Encounter Your Shepherd's Love

Jesus, the Good Shepherd

Communication requires two things: a sender and a receiver. The most powerful transmitter in the world is worthless if no one turns on a radio, and all of the radios in the world are of little use if no one is broadcasting.

The same holds true with human interaction. Someone has to send, someone else has to receive. If either one is missing, communication fails. Wives tend to understand this, since husbands tend to have their "radios" turned off α lot. Kids too, for that matter. And yet wives and moms just keep transmitting ...

Why is this general topic so important? Because as Christians, you and I are in the communication business. That's our job, that's our calling, that's our mission—and it ought to be our passion. When we listen to God's Word, we are supposed to be the radios, receiving and actually *hearing* God's message to us. But our life's work is to be transmitters. In leaving us with His Great Commission, our Lord commanded us to center our lives upon the communication of the Gospel, which we all agree is the key to eternal life. The message we are to broadcast is very simple: Whoever believes that Jesus paid for the sins of the world through His sinless life and innocent death on the cross will be saved.

Understand that this is not part of our life's work; this is our life.

It is the sum and substance. Failure in every other secular pursuit is as nothing if we but succeed in our calling to "go and make disciples" for Jesus Christ. You and I are supposed to be the "senders" of the information—the transmitters. If Christians fail in this critical mission, Gospel communication fails. No one is saved by what they don't hear. If Gospel communication fails, it must never be the transmitters who fail. Our communication can take many forms. Our actions often speak louder than our words. But while our actions might make those around us curious, it is always and only the Word of God that can convert and save, for through that Word alone the Holy Spirit works.

Jesus, of course, was the master Communicator.

That means that whenever and whatever He communicated to us had a point and a purpose. It carried depth and wisdom. He used no pointless or "throw-away" words. That means that every word He spoke, every picture that He drew, every lesson that He taught deserves our careful study. So also, Jesus once said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." (John 10:11 ESV)

There are many things going on in those two simple sentences. A thorough analysis would fill pages, so we focus on just a few. First, if Jesus is the Shepherd, then we are the sheep. Sheep are stupid. Sheep are careless, helpless, and really good at getting themselves into predicaments from which they need to be rescued. I once heard a rancher explain how sheep, when attacked by a wolf, will run—but only until one of their flock is caught. They will then just stand and watch, until the wolf (which never tires of killing) looks for another victim.

That's us, only we can't even see our wolf, let alone defend ourselves. Our natural dilemma, once we come to realize the danger, is incapacitating and terrifying. We can only stand there, stupidly, waiting for our inevitable eternal destruction.

It's then that our Good Shepherd enters the picture and places Himself between us and our terrifying enemy. More than that, our Good Shepherd "lays down his life for the sheep." By His sacrificial death, He gives us life.

This is the simple, sublime message of the Gospel. This is what we have *received* from our God, and our life's work is to communicate this life-giving truth to the world. The Good Shepherd has, once and for all, laid down His life for the sheep. Forgiveness and life are His gifts to mankind.

- ◆ Teacher Call: Last Sunday the Voters of Grace extended to Mrs. Ellen Bergstrom a part-time volunteer teacher call. She had discussed this as a possibility with the Board of Education



given the circumstances of her current call ending this school year as the second full-time teacher call begins. Mrs. Bergstrom has now accepted this call. Her particular call as co-principal would continue. She writes, "With a thankful heart I accept the part-time call to teach in addition to serving as co-principal of Grace Lutheran School. It is a joy to continue to serve the Lord in this way and assist the congregation in His command to 'feed My lambs' by sharing His word in all aspects of education in our Christian Day School." - ◆ Lutheran Spokesman: The Lutheran Spokesman is a publication by the CLC which is dedicated to sharing rich, devotional messages for our spiritual edification. If you don't receive it and would like to, please sign up. The congregation covers the cost.
- ◆ The Branches: "The Branches" renewal list is by the guest book. This is a quarterly publication for Christian women. Please check your name if you want to continue receiving this publication, making any corrections to the listed information. If you are not receiving "The Branches" now is the time to add your name to the list. The congregation pays for the subscription.
- ◆ Savings Potential: For those over 70½ it may be beneficial for you to send your offerings directly from an IRA fund to the church. The advantage of this procedure is those amounts are NOT considered as income and your adjusted gross income is less. For more information see Phil Radichel or Benno Sydow.

♦ Parking Lot: Last Sunday the Voters approved a contract to update the parking lot for \$50,500. This work would include excavating the existing lot and using fill as needed to level off the base. The base would then be repaved (3½ inches) on the same footprint as it is now. The curb that has sunk along the church would also be replaced. A curb line (not raised) will also be placed on the west end of the lot so that the new asphalt does not break up at the field. Also, during the pavement project, the middle



- "island" with the flag pole would be removed to aid with snow plowing and provide a couple more parking spaces. The Trustees are considering what new location for the flag may be preferable. The intent is to stripe the lot like it is now. Currently there is a \$46,774 balance in the fund. This means we are just shy of what is needed by \$3,726. The contract did not include the driveway to the parsonage garage, which has since been estimated to cost an additional \$1,800. To spare a special Voters meeting, the Trustees will absorb this cost in their annual budget, potentially coming to the Voters in July with the proposal that the parking lot fund cover the extra \$1,800 expenditure. If this would be approved, the total cost would be \$52,300 with \$5,526 still needed for the fund. Last summer the main project was the reroofing of the entire facility. The Lord graciously took care of our needs then. He continues to be merciful in providing for all our needs now.
- ♦ Fall Student Billing: Each September and February, the amount in the Tuition Aid Fund is distributed equally among the students attending Immanuel Lutheran High School in Eau Claire, WI, up to the full amount of tuition. This distribution is sent directly to Immanuel from the treasurer. This coming fall the plan is for five students to attend with an expected tuition billing estimated to be \$8,000. While this amount is not an expectation for the fund, some members like to be aware of this.
- ◆ CLC Convention: This summer, June 21-24, the CLC will have its Convention in which delegates and pastors from CLC churches across the USA will convene in Eau Claire to make decisions regarding the work of our church body. Once the Prospectus is published (likely soon) with reports from the synodical boards, the Convention will react and give guidance to these. In particular, the matter of the CLC, WELS, and ELS discussions will be considered. We are considering this in our Bible Classes over the next few weeks. Our delegates are Rick Nelson and Bill Rust with alternates being Ryan Oman and Benno Sydow. You may express your viewpoints on synodical matters with them and/or Pastor. For the delegates to prepare for Convention, on Saturday, June 9, 10 am to 6 pm, there will be a Minnesota Delegate Conference held here at Grace Lutheran. Members, in particular Voters, of Grace may certain attend and listen in on this conference.
