<u>CLC President's Letter – October 1, 2022</u>

Tired of all the political ads leading up to the November midterms? Instead of helping to clarify candidates' stands on the issues, they distort and confuse. In the Milwaukee TV market an ad for one candidate is often followed immediately by a spot for their opponent which contradicts everything said in the previous ad. How do you get to the truth? There is only one way and that is to consult reliable sources and research the candidates and their positions.

It was the search for truth in confusing times which drove Martin Luther into the Scriptures. He had been taught from little on that good works were necessary for salvation, that acts of penance would help one's status before God, and that the saints' treasury of merits could work toward balancing his account before God. But was this true? The question haunted him until he found the answer in God's unchanging Word. Luther concluded that popes and councils can err, but God's Word stands forever. The truth which filled him with such peace and joy was that "a man is justified by faith apart from observing the law" (Rom. 3:28). Jesus prayed, "Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth" (Jn. 17:17).

We live in spiritually confusing times too. False teachings of every imaginable sort are spread via social media, websites, and in everyday conversations. Many of those teachings sound good. They may have a grain of truth, and they may be promoted by very likable people. "Satan himself masquerades as an angel of light" (2 Cor. 11:14). How are we to be sure of the truth? There is only one way, and that is to continually be in the Word. Jesus says, "You search the Scriptures because you think you have eternal life in them. They testify about me!" (Jn. 5:39). No one ever outgrows the need to be in the Word daily. Sitting at the Lord's feet in personal Bible study is the foundation for growth in faith and understanding. Area study clubs and pastoral conferences are also vital. They are well worth the time and effort. Let's make the most of them.

Time in the Word is just as important for the flocks under our care. The Sunday service is where most receive the feast of the Gospel for the nurture of their souls. What is troubling is that another opportunity is so under-utilized among us. What percentage of those in a Sunday worship service attend a Bible class, either Sunday or midweek—50%, 25%, 10%? The Bible class is really a perfect complement to the worship service. While a 20 minute sermon provides an uninterrupted hearing of the Word, Bible class provides time for in-depth and specific study of a Bible book, a topic relevant to daily life, or a Scriptural doctrine. The worship service is rightly liturgical and reverent. Bible class with its more informal structure provides opportunity for questions and back-and-forth conversation. It is not just for a few. Bible class is for everyone. May we encourage all of our fellow believers to take part and so receive the blessings God wants to give them in His eternal Word. It is the truth which cuts through all the confusion and points to Jesus as the Way, the Truth, and the Life.

Why are you here? What is your purpose in life? It isn't important what you "want" to accomplish. The real question is "For what purpose did God put you here?" Some might look at this question and feel that the answer might vary from one individual to the next. But that is a different question altogether which gets into the Christian doctrine of vocation. The question we are asking here precedes that topic and lays a foundation for it.
