote Bopolu
- Conduct an instruction seminar in the Monrovia area to see if new contacts can be generated
- 5) Make an investigative mission trip to remote Lofa
- 6) Encourage those who have been in contact with us the past few years, in particular with discussions with Pastor Joseph Kwiwalazu who has been facilitating our classes in the Monrovia area

Retired Missionary David Koenig will also be with Pastor Hein for much of the trip. While in Monrovia, Grace member Alvin Jask is graciously hosting the mission team. When traveling to Bopolu and Lofa the team will be deep "in the bush." People there have said that many people will travel many miles by foot in order to learn from God's Word since Bible training is so rare.

On the day of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, CLC President Michael Eichstadt wrote a letter to Grace Evangelistic Lutheran Church informing them that we are now in fellowship! He wrote in this week's president's letter: "Cause for thanksgiving! Upon the recommendations of the Bd. of Doctrine and the Bd. of Missions and on behalf of the CLC, I have declared fellowship with Pastor Joseph Kwiwalazu and Grace Evangelistic Lutheran Church in Paynesville, Liberia. Unity in faith and God-pleasing fellowship which goes along with it is truly a gift of the Spirit for our encouragement in the work of the Kingdom. I will ask next summer's Convention to ratify the declaration." Pastor Kwiwalazu will be traveling as part of the teaching team while Pastor Hein is in Liberia.

During Pastor's absence, Grace's worship services will be covered by Pastor Emeritus Daniel Fleischer (Nov. 12); Pastor Emeritus John Schierenbeck (Nov. 19); and Pastor David Schierenbeck (Thanksgiving Eve). Pastor Fleischer will help out with Wednesday Bible Class and CDS Catechism. Pastor David Schierenbeck has offered to help with any pastoral needs/visits, so you may call him at 651-492-2323 or you may call the church phone and arrangements may be made by Mrs. Hein, 763-784-8784. Pastor will have his cell phone with him, but will need to have a Liberian number (unknown at this time) in order to connect with the local network. While internet service will be irregular, he will be able to Facebook Message or Google Hangout as well. Frank Radichel will be leading the Wednesday Catechism class. We thank everyone who is helping out to make this trip possible. Please pray for the team's safety and for opportunities for the Gospel message to prosper.



1517--THE REFORMATION CELEBRATION IS PAST--2017

The celebration is past. Lutherans have remembered the event of 1517 for months leading up to October 31. Many have celebrated with a special service commemorating the events that shook the church and the world in 1517. As is the nature of our society, the celebration of the Reformation has also been commercialized. Likely the beer mugs, the coffee mugs, the t-shirts, the caps, and other memorabilia will be tucked away in the cupboard or the drawer.

Luther did not set out to change the world. Nevertheless, the significance of the Reformation which the Lord started through him is such that even the secular world cannot ignore it. According to historians, it had and still has political, educational, and financial ramifications. Luther's purpose for the 95 theses was to stir debate concerning doctrine, and specifically the sale of indulgences. He sought to restore the authority of Scripture and the gospel message of salvation to its rightful place the church. Consenting to come to Worms for the Diet, he wrote to the Emperor. "All I have written and taught has been according to my conscience and sworn duty as a humble teacher of the Holy Scripture, for the praise of God, for the benefit and salvation of all Christendom, and for the good of the entire German nation." (1) However, the effect was far more reaching. "The Reformation of the sixteenth century is, next to the introduction of Christianity, the greatest event in history. It marks the end of the Middle Ages and the beginning of modern times. Starting from religion, it gave, directly or indirectly, a mighty impulse to every forward movement, and made Protestantism the chief propelling force in the history of modern civilization." (2)

Secular society takes note of it. The Lutheran Church, even those who have forsaken the basic tenets of Scripture doctrine, and confessional Lutheranism, observe it. The confessional Lutheran Church (one that stands unqualifiedly on the Holy Scriptures as the divinely inspired Word of God, and upon the Lutheran Confessions as faithful expressions of that Word) celebrates it with thanksgiving to God for raising up steadfast confessors of the Word.

