#### Martin Luther on How to Look at Graves:

**1 Corinthians 15:42** So also *is* the resurrection of the dead.

The body is sown in corruption, it is raised in incorruption.

Well, what does a pious farmer or tiller of the soil think when he strews his grain in every direction? It seems to be nothing but lost labor and waste, and he, it appears, must be a foolish man intentionally to lose his grain. But ask the man himself, and he will promptly answer: Why, my dear fellow, I do not throw it away in order to lose it and to let it spoil but that it may sprout again very beautifully and that this handful may bear and yield far more. To be sure, now it seems scattered into the wind to no purpose, for birds and worms to eat. But wait till summer comes. Then you will see how it will grow apace, so that one handful will turn into ten and one bushel into six. – These are his thoughts; not this, that the grain falls into the earth and must there decay, as if that were the end of the matter; but the man looks and waits for the coming summer, which will fully and richly bring his grain back to him; and he is as confident and sure of the grain that is to grow as if it were already standing there before him. He is, in fact, surer of that than he is of what he has on hand; otherwise he would certainly not be so mad as to throw it away futilely and to no purpose. See, thus we should also learn and accustom ourselves to think. Just so it is in the eyes of God when He casts a number of dead here and another there into the cemetery, or today lays His hand on me and tomorrow on another and thus casts one after the other into the earth as His grain or seed. To us this looks like the utter end and eternal destruction. But God sees and thinks otherwise. He has only one end in view: that His grain, after this miserable existence, come forth again most beautifully in the pleasant summer. And this is as certain to Him as if it had already occurred and been accomplished. But for us it is written and so attractively pictured that we should have the same thoughts when we lie on our deathbed, that we disregard the fact that we see and feel nothing but that they put us into the ground and that we hear nothing but wailing and weeping, as though we were utterly gone. Such human thoughts we should tear out of our heart and graft into it the heavenly and divine thoughts that our decrease shouldn't be called burial and corruption but a sowing or planting by God Himself as grain or seed. ... We must henceforth learn a new language and speech in talking of death and the grave when we die. It should not be called dying but being sown for the coming summer and that the churchyard or burial mound is not a mound of dead bodies but an acre full of grain, called God's grain, which is to sprout again and to grow more beautifully than any man can comprehend. This is not human and earthly language but divine and heavenly language; for such thoughts you will find in none of the books of all the learned and wise on earth. Read all the histories and the books and writings of philosophers and jurists: you will find neither word of letter of this picture; now will you hear any language to the effect that a different, new, and eternal life will come out of death and that when people die it should be called being sown. But one and all call it perishing forever and coming to nought, so that nothing further can be hoped for or expected. ... So, then, when I see my father, mother, brother, sister, child, or friend buried and lie under the ground, I, as a Christian, should not say: There lies a foul, decayed carcass or corpse, but: There lies my dear father, mother, child, friend, prince and lord; and today or tomorrow I too, shall lie there with them. What are they? Pure kernels of grain, which will grow immortal and imperishable, far more beautiful than the green crops in the field when summer is coming. This is speaking of the matter in right heavenly language, even as God and His angels speak. Therefore although the world cannot speak or understand such language, we must learn so to use our tongue and to clear our eyes that we look at it and speak of it according to God's Word.

### **CLC Financial Report - January**

- General Fund January offerings were \$81,575 VS disbursements of \$120,627 for a negative cash flow of -\$39,051, increasing the deficit to -\$146,088. Disbursements YTD are \$6,500 under budget, but offerings still trail expenses by 20%. Our Boards of Missions, Trustees, EdPub, & Regents depend on the General Fund "CBP" offerings for their major support.
- **CLC Reserve Fund** is held in our Investment Pool account to grow until needed, which is typically at the end of the fiscal year June 30. The <u>negative</u> -\$7,318 in January is due to the market loss for the month. Div/Int income received since July: \$7,882.
- ILC Operations January revenue: \$182,907 (incl. \$117,097, Tuition/R&B/Fees; \$2,000, misc.; \$63,810 General Fund subsidy) VS disbursements: \$127,740 (incl \$80,000 wages; \$13,500 Food Service; \$9,332, Bldgs/Ground/Utilities; \$6,525, Admin. Annual Budget: \$1,552,000.
- IIF January receipts: \$22,683 (\$20,000 special gift for South Hall new water heater; \$2,453/mo bequest; \$230 offerings VS \$744 disbursed. The IIF investment balance of \$132,800 in the Alerus Investment Pool Account was totally withdrawn to be used for a list of ILC improvements the Regents have scheduled to be completed over the next several months, (Cf 2022 CLC Proceedings, p 62)
- ILC Bldg January receipts: \$64,801 \$58,868 capital gains; \$5.933 special offerings VS disbursed: \$90 Div/Int income received since July: \$33,881.
- CEF January receipts: \$31,394 (loan repayments & gifts) VS disbursed: \$20,884 (\$17,082, Member Notes repaid. Div/Int income received since July: \$62,722.
- MDF January receipts: \$5,475 (Offerings) VS disbursed \$36,374 (\$2,880, Board visits & admin); \$15,500, Church Bldg Assist; \$10,870, Outreach; \$6,624, 3<sup>rd</sup> Missionary; \$500 Bibles & Literature.
- **SAF January** receipts: **\$9,841** (\$6,176, SAF loan repayments; \$3,665 gifts) **VS** disbursed: **\$6,265** Div/Int income since July: <u>SAF</u>: \$35,971; <u>PMP</u>: (Pastor/Teacher Prep): \$43,529;<u>Scholarship</u>: \$2,874.
- Kinship January receipts: **\$23,981**: (\$9.527 offerings, \$14,225 sponsors) VS disbursed: **\$29,460** (\$11,000, Medical aid; \$8,920, Orphanages; \$9,450, Seminary students; \$90; Nigeria Widows.
- \*\* Positive & negative values in the <u>revenue</u> columns reflect market fluctuations of long term invested funds of the ILC Building Projects, CEF, SAF, & Reserve. (IIF no longer invested in the Alerus Pool).
