<sup>8</sup> So it was, when they had finished circumcising all the people, that they stayed in their places in the camp till they were healed. <sup>9</sup> Then the LORD said to Joshua, "This day I have rolled away the reproach of Egypt from you." #### Notes:

- \* General Fund offerings in January totaled \$132,986 vs disbursements of \$97,420, a positive cash flow offsetting last month's negative balance of -\$12,091 & resulting in a balance of \$26,861. Budgetary offerings needed per month are \$77,500.
- \* ILC Building Projects revenue in January totaled \$16,676 vs the monthly mortgage payment of \$8,000 on the consolidated loan for the Academic Center and the North Hall dorm project. The Board of Trustees maintains a 3-month payment reserve in this fund and so will pay down around \$80,000 directly on the loan principal, saving total interest of \$115,000 & decreasing the loan term by 2 years.
- \* CEF: revenue in January totaled \$34.240 from CEF loan repayments vs disbursements of \$14.940.
- \* MDF: offerings in January totaled \$19,480 vs disbursements of \$28,770 largely for expenses in our foreign mission fields: building improvements (\$12,500), pastoral conferences & outreach in India & Mexico (\$5,700), our part-time missionaries' foreign travel (\$5,100), and Bibles, tracts, & misc (\$5,400).
- \* SAF: received \$12,915 in January from offerings (\$3,100) and student loan re-payments (\$9,800) vs disbursements of \$20,621 for allocation of 2nd semester student grants (\$10,500), and monthly student loans (\$9,000) & admin expenses (\$1,100).
- \* IIF: The ILC Improvement Fund January offering was \$1,400, which brings the IIF balance to \$192,500. This will enable us to do all of the approved projects in the IIF. Re-paving of Ingram Drive is the top priority.

# **KEEPING FOCUS**

No doubt 2018 will spawn some introductory sermon material during the Lenten Season. Wednesday February 14 is Ash Wednesday, the traditional Valentine's Day. Easter Sunday falls on April 1, the traditional April Fool's Day. The last time this occurred was 73 years ago (1945).

Valentine's Day is said to have been introduced into North America in the 19th century through British settlers. The origin of Valentine's day and April Fool's day is cloaked in some uncertainty. In researching the origin of each, differing accounts are given for each. While not as clear with respect to April Fool's day, it is agreed that Valentine's Day has religious roots.

Some claim that Valentine's Day has its roots in the ancient Roman festival of Lupercalia, a fertility celebration commemorated annually on February 15. Pope Gelasius I recast this pagan festival as a **Christian** feast day around 496, declaring February 14 to be St. Valentine's Day. In a similar vein, another account claims the Christian church may have decided to place St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February in an effort to 'Christianize' the pagan celebration of Lupercalia. Celebrated at the ides of February, or February 15, Lupercalia was a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, as well as to Romulus and Remus who, according to Roman mythology, are said to have founded Rome in 753 AD.

Until 1969, the calendar of the Roman Catholic Church included Valentine's Day in recognition of St. Valentine who died around 270 A.D. However, his identity was questioned as early as 496 A. D. by Pope Gelasius I, who referred to the martyr and his acts as "being known only to God." One account from the 1400s describes Valentine as a temple priest who was beheaded near Rome by emperor Claudius II for helping Christian couples wed. A different account claims Valentine was the Bishop of Terni, also martyred by Claudius II on the outskirts of Rome. Because of the similarities of these accounts, it's thought they may refer to the same person. Enough confusion surrounds the identity of St. Valentine that the Catholic Church discontinued liturgical veneration of him in 1969, though his name remains on its list of officially recognized saints.

Some suggest that April Fool's Day also had some religious component. However, there are at least five different explanations for the origin of the day, enough to support the suggestion that its origin is "shrouded in mystery."

Whatever significance was claimed for Valentine's Day in church life in the past is forgotten today. Valentine's Day and obviously April Fool's Day as "fun days" in our society are of no significance to Christ-believers.