Scripture instructs, "Remember those who rule over you, who have spoken the word of God to you, whose faith follow, considering the outcome of *their* conduct. Jesus Christ *is* the same yesterday, today, and forever. Do not be carried about with various and strange doctrines" (Hebrews 13:7-9). The writer to the Hebrews says further, "Obey those who rule over you, and be submissive, for they watch for your souls, as those who must give account. Let them do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you" (Hebrews 13:17).

Among those whom we remember with thanksgiving to the Lord are faithful parents, pastors, and teachers who established us faithfully in the Word of God.

However, as we have celebrated the Reformation, concentration has been on Martin Luther and other confessors, weak vessels of flesh and blood whom the Lord called and strengthened to stand on the wall 500 years ago for the sake of the Gospel. Remember them. But we do them injustice if we simply concentrate on their person and their unique personality. As to their person, they had their weaknesses and sins. Indeed, it was because he was a sinner who could find no peace of heart, that Luther was captivated by the Word of God when in his teaching he came upon the gospel of salvation by grace through faith in Christ Jesus alone, apart from the deeds of the law. By the grace of God, a burden had been lifted from him. Peace of heart replaced fear as he understood that the righteousness of God was not something demanded of him, but something given to him. He understood the righteousness of God as the cause of his salvation, and that this righteousness was his through faith in the Lord Jesus Who had reconciled him to the Father.

But as we remember them, what is the focus? We remember them because they *have spoken the word of God to us.* As they stood on the Word, proclaimed the divine Word, and in differing degrees suffered for it, they are as Abel "who being dead still speaks" (Hebrews 11:4). As men of faith, they proclaimed the Word which was the lamp to their feet and the light to their path. Not their person, but their faith still speaks. Not the men, but the Word of God creates faith, enlightens the soul and comforts the heart. The Word alone gives assurance of forgiveness and eternal life, as it alone holds before us, even in our dying moments, the Savior, Jesus Christ. Only through the Word does the Spirit create faith which says, "I believe." The Word, the Word, the Word. That is what the Reformation was about.

The writer to the Hebrews writes, "Remember those who *rule* over you ..." "Obey those who rule over you, and be *submissive* ..." We live in a world where the concepts of rule, obedience, and submission are dirty words. The flesh reacts. "I will let no one rule over me, and I will be submissive to no one." Martin Luther had a strong personality, perhaps to some even intimidating. Yet he had no desire to lord it over the church or individual souls. It was papal control over the church and souls that he decried, and against which he reacted.

Said Luther, "People are not to believe me, the church, the fathers, the apostles, or even an angel from heaven if we teach anything contrary to the Word of God. But the Word of God should stand forever." (3)

As the Reformers set forth God's truth, and championed salvation by grace through faith in Christ, we honor their memory and submit to them whose ruling staff was the eternal Word, and whose own faith was fixed on Christ. We are blessed through their witness, and we manifest obedience through the imitation of their faith.

As children and heirs of the Reformation, faithful under-shepherds have the responsibility to speak God's truth, and only the truth, be it law or gospel. They speak the Word in love, speaking the law that uncovers our sin and condemnation, and the gospel which holds Christ and His cross before our heart and minds. As they watch for our souls, with the apostle Paul they speak to us the whole counsel of God, without fear or favor. They exercise no rule, demand no obedience, and seek no submissiveness of the sheep they serve but that which we would owe the Lord if He spoke to us directly. As children of the Reformation we who listen are to obey and be submissive to those who speak the Word of God faithfully, for in so doing we are bowing to the rule of our Lord.

If our Reformation celebration was sincere, and if we truly remember and honor those who brought us the Word of God, we will heed the Spirit Who says through the holy writer, "Do not be carried about with various and strange doctrines" (Hebrews 13:7). On one hand, pastors will not twist or distort Scripture, and will not teach false doctrine; on the other hand, the sheep will not listen to, tolerate, or support false doctrine. Only by abiding in the truth day by day can we be true children of the Reformation, and faithful Lutheran Christians. Only by abiding in the truth shall we know the freedom from sin, death, and the power of the devil (John 8:32). Only by abiding in the truth can we be confident of being true disciples of Jesus, our Savior. That is what the Reformation was all about.

Three years before his death, Luther wrote, "Let us henceforth be grateful to God, the Father of all mercy, that God's wrath may not again take away from us the precious Word and this light because of our sins and our ingratitude, and seven worse devils come after the expelled devil, and everything become worse than it has ever been." (4)
