President's Devotion

At mile 20 on the Boston Marathon course is a dreaded half-

mile stretch called Heartbreak Hill. The hill is not exceptionally steep, but its place toward the end of the makes it especially problematic. It comes just at the time when the last reserves of a runner's stamina and willpower are depleted. Just when it seems as though the next step is impossible, the hill looms ahead standing between the athlete and the finish line. It's the point where runners "hit the wall." So where does the sweaty, exhausted, and discouraged runner find the strength to push on up and over the hill and continue on for the final six miles to the finish?

That was the question facing the Jewish Christians to whom the book of Hebrews was first addressed. They had already endured severe persecution and more was on the way. "Sometimes you were publicly exposed to insult and persecution; at other times you stood side by side with those who were so treated. You sympathized with those in prison and joyfully accepted the confiscation of your property, because you know that you yourselves had better and lasting possessions. So do not throw away your confidence . . . You need to persevere . . . Therefore strengthen your feeble arms and weak knees. 'Make level paths for your feet'" (Hebrews 10:35-36; 12:12-13).

Can we relate to those early Jewish Christians? Does it seem as though we are facing our own Heartbreak Hill as we run the race set before us by the Lord? The challenges can make it seem as though we are struggling to run uphill. We want to go full speed ahead with the mission of discipling the world, yet we face an ongoing shortage of pastors and teachers for pulpits and classrooms. There are thousands of souls overseas eager

to hear the news of a Savior who loves them, who died for them, and who is coming again. Yet increasing government opposition is a frustration and obstacle. Congregations closer to home struggle with declining interest and involvement, along with increasing costs to maintain buildings and ministries. One congregation has been suspended for calling a pastor outside the fellowship of the CLC. Another has announced its dissolution at the end of the year. All of these things are truly heartbreaking.

Heartbreak Hill is the point at which the runner needs to take a deep breath, refocus, and find renewed strength for the final stretch. Obsessing over how tired the arms are, how much the legs ache, the feet hurt, and how distant the finish line is won't help. To look to our own strength for the spiritual race before us would be useless. Instead, "Fix your eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart" (Hebrews 12:2-3).

We stumble, trip, and fall along the way, but Jesus never did. His perfect life, not our feeble effort, is our righteousness before God. His death on the cross is the complete payment for the guilt of the entire world. Our faith is all about Jesus from start to finish. Salvation in Christ, fully accomplished and guaranteed by faith, is the source of strength to keep running our race. He has already won the victory. In Word and Sacrament He provides refreshment and renewed energy for the course ahead—all the way to the finish! "Those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint" (Isaiah 40:31).
