REJOICE IN THE LORD

"The world is very evil" is the first line of a hymn. In keeping with that assessment is the reality that there is not much over which to be joyful as one surveys the world filled with wars and rumors of war, hatred, and selfish pursuit of personal agendas. We need not go far outside our door wherever it is we live to see hatred, corruption, political hypocrisy, slander, lying and cheating, immorality, vulgarity, abuse and every other form of moral and spiritual perversion. One cannot turn on the television without daily hearing about murder, rape, burglary, and every expression of crime imaginable, if not unimaginable.

Now pinch yourself. If you still have flesh, you sin. Only those wearing blinders can gainsay the fact of evil (wickedness) in the world to which our sin contributes. There is very little, if anything to be joyful about in this corrupt and dying world. What joy there is, is short-lived, because in this sin-laden world joy and happiness are subject to change according to circumstances. Further, fear and uncertainty overtake us frequently. Crime in the street, murder, abortion, riots, protests, and unrest unsettle us, even make us angry. For faithful confessors of Christ, frustration overcomes joy when we observe the church losing its way as it tries to accommodate itself to the world. Personally, we suffer loss of health and the ravages of sickness. Except in a superficial way, there is little over which to be joyful in the present that is imitating the world before the flood.

Every human on the earth is offspring of Adam and Eve. Yet we do not enjoy the perfection with which they were created because they disobeyed the Lord and introduced sin into the world through the agency of the devil who lost his first estate when he rebelled against God. Consequently, all people born into the world have inherited the moral corruption of Adam and Eve, together with the judgment of death. Save for the Lord Jesus, there is no one born of woman who is born without sin. There is no one born who at birth is innocent before God. There is no one who will escape death (the wages of sin) which the Lord had said would be the result if Adam and Eve disobeyed.

Evil existed in the world from the moment that Adam and Eve listened to and negotiated with the devil. "For from within, out of the heart of men, proceed evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lewdness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness. All these evil things come from within and defile a man" (Mark 7:21-23). The sin of man defiled all of creation. Evil is in the world because man forsook God, not because God forsook man.

In mercy the Lord, though rejected and offended, intervened to salvage mankind. He gave the promise of the Savior, and in the fullness of time sent Jesus, the Savior of the world, to take upon Himself the sin, the guilt, and the punishment man deserved. This rehabilitation of mankind was a complete makeover. "But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Corinthians 6:11). Now according to promise all who believe on the Lord Jesus Christ have eternal life. And this is the testimony: that God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. He who has the Son [believes in the Son] has life ..." (1 John 5:11-12).

The sanctified life, the life God's people live to the glory of God, is a work of the Spirit of God through the Gospel. As believers in Christ set apart for salvation from the masses of those who reject Christ, we have been set aside for sanctification from those who by their rejection of Christ have neither the will nor the power to serve Him.

Yet because in this life we have the flesh we do not attain perfect sanctification. We sin. We do not always serve the Lord as we desire or ought. For that reason, we "draw near with a true heart and confess our sins unto God, our Father, beseeching Him in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to grant us forgiveness." We do so in full confidence of His promise that "if we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). We pray further that the Lord will sanctify us by His truth, for His Word is truth.

Of those who by the Spirit of God walk in the ways of the Lord, and who trust in the Lord to carry them through every sorrow and difficulty, Proverbs says, "The hope of the righteous will be gladness, but the expectation of the wicked will perish. The way of the Lord is strength for the upright, but destruction will come to workers of iniquity" (Proverbs 10:28-29). Even now on this earth the believer in Christ can look beyond the here and now with confident hope, whereas the unbeliever whose life is dictated by the imagination of the corrupt heart has no hope. Those who reject Christ, who live for self, who love the world, who live in sin without any sense of guilt have no sense of what awaits them. The latter is the tragedy of tragedies.

By prayer and supplication, we as citizens still in this world will implore the Lord to guard and protect us from all evil. We will implore Him that His call to repentance will be recognized and be effective. We will pray for His forgiveness of our sins and for the strength of faith to be lights in the darkness of this world.

As we live on this earth while we wait for heaven, we enjoy the blessings the Lord gives us each day. We appreciate with thanksgiving "food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, field, cattle, money, goods, a pious spouse, pious children, pious servants, pious and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, discipline, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

(1) All are gifts of God. But we recognize that these gifts given to enhance and sustain our temporal well-being will one day, without exception, pass away.

There is nothing of this world that can satisfy our deepest need. Nothing worth pursuing with a passion that would rob us of the "inheritance incorruptible and undefiled and that does not fade away, reserved in heaven for you who are kept by the power of God through faith for salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (1 Peter 1:4-5).

