- **General Fund** Offerings this month were **\$144,769** vs disbursements of \$103,987, a \$41,000 positive cash flow. GF special offerings of \$120,000 since October have helped significantly to recover from a -\$100,487 deficit to the current positive balance of \$44,253. Thanks be to God who has moved hearts to respond to the General Fund need! Our General Fund Monthly Budget is \$88,575 and provides major funding to the Boards of Missions, Regents, Trustees, & Ed-Pub.
- **ILC Operations** ILC January revenue was \$163,481 (including \$47,875 General Fund subsidy) vs disbursements of \$108,163.
- **ILC Building Projects** Offerings were \$16,087 vs a disbursement of \$8,000 for the AC/North Hall loan payment. The \$100,000 Nov special gift was transferred this month from the Bldg Projects account to the CEF account to pay down the AC/North Hall principal, resulting in the current Bldg Projects balance of \$35,742. The paydown saves \$90,000 LT interest & decreases the term 2 years.
- **CEF** January revenue was \$257,951 (from special Bldg & cong loan repayments and \$102,744 six-month investment income), vs disbursements of \$3,877 for CEF monthly administration expenses.
- **MDF** Offerings were \$13,596 vs disbursements of \$18,356, including \$8,215 foreign pastoral conferences, \$5,676 foreign exploratory, and \$2,500 church building assistance.
- **SAF PMP** There was a one-time transfer of \$39,000 from the SAF & PMP Endowment portfolio to our Retirement Plan portfolio to help correct a misplaced asset.
- Kinship Monthly offerings of \$15,878 vs disbursements of \$17,415

#### **Catechism Evangelism**

### **The Third Article**

It happened one evening in early Spring. I was on my way home from a Lenten service exchange and I

was only a few blocks from my house. In a matter of seconds, I could tell something was wrong with my vehicle as I struggled to steer it ove the side of the road. The problem? A flat tire. Somewhere along the prior curve, the front passenger side tire on my vehicle was impacted by a sharp object.

Many of you have probably encountered a similar situation and the ensuing frustration. For a moment I took stock of my options. Was there anyway I could get my vehicle home and work on it tomorrow? After all, I could almost see my driveway, it was late at night, and I was wearing a suit and tie. Could I call someone for help? Probably not at this hour. I knew all along that my only viable option was to unpack the spare tire and the jack and get my own hands dirty. It didn't matter how well the rest of the car worked. The engine, battery, ignition, alternator, and everything else was all in fine working condition. One tiny rip in one tire stalled my vehicle.

In a much greater sense, air is necessary for all living things, not just to the inside of our car tires. The Word of God offers a similar thought when it comes to our soul-care and it centers around the work of the Holy Spirit. The Small Catechism employs the term "Sanctification" in the Third Article of the Creed to describe this work. Broadly speaking, sanctification is the work that the Holy Spirit does to create faith. This is the vital mechanism behind all mission work. Without it, all our efforts would be in vain. In a more narrow sense, the Holy Spirit builds, sustains, and strengthens faith in believers' hearts. Both aspects of sanctification are motivated and empowered by the gospel in Word and Sacrament — what we call the "Means of Grace."

In these ways, the Holy Spirit breathes life into sinners. Without that "air," we would perish in the condemnation of our sins and the bondage of God's righteous law. Just like our vehicles, it doesn't matter what else appears to be working well in our spiritual lives. We might look good in our actions. We might be knowledgeable in our words. We might be lifelong Lutherans. If the Holy Spirit has not breathed life into our hearts we won't move an inch toward God.

Luther's explanation elaborates: "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him. But, the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified, and kept me in true faith."

If we know how important air is in our tires, how much more should we recognize the importance of the Holy Spirit for our souls! The sad reality is that many people, even Christians, are led to trust in other "vehicles" that offer a fast track to God in heaven, but without His Word. These diversions include relying on our own works or efforts, trusting in our feelings, letting our emotions dictate right and wrong, or following beliefs and teachings because they are modern and popular. In the world's eyes, these philosophies appear to be a sports car or a luxury automobile, but from God's perspective they have no air in the tires. You might look good where you're at but you're certainly not going anywhere fast.

As we provide a gospel-centered witness within our churches, communities, nation, and world abroad, let us remember to display the work of the Holy Spirit in the Means of Grace. This is where the believer's life comes from and this is how it remains alive and well. God did not offer up His only-begotten Son to die upon the cross, just to let us take control of obtaining that salvation on our own terms and in our ways. As attractive as the many alternatives to sanctification may sound at times, at the end of the day all we need is something that works. God gives us that freely through the gospel, and wherever that gift is proclaimed, the Holy Spirit is there breathing life into sinners.
