



To Mary, chosen virgin mild, When God determined it was time, The angel Gabriel was sent To let her know what God would do. With heavenly words that stunned her so. She'd be the mother of the child, The sinless Seed, God's Son He'd be, As promised first when mankind fell.

To Joseph came the stunning news. The virgin was to be with child. She would conceive and bear the Seed, By power of the Holy Ghost. The Savior's birth is told to all, Throughout the ages of the world. So richly blessed are all who trust The faithful God, His Word of life. The Father loved the world and gave, His own dear Son, our Savior dear. He brings to us the gift of Life, We shall not perish; we shall live!



PEACE ON EARTH

Christmas is a time of joy for a reason the world does not understand. In connection with the birth of Jesus, the Savior of sinners, the angel announced, "Peace on Earth." The phrase is heard on the airwaves, heard in the malls, printed in Christmas cards, mouthed in greetings, intoned by politicians. How can one be so bold to say the world does not understand it? Because it does not understand or accept the purpose or real meaning of Jesus' birth.

The Savior whose birth was the occasion of the angelic announcement said to His disciples, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27). These words spoken to the disciples on the night of the Savior's betrayal, were echoed after His resurrection when Jesus appeared to the disciples who were behind closed doors "for fear of the Jews." Jesus said to them, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19), and then again, "Peace to you" (v.20)! He went on to say, "As the Father has sent Me, I also send you." The thrust of the message they were to carry with them was the message of forgiveness of sins. "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them ..." (v.23).

Because the world does not understand the purpose and meaning of Jesus birth, it neither understands the peace the angels announced to the shepherds, nor the peace of which the Lord was speaking, and which the disciples (and the Church) were to proclaim. The counter part of forgiveness of sins is the retention of sins of those who do not confess their sins, "... if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (v.23). The peace of which the angels spoke and of which Jesus spoke is peace with God, Who in His grace and mercy reconciled the world unto Himself, "not imputing their trespasses to them" (2 Corinthians 5:21).

Even those who with all sincerity say, "Jesus is the reason for the season" do not necessarily understand the angelic message if they do not recognize that the reason for His birth was to address the sin problem. Yes, sin which separated man from the holy God; sin which brought the curse of death and judgment upon mankind. Sin and unbelief separate the sinner from God. Forgiveness of sin and faith in Christ restores the broken relationship. Without sin we would have been in perpetual heaven. If sin had not violated and broken the relationship between God and man, there would have been no need (reason) for the birth of Jesus, no Christmas! Consequently, they who do not confess sin in their lives and do not accept the truth of their condemnation before God, and finally do not admit to the need for a Savior celebrate an empty Christmas. The personal benefit of forgiveness of sin and reconciliation with God is lost to those who reject the apostle's call to believe in the Lord Jesus through whom God in His mercy and grace reconciled them to Himself. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us" (1 John 1:8-10). To lose what the Heavenly Father has given freely in Christ is the greatest of tragedies.

The apostle Paul wrote, "God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself ..." (2 Corinthians 5:21). Reconciliation with God from whom man by sin estranged and estranges himself is necessary. That blessed peace which is the consequence of reconciliation, however, is forfeited by those who though they may acknowledge sin nevertheless believe that they must or can reconcile themselves unto God, or at least contribute to their reconciliation. Note, the passage does not say that man reconciles himself to God. If that had been possible, Adam and Eve would not have hidden themselves in the garden. If that had been possible, Jesus would not have had to come. "There is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus" (1 Timothy 2:5), Who reconciled man unto God.

The sinner cannot reconcile himself to God through anything that he does. *No* works, no good intentions, no personal efforts, no amount of remorse, no tears, no indulgence, nothing the sinner does can restore man's relationship with God. The passage says <u>God reconciled</u> man unto Himself <u>in Christ</u>. Those who believe in the Lord Jesus Christ are in the fullest and most glorious sense reconciled unto God, but God was and is the Planner, the Initiator, the Source, and the One Who alone restored fellowship with himself. Consequently, as many as believe on His name have assurance of eternal life.