Since there is nothing in this world or of this world that is of abiding joy, it would appear from the words above that the life of a child of God is a morbid, lifeless, joyless existence. Though with Paul "we are hard-pressed on every side, yet [we are] not crushed; we are perplexed but [we are] not in despair; persecuted but [we are] not forsaken, struck down, but [we are]not destroyed" (2 Corinthians 4:8). We are not without true joy and a glad heart.

How can that be? It is so because the Father in heaven has reconciled us unto himself through the life, death, and resurrection of the Lord Jesus. In the Lord Jesus Who does not change and who is Immanuel (God with us), we have peace with God. Clothed in the righteousness of Christ through faith we are assured of life with the Lord in heaven. Our abiding joy lies in and is generated by fellowship through faith with the Lord Jesus Christ Who says, "rejoice because your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10:20). The joy of the child of God is anchored in the abundant mercy of the Father Who "has begotten again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." We rejoice greatly when we focus on Christ through whom we "are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (2 Peter 1).

Jesus does not withhold from us reality. He told His disciples, "Most assuredly, I say to you that you will weep and lament, but the world will rejoice; and you will be sorrowful, but your sorrow will be turned into joy ... Therefore you now have sorrow; but I will see you again and your heart will rejoice, and your joy no one will take from you" (John 16:20,22). The world rejoices at the discomfort of Christians in the world. But its joy rooted in unbelief will turn to weeping and gnashing of teeth.

In a time of confusion, fear, and uncertainty, Jesus said to His disciples, "these things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). The child of God finds his joy in fellowship with Christ, a joy the world cannot know. Since the joy of our heart is diminished, if not gone when, we focus on the world. What is the point of looking for joy in that which has been overcome and passes away?

Yes,we are joyful! The Psalmist said. "In the multitude of my anxieties within me, Your comforts delight my soul" (Psalm 94:19). Isaiah wrote, "I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my soul shall be joyful in my God; for He has clothed me with the garments of salvation ... (Isaiah 61:10). To Isaac the Lord said, "Behold I am with you and will keep you wherever you go ... (Genesis 28:15).

Day by day, look unto the Lord Who has overcome Satan, sin, the world, death and hell. Day by day focus on the Lord and the promises of His Word that He will never leave us nor forsake us in time or eternity. Remember His goodness toward us, treasure the warm embrace of His love, contemplate the eternal joy that awaits us in heaven, keep in mind that "here we have no continuing city, but we seek the one to come" (Hebrews 13:14). In that city are the mansions being prepared for us presently by the Lord. Let us encourage one another in the words of the Apostle Paul, "Be anxious [worried about] for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7). The same apostle said:

"REJOICE IN THE LORD ALWAYS, AGAIN I SAY, REJOICE"

"Rejoice, my heart, be glad and sing, A cheerful trust maintain; For God, the Source of everything, Thy portion shall remain. He is thy treasure, He thy Joy, Thy Life and Light and Lord, Thy Counselor when doubts annoy, Thy Shield and great Reward." (2)

CLC E-Devotion - August 31, 2017

Galatians 2:8 For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God ...

Ecclesiastes 5:19 As for every man to whom God has given riches and wealth, and given him power to eat of it, to receive his heritage and rejoice in his labor--this is the gift of God.

FAITH REJOICES IN THE GIFT OF WORK

Faith in Jesus the Savior is the gift from God through which we receive the gifts of forgiveness of sin and Christ's own righteousness -- and along with them, eternal life.

Similarly, the ability to work is a gift of God through which we receive other gifts. Among these are the blessings of bodily provision and the personal satisfaction that comes with a job well done. Note that whether the gift is physical or spiritual, we rob ourselves of joy and blessing when we do not give thanks to God for His benefits and instead act as though we have earned or deserved what comes from His gracious hand.

When it comes to faith in Christ there are plenty of people encouraging us to think that we are the source of that faith; that we by an act of the will make a decision to believe in the Savior. We resist such encouragements to wrong thinking with the word of our God. When we do this we find that the truth about faith enhances our ability to live as Christ's people.

There are also many who would have us see work only as a means to make money, and to think that somehow we ourselves are the source of our talents and abilities. Here also we resist false and ungodly attitudes with the word of our gracious God. And here it is also true that right-thinking about work enhances our ability to joyfully live as Christ's people. When we remember that our gifts and abilities come from God, in faith we can rejoice in using the gifts he has given us rather than looking with envy on those He has given others.

So look again at the two passages with which we began this meditation. With joyful heart give thanks that God has given you the gift of faith in Christ our Lord-- and the gift of work as well. Then let your work be an extension of your faith and an act of thanksgiving to your Savior-God.
