BY HIS STRIPES WE ARE HEALED

As we move on to Good Friday, the day of our Savior's crucifixion, we are reminded many times of the abuse that was heaped upon the Savior

Why was He even exposed to such treatment? We do not understand the passion suffering of our Lord, nor do we understand the meaning, and even less the blessing of Easter unless we penitently from the heart acknowledge the reality of what Isaiah declares in his prophecy in the 53rd chapter: "And the Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all." These words penned by the prophet 750 years before Christ, were reiterated some 25 years after the fact when Paul wrote to the Corinthians, "For He [the Father] made Him Who knew no sin to be sin for us..." (2 Corinthians 5:21). We were not the <u>immediate</u> cause of the suffering of our Lord. We were the <u>underlying</u> cause of it! We, with the whole mass of humanity before Him, and after Him. We were and are responsible for Jesus being crucified.

The hymn writer, Johann Heermann, in his hymn (The Lutheran Hymnal -143), "O dearest Jesus, What Law hast Thou Broken" includes in the hymn, "It is my sins for which Thou, Lord, must languish." Jesus suffered pain and anguish in body and soul from Gethsemane to Calvary for us, because of us!

We remind ourselves of these things, not to evoke sympathy for Christ. He does not want our sympathy. To the lamenting women on the way to Calvary He said, "Do not weep for Me, but weep for yourselves and for your children" (Luke 23:28). We remind ourselves of these things because they speak to what we would have suffered in time and eternity had He not. "For if they do these things in the green wood, what will be done in the dry" (Luke 23:31)? This is not a drama play, nor an attempt to be over dramatic. This was not a criminal lashing out to intimidate or get even. This was the innocent Son of God – the green wood – calling to repentance, sinners – dry wood – lest His pain and approaching death be in vain for them. If the fire of God's judgment "does not spare even God's Son...what will become of those who have refused God's mercy and have in their impenitence become dry wood ripe for judgment" (Franzmann, Concordia Bible with Notes, CPH, 1971, p. 159)?

In Isaiah 50 we find a prophecy, the fulfillment of which speaks to the payment for our sins. Jesus did not turn away from suffering, but "set His face like a flint" to accomplish His purpose. "I gave My back to those who struck *Me*, and My cheeks to those who plucked out the beard; I did not hide My face from shame and spitting" (Isaiah 50:6). This found its fulfillment when "They spit in His face and beat Him; and others struck [slapped] Him with the palms of their hand" (Matthew 26:67). Imagine if you will, *spitting on and slapping the Lord Jesus!* Then later again after putting on him a crown of thorns and mocking Him, whereafter they spit on Him, and took the reed and struck Him on the head" (Matthew 27:28-30).

We expect that of the world for Christ and His cross are foolishness to the dry wood. But now pause. How different is what His captors did to Him than what we do when we sin? The very question smarts, does it not?

Or think of the ignominy He suffered without complaint when Pilate, despite his acknowledgement that Jesus was innocent, gave the Jews the choice between the innocent Son of God, and the seditionist and criminal, Barabbas. Ought we not think about that also when we are confronted with the choice between truth and error, right and wrong, Christ and the world?

One of the cruelest blows He bore was when "He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him" (John 1:11). Indeed He died for all, even those who did not and do not receive Him. But ought we who are called by His name, and Who by His grace He has claimed as His own (Isaiah 43:1), "put Him to an open shame" (Hebrews 6:6), and crucify Him again by our sins in thought, word, and deed?

Finally, the cruelest blow He bore for our sake was voiced when He said, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me" (Matthew 27:46)?

If what Jesus endured makes you uncomfortable, it is no more than he who is writing it. As much as we would like to deny reality, we cannot. We are compelled with the prodigal to say, "Father, I have sinned, against heaven and before You, and am no more worthy to be called Your son" (Luke 15:18-19), and say with the publican in the temple, "God, be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:13).

Thank God, there is another reality greater than our discomfort, our pain, our guilt. It is anchored in all that Jesus suffered in our behalf and for our salvation. The Lamb of God, bearing our sin, went uncomplaining forth to the cross to fulfill the task for which He had come. This was the greatest demonstration of love. Jesus was paid the wages we earned. The very God whom we offend with our sin recorded through the apostle Paul, "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, having now been justified by His blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him. For if when we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life. And not only that, but we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received the reconciliation" (Romans 5:8-11). The Law of God uncovers our sin and condemns, "But where sin abounded, grace abounded much more" (Romans 5:20). Grace covers our sin and forgives. The Law unclothes our ugliness. The grace of God clothes us in the righteousness of Christ, in robes fit for heaven.

By His stripes we are healed! "Therefore having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1).

In our experience we at one time had a young couple quit church because in their judgment we did not teach enough about how to live. The fact is that if we preach Law and Gospel we *are* teaching how to live as well as exposing the corruption called sin. What part of God's Law does not teach us how to live? Which part of God's Law does not show us where we have failed to live up to the standard of the holy God.

If we acknowledge that, which part of the Scriptural narrative does not show us how to live and by the Gospel – the cross of Christ – energize our faith and empower the will to live for the Lord? As we observe the Savior in His life, in His deepest agony, in His death as our substitute under the wrath of God, do we really have to tell one what to do and not to do beyond leading one back to the cross where in the crucified Christ is found the will and desire to live for Christ Who died for us. Can we walk away from Pilate's courtroom and from Calvary without assenting to "Whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 1:10)?

Our Lord has borne our sin, our shame and our guilt. He has reconciled us unto the Father. Certainly as one penitently goes to the Lord seeking His forgiveness for sins past and



present, and as certainly as one hears, "Be of good cheer, your sins are forgiven you," there is created the desire to "live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence and blessedness" (Luther's *Small Catechism*, 2nd Article).

Viewing our Savior suffering for our sins, bearing the cruelty of trial and cross, and recognizing that through His stripes we have been healed and given the hope of heaven, we pray:



Grant that I Thy Passion view With repentant grieving Nor Thee crucify anew By unholy living. How could I refuse to shun Every sinful pleasure Since for me God's only Son Suffered without measure?

Yet with the apostle we must acknowledge, "In me (that is in my flesh) nothing good dwells" (Romans 7:18). Hearing the words of forgiveness from the cross, and knowing the victory over sin, death, and the devil through Christ and His resurrection, we pray with confident thanksgiving:

Grant that I may willingly
Bear with Thee my crosses,
Learning humbleness of Thee,
Peace mid pain and losses.
May I give Thee love for love!
Hear me, O my Savior,
That I may in heaven above
Sing Thy praise forever (TLH-140, st.4,6).