Scripture further tells us, "Therefore having been justified by faith, we have *peace* with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom also we have access by faith into this grace in which we stand and rejoice in hope of the glory of God" (Romans 5:1-2). Reconciliation with God in Christ and having been justified before God through the resurrection of the Lord Jesus is the substance of the peace proclaimed by the angels and spoken by the Lord Himself. Come what may in this world of sin, trouble, and uncertainty, all who understand the love of God announced by the angels can both live and die in peace knowing that *the Lord Jesus has made their peace* with the Father in heaven.

This is not the concept of the peace of which the world speaks at Christmas. The world thinks totally in terms of cessation from anger, hatred, and war. In history nations at war have agreed to stop killing each other in a bow to Christmas "peace on earth", after which they pick up arms again. The love and kindness of Christmas time in the world is soon packed away with the decorations.

Very obviously there is benefit in the peace which the world seeks. Surely, Christ-believers who understand the peace of forgiveness and salvation in Christ, take no back seat in the wish for cessation of anger, hatred, war, and every other cause of unrest in the world. After all, we live here too while we await the Lord's call to eternal glory. We pray to the reconciled Father for peace. We pray that He will bless our nation and the world, and that all people and nations will live peaceably with one another. We pray that peace and harmony will prevail and that in such an atmosphere we might freely proclaim the true peace in Christ to the world. The reality is that there will not be the kind of peace for which the world yearns until all know the peace of God which comes only through the Gospel.

Martin Luther in his commentary on Galatians spoke of the difference between the peace of God in Christ which passes all understanding and the peace which the world pursues. "Worldly peace provides quiet enjoyment of life and possessions. But in affliction, particularly in the hour of death, the grace and peace of the world will not deliver us. However, the grace and peace of God will. They make a person strong and courageous to bear and to overcome all difficulties, even death itself, because we have the victory of Christ's death and the assurance of the forgiveness of our sins."

The assurance of God's grace, of forgiveness of sins, of our justification through faith in Christ, of our reconciliation with the Father, with the attendant assurance of eternal life for all who believe, puts in stark contrast the peace the world pursues and the peace of which the Lord spoke when He said, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27). The peace of those who reject Christ is a mirage that will disappear in the moment of death, for says the Lord who desires not the death of the wicked, "'There is no peace' says my God, 'for the wicked'" (Isaiah 57:21).

As Jesus drew near to Jerusalem, He wept and said, "If you had known, even you, especially in this your day the things that make for your peace" (Luke 19:42)! Because Jerusalem did not know, He pronounced judgment upon it. It did not know what made for its peace, and it invited judgment because it rejected Him!

Today is our day. Today is the day for the world! If the gracious visit and message of Christ is despised in our day any pursuit of real peace is only an illusion.

The gracious Lord by the Spirit has called all who are saved from that illusionary life as He called the sinner to faith in Christ and has shown them in Him the real reason for the season.

To all who confess their sins, place themselves at the mercy of God, and cling to Christ, our Advocate with the Father (1 John 1:1-2), "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to men" (Luke 2:14) is the grandest song ever sung until we join the saints in heaven and say, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom, thanksgiving and honor and power and might, be to our God forever and ever. Amen" (Revelation 7:12).

Only the prayers of the reconciled who believe in the Lord Jesus and call God Father ascend to the throne and are heard by Him. Therefore, let us pray for peace in the world. Let us pray for peace among people and nations on the earth. Let us pray for peace that we may live our life without fear. Let us pray for peace so that we may without hindrance share the real reason for Jesus' birth with those who do not know the essence of the angel's announcement of "peace on earth." Real, true, meaningful peace for time and eternity is always connected to Christ and is the possession of those who believe in Him.

"Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit" (Romans 15:13).

"Grace be to you and peace be multiplied" (1 Peter 1:2).
