CHRISTMAS TREES

Christmas trees have been part of the Christmas tradition for more than five hundred years. In fact, Martin Luther is credited with being the first to place lights--at that time, candles--on a Christmas tree. No doubt all of us have cherished memories of decorating Christmas trees; first as children with parents, and later as parents with children.



But Christmas trees are not merely

decoration. If we let them, they can be living-room reminders of Christmas truths. The evergreen color can remind us of God's everlasting love; or, if the color is white, of the righteousness that comes through faith in Jesus Christ.

Christmas tree lights can be reminders of Jesus, "the light of the world." The beautifully wrapped presents beneath the tree can remind us of all the gifts God has lavished upon us in Christ: the gift of forgiveness; the gift of grace; the gift of eternal life; and certainly, the greatest gift of all, God's only Son, Jesus Christ.

Likewise, the ornaments on a Christmas tree can remind us of the "fruits of repentance;" that is, God-pleasing behavior which results from our connection to Christ; as Jesus said in John 15:5, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in Me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing."

Scripture, of course, does not mention Christmas trees adorned with lights and tinsel and ornaments. However, it does mention four trees directly related to the Christmas Story; that is, directly related to the reason why Jesus Christ came into the world.

The **first two of these "Christmas trees"** were planted in the Garden of Eden. One was the Tree of Life, and the other was the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. Both of these trees were located in the center of the Eden, because they were central to humanity's relationship with God. Would man choose the Tree of Life and live? Or would he choose evil and die?

Sadly, we know which choice Adam and Eve made. And everything wrong with our world today can be traced to that wrong choice-to man aspiring to be God. The tempter told Adam and Eve, "You will not surely die. For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil," Genesis 3:4-5.

By contrast, everything right with our world-salvation, the forgiveness of sins, eternal life-is the result of God aspiring to become man; that great reality we celebrate at Christmas: "The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us," John 1:14.

In a Biblical sense, then, the first `Christmas tree' was that tree where Adam and Eve sinned, and where God in grace and love promised the Savior; saying, "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; He will crush your head, and you will strike His heel," Genesis 3:15.

The third "Christmas tree" in Scripture was planted in the rocky soil of Golgotha, where Jesus Christ suffered and died for the sins of the world. In the remarkable wisdom of God, since human beings were overcome by a tree in Eden, Christ overcame by a tree on Golgotha. Isn't that a wondrous paradox? We were overcome by a tree. Christ overcame by a tree.

Paul wrote in Colossians 2:13-15, "When you were dead in your sins and in the uncircumcision of your sinful nature, God made you alive with Christ. He forgave us all our sins, having canceled the written code, with its regulations, that was against us and that stood opposed to us; He took it away, nailing it to the cross. And having disarmed the powers and authorities, He made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them by the cross."

And **the final "Christmas tree"** of Scripture is yet to come. This tree will be found in the new heavens and earth God will create at the return of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Jesus Himself spoke of this tree, saying in Revelation 2:7, "To him who overcomes, I will give the right to eat from the tree of life, which is in the paradise of God."

As we gather about our decorated Christmas tree, let us remember these other trees which led to Christmas and Christ's coming: the tree in Eden; the tree on Golgotha; and the tree in the Paradise yet to come.