However, Ash Wednesday and Easter are indeed significant to Christians to whom the days mean something. The date of Ash Wednesday as the first day of Lent is determined by the date of Easter. The date of Easter, set by the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D., is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. To arrive at the date of Ash Wednesday, count backward 40 days (not counting the Sundays). The day will always be a Wednesday. Of course, one can count the days ahead from Ash Wednesday (excluding Sundays) to arrive at the date of Easter. Sundays are not counted in as much as it is the first day of the week, the day of our Savior's resurrection.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Lenten season in the church. The 40 days of Lent bring to remembrance the 40 days of the Savior's confrontation with the devil in the wilderness as He began His ministry. Significant was His victory over the devil as He overcame him with the Word of God. Three times Jesus rejected the temptation of

ASH WEDNESDAY of thereafter, "Jesus began to preach

the devil with "It is written" (Matthew 4). Shortly thereafter, "Jesus began to preach and to say, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'" (Matthew 4:17). The 40 days of Lent specifically focus on our Savior's destruction of Satan. For that reason, penitent, thankful Christians faithfully avail themselves of the opportunity to hear and review the redemption message, and consider the price the Savior paid for their redemption. Lent includes Holy Week, which begins on Palm Sunday, and includes Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. With the burial of Jesus, His humiliation of which His suffering, death, and burial were part concludes. His exaltation of which His resurrection is part is another chapter, one which the Church will celebrate through eternity.

In the Bible there are many places where sorrow over sin is manifested through the use of sackcloth and ashes (Hence today some still place ashes on their forehead as a symbol of repentance). Repentance is no more necessary or cleansing during Lent than any other time. But the observance of Ash Wednesday dating back to the 11<sup>th</sup> century is a fitting beginning for the Lenten season because it focuses our immediate attention on the significance of Christ's suffering and death for us as well as upon the blessing we derive from His bearing our sins as our substitute.

For the Christian, Lent <sup>(\*)</sup> in church terminology is a season of reflection, of preparation, as well as anticipation. The season of Lent as pre-Easter observance defines the Christian's life. The Christian's whole life is one of reflection, preparation, and anticipation for the coming of the Lord Who upon His return will separate the penitent (believers) from the impenitent (unbelievers). To the penitent will be given life eternal (forever with the Lord). The impenitent will be judged to a living hell (forever separated from the Lord).

In the flesh we daily sin much and deserve nothing but punishment. The Christian's whole life thus is a time of reflection. "I have sinned." It is a time preparation, through daily contrition and repentance. "Lord I have sinned. Have mercy upon me, and for Jesus' sake forgive me my sin. I believe that where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation." Consequently, the Christian's anticipation is nurtured by the message of Lent: "[But] He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities, the chastisement for our peace was upon him, and by His stripes we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5). It is stimulated by the message of Easter.

Easter is not part of Lent. It is the declared fulfillment of all that the Savior did for us. It is the stamp of perfect completion of Christ's redemptive work. As observation of Lent in time prepares us for the celebration of the restoration of life through Jesus' resurrection, the message of His resurrection prepares us, and heightens anticipation for the fulfillment of Jesus' promise that as He lives, we shall live also (John 14:19). This is the meaning of Easter. "Come, you blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world" (Matthew 25:34).



The lifelong preparation of Lent and the in-time anticipation spawned by the Easter message of Christ's victory over death come together in the blessed words of Revelation 7: "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom, thanksgiving and honor and power and might, be to our God forever and ever. Amen." And who are those who are thus singing? "These are the ones who come out of the great tribulation, and washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. Therefore they are before the throne of God and serve Him day and night in His temple. And He who sits on the throne will dwell among them."

Regardless of the distractions that accompany Ash Wednesday and Easter this year or any year, blessing in time and eternity comes to faithful Christians whose focus reflects the faith of the apostle Peter, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68), and of David, "In God is my salvation and my glory; the rock of my strength, and my refuge, is in God" (Psalm 62:7). With Mary, as we wait, each child of God may say, "And my spirit rejoices in 'God, my Savior'" (Luke 2:47).
